Downed tree closes Conner, 16th streets

Shortly before noon on Monday, high winds blew a large tree down on the southwest corner of the intersection of 16th and Conner streets (Indiana 32/38) in Noblesville. The tree took down power lines north and south of Conner Street and the westbound traffic signal pole arm at the inter-

For most of Monday, 16th Street was closed from Logan to Maple streets. Conner Street was closed between 14th and 17th Streets. The east-west alley between 16th and 14th streets north of Conner Street also was closed to traffic.

Roads were re-opened by the middle of Monday evening.

The City of Noblesville and INDOT crews installed traffic control in the area and worked the situation with utility companies. The city placed advanced warning on Conner Street on the west side of Noblesville to alert through traffic of the closure in an attempt to assist eastbound motorists.

This was the only roadway that had any interference because of Monday's storm.

Noblesville hosts Sister Cities welcome reception

The City of Noblesville recently hosted a welcome reception for delegates and exchange students from Nova Prata, Brazil and Cittadella, Italy. The city is hosting its two Sister Cities this week.

Each summer, student ambassadors and their chaperones travel from two partner cities to the host city for a ten day fun-filled cultural exchange. There they explore the city, sample local fare, and learn about the history, traditions and social and economic aspects of that city.

In 1994, under the leadership of then Mayor Mary Sue Rowland, Noblesville began the process of obtaining a sister City. An agreement was reached in October 1996 with Nova Prata, Brazil under the leadership of the mayor at the time, Dennis Redick. In July 2006, Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear, Nova Prata, Brazil Mayor Vitor Pletsch and the Vice Mayor of Cittadella, Italy Guiseppe Pan signed a tri-lateral agreement. At the time, it was only the third such tri-lateral agreement in the past 58 years of Sister Cities International's existence.

Carmel, Westfield join Regional **Development Authority**

A new partnership has been formed between the cities of Carmel, Westfield, Indianapolis and Greenwood.

The communities have banded together to create the Regional Development Authority. In doing so, the cities will be able to participate in Indiana's Regional Cities Initiative, which is designed to "attract talented people" to the Hoosier State.

There are already five areas of the state - Northwest Indiana, the South Bend and Fort Wayne areas, Kokomo and Clark/Floyd County in southern Indiana - that are participating in the Initiative. The greater Indianapolis area was wanting to join, but needed to have a partnership with other cities to do so.

Greenwood was the first city that voted to join the RDA, at its June 15 common council meeting. Westfield was next, approving its entry at its June 22 city council meeting. Carmel approved its entry into the authority at its July 6 Common Council meeting. The Indianapolis City-Council voted to join on July 13.

The Regional Cities Initiative, which is part of the Indiana Economic Development Council, is encouraging these cities to find and keep workforce talent. It lists three bullet points that are key strategies: "Inspiring regional development," "encouraging regional collaboration" and "partnering financially, according to the initiative's Web site.

Already the RDA has some plans in the works, including the Red Line, which is a rapid transit bus service. The line would link the four cities involved in the partnership.

In addition to her father, she was preceded in death by her husband, Stephen Crickmore; and son, Tom McWilliams.







If it seems like some of the players on the Westfield girls basketball team have been around forever, that's because some of them have.

This year's incoming senior class was a group of girls that were very successful in middle school, and made some immediate impacts when they got into high school. Now, they will be the leaders of the Shamrocks in experience.

"We got a full team of veterans," said new Westfield head coach Ginny Smith. The coach isn't new to the program, though. She was the assistant to former girls coach Shane Sumpter, who has moved over to the boys basketball team as the new head coach there.

Smith noted her team's experience, saying the fact that all her seniors have played a significant amount of minutes will "play a big role" for this year's team. However, she noted that there will be a different philosophy for the 'Rocks this season.

"We are changing some things, and I still think there's going to be an adjustment period," said the coach.

Returning juniors include Morgan Clary and Emily Katter, both of whom were on the varsity roster. Alena Nasbaum, Madison Alber and Allison Dotson will move up from junior varsity. Sophomore Sophia Reag is also back, along with classmate Ryann Bunting.

In summer play, Westfield again hosted its shootout, and also played in the Lady Mac Summer League, taking on opponents at Center Grove, Warren Central and the south side of Indianapolis.


"We had quite a few games this summer," said Smith. She said her team "had a really good summer all things considered," and was impressed with how the players picked things up.
