Ritz could make county important in election

As predicted a few months ago in this column, Glenda Ritz is now running for governor. Ritz, a resident of Hamilton County, is the embattled state Superintendent of Public Instruction. She and Gov. Mike Pence have been struggling over control of the state Board of Education and other matters for more than a year.

It was not hard to see that Ms. Ritz has been portrayed in the news media as the victim of a state administration power grab. This has brought her sympathy and she know it. So, she announced in recent days she will indeed run for governor.

Ritz made something of a public debut on Saturday in the Carmel Fourth of July parade. While she did not receive



an overwhelming response in Republican territory, she did get scattered applause along the parade route.

The popular parade draws thousands of onlookers. Gov. Pence, present last year, was not in the parade this year. Indianapolis Mayor Greg Ballard did show up and walked the parade route, leading some to wonder if he might have further political aspirations.

So, here's a further prediction: If the Pence administration continues confrontation with Ritz, she will likely win the Democratic nomination for governor next year. Critics say her knowledge of issues beyond education is lacking, but the voting public often doesn't care about that. If a candidate has wide name ID whether from sympathy or other reasons, many people will vote for that person.

This leaves another Democrat, John Gregg, with a problem. He was presumed to be the frontrunner for the party nomination. Now, maybe not. It will depend on

whether the party bosses pull out all the stops for him in next May's primary election.

They might try to pull Gregg through in what will be a tough primary if both he and Ritz go to the starting gate. One little secret Democrat leaders know is that Ritz labeled herself as a Republican by asking for a GOP ballot in past primaries before running on the Democratic ticket in 2012.

In any event, Hamilton County could be very important in the general election next year. Consider that Mike Pence got half his statewide winning margin in this county. Can he do that against a county resident and a woman who the media can portray as being picked on?

The answer is quite possibly up to the governor and his relations with Ms. Ritz over the coming 16 months. He'd be wise to cool it.

Riverview Health opens new state of the art Cath Lab

Riverview Health is celebrating the opening of its brand new state of the art Cardiovascular Suite with an enhanced cath lab. The new facility is larger and has new equipment that isn't available anywhere else in the area. During a VIP tour Thursday evening Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear proclaimed July 9, 2015, "Riverview Health Heart & Vascular Day".

The new cath lab now includes top of the line imaging equipment with a larger flat-panel detector that provides clearer images with lower doses of radiation and contrast. Riverview has also added a 3-D CT-like imaging machine for a more detailed view of a patient's anatomy. The lab has a new 60 inch smart monitor that is customizable for physician's preferences and new surgical lights for increased visibility.

"Having been in cath labs for parts of five decades, this cath lab is magnificent," said Riverview Health Chief Medical Officer, John Paris, MD. "It affords the opportunity to provide the best care imaginable for our patients."

The new facility can accommodate surgical and anesthesia teams if a cardiovascular procedure turns into a surgical case. This would save patients time from being transported to an operating room. The cath lab also allows vascular surgeons to perform a wider variety of procedures.

"The new technology helps the physicians treat heart and vascular disease more effectively because we're able to get a better view of the patient's entire vascular system," said Dr. Mario Pyles, MD, medical director of Cardiology at Riverview Health.

During Thursday's tour, Riverview vascular surgeon Dr. Richard Ofstein, a frequent user of the new lab, said "This truly is a fantastic room full of technology".

The new Cardiovascular Suite is already in use and Riverview Health continues to stay on the cutting edge of technology right here in our own backyard.

Fishers announces additions to economic development team

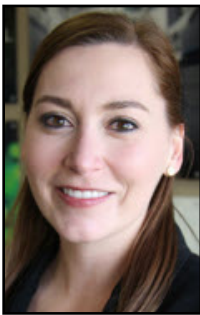

Summer football....

HSE has triple-headed threat

Hamilton Southeastern coach Scott May began summer football watching his Royals plays in a tournament at St. Francis University.
“The teams were from the Fort Wayne area and all were good teams, Homestead, Snider, Carroll, Dwenger and East Noble,” May said.
“Our team looked really good.”
It was one of the best looks May got during the summer workouts.
“So many kids are playing multi-sports today,” May continued. “Baseball, basketball along with football. Kids playing more than one sport is good. But there seemed to be more of that this summer. It has been hard putting together a (football) program.”
Unlike baseball and basketball where summer sessions end late June, football continues through July. Then will come a brief layoff before regular season sessions

begin. Southeastern has an upcoming 7-on-7 session with Lawrence Central.
HSE likely will have one of the best triple threats in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference with the return of quarterback Carter Poiry, tailback Aaron Matio and wide receiver Will Coudret.
Poiry had a strong junior year, passing for 1,045 yards and seven touchdowns. Matio, as a junior, ran for 941 yards in 179 carries and he scored 11 touchdowns. Several starters from the defense will be back, led by Purdue-bound senior linebacker Collin Miller and senior tackle Ben Utter.
Then there are corners Will Michaelis and Ryan Brown, linebacker Justin Voskuhl and strong safety Brock Burns.

Burns had a couple of pass interceptions as a sophomore last year. He was the fifth-leading tackler in the conference with 82. Voskuhl had 77 tackles. Miller had 66 tackles and was sixth in the conference with five sacks.
Southeastern also is looking for productive years from Austin Holzum, Zach Randall, Grant Skelton, Johnny May and others.

Hildebrand wins Indiana Open

He just graduated high school, but Timothy Hildebrand has won an open golf tournament. Hildebrand finished his spectacular week at Brickyard Crossings Golf Course by triumphing at the Indiana Open Championship on Thursday. Hildebrand, who just graduated from Westfield, was on

top of the leaderboard wire-to-wire, claiming the title with a 16-under par score of 272. Hildebrand, 18, is the second-youngest player ever to win the Indiana Open. Billy Krazert III, the 1970 champion, is the youngest. Hildebrand is also the first amateur to win the event since 2010. The Purdue-bound golfer was tied for the lead after the first round, but had it all to himself after that. He finished with a two-stroke advantage over Vincennes' Adam Schenk. With all golfers playing two rounds on Thursday, Hildebrand lit up the course with a five-under 67 in his third round (making six birdies), and followed that with a solid score of two-under 70 for his fourth

round effort (with four birdies). He totaled 22 birdies for the tournament. Fishers' Eric Steger, a Noblesville and Ball State graduate who has been a pro for several years, placed third with a 10-under 278. Steger played all four of his rounds under par, shooting 68 for his third round and 71 for his fourth. Steger eagled the 15th hole during his third round, the second time he had done so during the tournament - Steger drained another eagle on 15 in Monday's first round. He made four birdies in both of his Thursday rounds. Steger earned \$3,000 in prize money for his finish.

Fishers' Graham McAree finished a solid sixth, scoring a six-under 282 for the event. After a scorching second round on Wednesday, McAree kept it going with a four-under 68 in his third round, including five birdies. He finished the fourth round with a 73, making four birdies. Noblesville's Mike O'Toole, a professional from Riverside Golf Academy, finished seventh with a five-under 283. O'Toole blasted into the top 10 with a five-under 67 for his third round, draining six birdies, then scored 73 in his fourth round, making two birdies. O'Toole earned \$2,250.
