

Proceed cautiously when it comes to supplements

The good news: We recently celebrated our country's



239th birthday! The bad news: We are one of the most obese countries on our planet...and spending billions of consumer dollars in our quest to get in better shape! While I had not intended for this to be my topic this week, I ran across something that gave me pause as it relates to products we often purchase with the very good intent to help our bodies become healthier and more fit. I was browsing through a local publication (not this one!) and

came across an article that was promoting a particular "health" product that is "guaranteed to make losing weight faster/easier" etc. The article was written by a person who actually owns a company which sells the product. Okay so far, right? The author of the article may have had some credentials other than owning the business but those were never stated in the article or at the end of the article. I was also surprised to see that the publishers did not include a disclaimer at the end of the article for their own protection - though I am first in line to say that I am not a legal expert, I would never include suggestions of a supplement purchase that could be detrimental to anyone's health issues

who may be reading the article and would purchase those have them maintained or repaired or pour additives into our items.

The particular supplements that were being promoted in the aforementioned article are contraindicated for anytwo weeks of a surgical procedure, who may have blood clotting issues, taking certain prescription drugs, or have heart irregularities. There are many people who fall within those parameters who might read such an article promoting a supplement or substance, and begin using that item without the knowledge of their physician or licensed health care practitioner. Complications from usage or over-usage of supplements are an important issue in our quest to become healthier.

fail, encourage their clients to obtain a full physical and discuss with their physician their intent to work with a nutrition/wellness consultant or coach. I actually insist in your quest, do your own research, take responsibility for upon this when working with my clients. If there is any your food and supplement choices, and perhaps incorpoindication by their physician that they may be pre-diabetic rate a nutrition and fitness coach to help you get started. or have other serious health issues it is critical to know this After all, a good coach can make a difference in reaching going forward. That information may preclude the client from working with the nutrition consultant until those conditions have been addressed by the physician. I believe that supplementation is warranted and one who is pregnant, diabetic or pre-diabetic, who is within helpful in many cases, but as stated above, the proper protocols should be followed. If you consider working with a nutrition or wellness consultant, ask questions about their experience and training. Currently the State of Indiana does not require licensing for this profession. A nutrition consultant is not licensed to prescribe a specific diet to a client; only a licensed health care professional is authorized to do so. A nutrition and wellness coach can be very beneficial to a client who wishes to lose weight, feel better and stronger, and learn more about making better food choices. Additionally any nutrition consultant should, without Most often a client's plan will include behavioral changes and attitudes about food as well as changes in the food items the client selects. Bottom line – proceed cautiously your goals!



John Hebert carries the tag as the new head football coach at Carmel, replacing Kevin Wright. "Head coach" he is. But there is nothing "new" about Hebert when it comes to coaching at Carmel.

Hebert has spent 18 of his 20 years coaching football at Carmel. He was the defensive coordinator before being named head coach. The two years he didn't coach at Carmel (2003-04) he was an assistant coach for Bo Belden at Westfield.
