Sheridan Police Chief Bob Shock announced a public meeting will be held on Monday, July 13th to discuss recent suspicious fires that have occurred in Sheridan.

The most recent fire occurred on Monday, July 9 in the area of 5th and California Street. Shock said a vehicle was set on fire that also damaged a portion of a nearby residence.

Found at the scene of Monday's fire was the word "HEX" spray painted on a nearby vehicle. Sheridan police indicated the same graffiti has also been found at other area fires

"We need the public's help," said Shock. Police ask that if anyone sees anything suspicious to call 911.

Flyers advertising the Arson Hotline telephone number have been posted in several Sheridan businesses. Sheridan Fire Chief Bret Merriman recently said, "There is a reward for information leading to the conviction of the person responsible." The Children's Healthy Adventure Fair is more than a few fun hours during summer vacation. It's an opportunity for families to take measures to keep their children safe, healthy and ready for school.

HOPE Family Care Center, which provides free medical and dental care to uninsured adults and children, will host the markers. Additionally, each child will take Adventure Fair from 1-4 p.m. July 25, rain or shine, outside the clinic at 270 W. Jackson St.

Everything at the fair is free, including games, school supplies and food. New to the three-year fair, the K-ID's BMV, sponsored will provide ID/medical cards to children. 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



Things look good on The Rock

With summer football winding down and the regular season not that far away, Westfield coach Jake Gilbert is a couple of steps from being in football hog heaven.

Westfield's new stadium is about to open. It's one of the finest facilities in the state.

"The players and the community are excited," said the coach. "Football families moving into the area now are giving us a look. It wasn't that way in the past."

Another topic for excitement is the offense Gilbert will put on the field this fall. It's highlighted by two quarterbacks. It's highlighted by one of the best passing combination in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference.

"We've got two good quarterbacks," Gilbert agrees.

One is senior Ryan Pepiot, who last season threw for second-best in the conference with 1,757 yards. Right on Pepiot's trail is junior Andrew Sweet.

The passing combination returning from last season is Pepiot firing to nowsenior Milo Beam. He was second in the conference a year ago with 678 yards. He caught 32 balls.

Pepiot and Beam also are baseball players. Many predict they will go baseball after leaving high school.

However, when looking at the door to hog heaven, the defense could be Westfield's biggest challenge. Only returning starter is free safety Noah Smith.

Fifteen seniors and what Gilbert calls a "ton of juniors" will be asked to fill the defensive holes.

"We're searching for the best 11 guys, those who can go out and tackle people," said Gilbert.

There are some prospects, such as senior Sam Trompen, sophomore Bryan Hoover and senior Martell Fletcher. Big hole to fill on the offense is running back Elvin Caldwell, who rushed for 1,187 yards. Ready to step in is senior Brandon Karsnick, who last year rushed for 276 yards in 53 carries.

The offensive line will be led by Jonathan Mendoza. "He's a good one," said Gilbert.

Also returning in that line are senior Jordan Long, junior Austin Dollens, senior Bryce Sears and senior Zach Krieg.

There's a transfer that has Gilbert pleased, junior Johnny Swidan, a tackle from Guerin Catholic.







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

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
