Riverview Health opens new state of the art Cath Lab

Riverview Health is celebrating the opening of its brand new state of the art Cardiovascular Suite with an enhanced cath lab. The new facility is larger and has new equipment that isn't available anywhere else in the area. During a VIP tour Thursday evening Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear proclaimed July 9, 2015, "Riverview Health Heart & Vascular Day".

The new cath lab now includes top of the line imaging equipment with a larger flat-panel detector that provides clearer images with lower doses of radiation and contrast. Riverview has also added a 3-D CT-like imaging machine for a more detailed view of a patient's anatomy. The lab has a new 60 inch smart monitor that is customizable for physician's preferences and new surgical lights for increased visi-


"Having been in cath labs for parts of five decades, this cath lab is magnificent," said Riverview Health Chief Medical Officer, John Paris, MD. "It affords the opportunity to provide the best care imaginable for our patients."

The new facility can accommodate surgical and anesthesia teams if a cardiovascular procedure turns into a surgical case. This would save patents time from being transported to an operating room. The cath lab also allows vascular surgeons to perform a wider variety of procedures.

"The new technology helps the physicians treat heart and vascular disease more effectively because we're able to get a better view of the patient's entire vascular system," said Dr. Mario Pyles, MD, medical director of Cardiology at Riverview Health.

During Thursday's tour, Riverview vascular surgeon Dr. Richard Ofstein, a frequent user of the new lab, said "This truly is a fantastic room full of technology".

The new Cardiovascular Suite is already in use and Riverview Health continues to stay on the cutting edge of technology right here in our own back




Cancer Support Community offering Gentle Stretch Yoga class at NAC

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



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

Mickey Smythe will be the meet referee for the ninth year.




