Even with the \$10 bill change, remember Hamilton

Have you heard that the portrait of Alexander Hamilton on the \$10 bill is going to be downsized with a famous woman to join him in the primary position on the currency? The U.S. Treasury Secretary says he will announce that woman's identity in a few months. But, the new bills will not be in circulation until 2020.

Hamilton County, as you might know (and probably should know) is named for Alexander Hamilton, possibly the most intelligent of the country's Founding Fathers.



He put the new nation on a sound financial footing when he was Secretary of the Treasury from 1789 to 1795.

Putting a woman's likeness on currency is considered a step toward political correctness. Speculation is that Harriet Tubman is the most likely woman to receive the honor although Eleanor Roosevelt, Amelia Earhart, Susan B. Anthony and others have been mentioned.

It won't be a first. Martha Washington was featured on the \$1 for several years back in the 1880s and 1890s. Since then Pocahontas, Susan B Anthony and Sacajawea have all gotten \$1 coins. But, none of the ladies is in wide circulation today.

There's no problem putting a deserving woman on our currency, but we should not downgrade Alexander Hamilton because he was the one man who was most responsible

for starting the U.S. toward being the economic and industrial superpower that it is today.

He made some very unpopular choices in having the federal government assume the debt of the 13 states in exchange for giving up state claims to western territories. The land given up was then sold by the federal government to individuals to pay off the debts.

He knew that industry was key to producing products that were needed both domestically and in other countries. He succeeded in getting a tax on imported goods and then a national banking system that would be accepted and respected at home and abroad.

So, our namesake should be the last to be downgraded in any way on our currency. Some, including a descendant of Hamilton,

want the \$20 bill to be the one changed to include an outstanding historic woman. Doug Hamilton of Columbus, Ohio, has started a petition drive with this goal. Sunday marked the 111th anniversary of Alex's untimely death. He was shot in a duel with then-Vice President Aaron Burr. Hamilton, an illegitimate orphan from the Caribbean who fought in the American Revolution, became an attorney and founder of the New York Post as well as a gifted economist, was 49 years old when he was killed.

It might be appropriate for our county officials to have a large copy of the \$10 bill portrait hanging in the Judicial Center atrium to inform or remind folks that our county is named for this great American.

Giant Eagle touts its Market District locations as "foodie paradises," specializing for those who look for "specialty, organic and unique items," according to its Web site. The location offers such upscale items as "artisan breads, gourmet confections, international and bulk foods, the finest in charcuterie and hot and cold prepared food options."

GetGo, meanwhile, is a convenience store through and through. It offers fuel and car washes, along with fresh food inside. It also likes people in uniform, as anyone who is "military, police, firefighters, EMTs and paramedics in uniform" are welcome to receive free drinks, day or night.

Giant Eagle operates three brands - Giant Eagle, Market District and GetGo, plus a Giant Eagle Express store. The company is based in Pittsburgh, with the majority of its stores in Pennsylvania and Ohio.

There are 88 members in the Llama Trekkers club this year. Marilyn Nenni, the superintendent of the club, said the club is in its 24th year.

Nenni believes the Llama Trekkers is all about communication. The children that participate in this project learn how to communicate with their llama, as well as develop skills in working with their fellow Trekkers.

"They all help each other," said Nenni. "The program is kind of about leadership

and responsibility and communication with each other. And it's kind of turned out that the llama is just a tool in the means of gaining all this. Our seniors all help the younger ones. They're all good friends, they all work together."

This year, there are four 10-year members in the Llama Trekkers club. That includes this year's Llama Scholarship winner, Madeline McConkey, a recent Westfield High School graduate.

While she is a 10-year member, McConkey is a nine-year member of the Trekkers. She joined after watching her older sister participate in the club.

"I didn't do it my first year because I was a little intimidated, but after watching her do it for two years, it just felt right and I loved it," said McConkey, 18, who is headed to Indiana University. She calls working with the llamas "really good preparation for life," as it taught her about hard work and what she needed to do to care for her animal.

"It's just been really educational," said McConkey.

Brittney Lawhorn is another 10-year member involved with the club, having just graduated from Hamilton Heights. She's been a Llama Trekker for seven years.

"At first it was a challenge, but it became easier the more experience I've had," said Lawhorn, 19, who is going to Kaye's Beauty College to study cosmetology. Just like McConkey, caring for her llama taught her many different things.

"I got the experience of having to take the responsibility and the patience to work with the llamas, and responsibility by having to get to the meetings by myself and having to schedule around other things like school and after-school activities and homework and all that," said Lawhorn.

Friday will be the busiest day in the llama barn. The day begins with the Youth Judging at 10 a.m., with two Walk-A-Llama events at 1 and 8 p.m. That is open to the public. In between the Walk-A-Llamas are the Costume Contest at 5 p.m. and the Leaping Llama exhibition at 6 p.m.

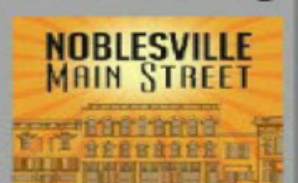

Summer football....

4 Blackhawks to replace Hoover

The good news coming from Sheridan’s football camp is that 55 Blackhawks have reported. It’s a good increase from the last couple of years.

The challenging news for veteran coach Bud Wright is that 29 of those 55 players are freshmen.

“We have some good players who are young,” said the Sheridan coach.

Among the missing is Austin Hoover, who is off for Wabash College to play football and baseball. Hoover was the big man in the attack last season, carrying nearing each time the Blackhawks ran the football. He carried 408 times for 2,604 yards. He ran for 36 touchdowns.

“Without Hoover, we’ll go to a different set,” Wright said. “We’ll go with two backs.”

Actually, Wright said he may go with four backs. Junior twins Kenny and Robert Burnell will be in the picture and so will sophomore Joe Callahan and senior K.J. Acevedo. The Burnells, playing behind Hoover, each got nine carries last season.

“We might go with the Burnells on one play and Callahan and Acevedo on another,” explained Wright.

The quarterback will be a veteran, senior Jacob Chesney, backed up by sophomore Cole Cummings and sophomore Gunner Williams. Both sophs have seen lots of action this summer. Wide receivers are senior Taylor Ly and sophomore Brody Perry.

Jacob Chesney was a starter last year. He caught 32 passes for 614 yards and nine touchdowns. He threw only three passes.

The offensive line, a trademark of Wright-coached teams, will return senior David Powers, junior Alex Gipson and junior Kyle Harwood, who also will play full-back.

“Our line is good with size, but it too is young,” Wright said.

Other offensive linemen are freshman Karl Whaley, sophomore Tanner Swindle, senior Zach Reed, junior Avery Bundy and junior Gavin Phillips, a 300-pounder who hasn’t played football since his freshman season.

On defense, the outside linebackers are Acevedo and Kenny Burnell. Inside linebackers are Callahan, Robert Burnell, Reed, Harwood and sophomore Zach Grace.

“We’re looking for defensive backs,” said Wright. “We have several choices.”

Chesney will be back at safety and Ly also will return to the defensive backfield. Another Burnell, freshman Nick Burnell, and freshman Kyle Archer also will be in the mix.

Looking good at defensive ends are Powers, Phillips and sophomore Hunter Pflugh, who started as a freshman last season. Also playing well is Ian Pence, a freshman.

“We’ve had a decent summer,” Wright said.

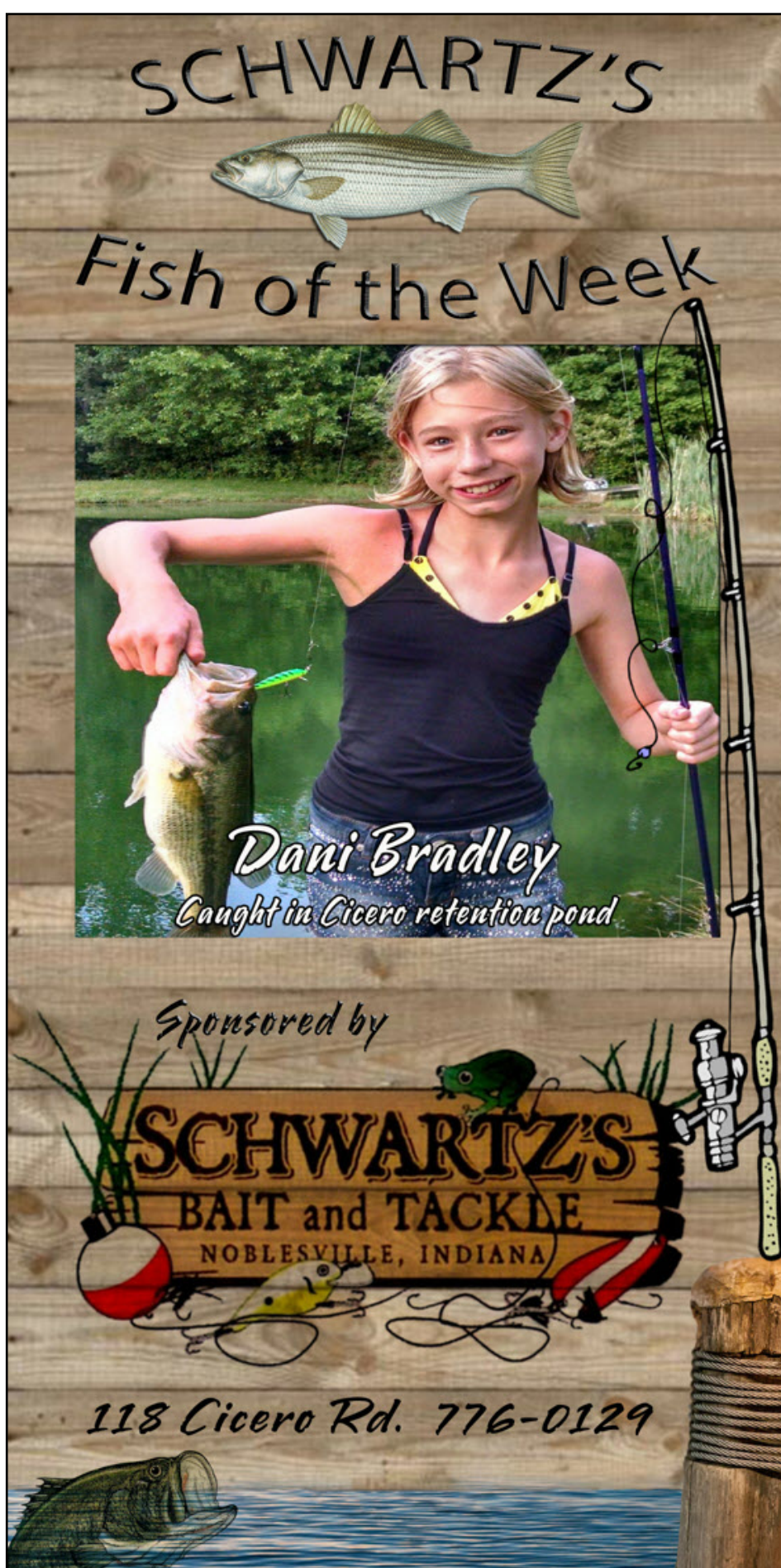

Passes Charlie Carr for fourth all time...

Indians skipper Treanor wins No. 371

After having a further ascension through the Indianapolis Indians' record books put on hold during the All-Star break, skipper Dean Treanor guided the Tribe past Toledo, 7-2, Thursday night to claim his 371st Indians victory and move into fourth place in franchise history in all-time managerial wins.

Treanor passed several of the most illustrious names from Indians' coaching history en route to his newest milestone - including Hall-of-Famer Al Lopez (9th, 277 wins), Dave Miley (7th, 314 wins) and Owen (Donie) Bush (5th, 365 wins) - and officially overtook Charlie Carr's win total (370) from the 1906-1910 seasons with a victory tonight in Toledo.

Through four-plus seasons at the helm of the team (2011-15), Treanor has amassed

a career record of 371-297. He owns the best record in the franchise's prestigious 300-Win Club (.555 win percent), and at 34 games above the .500 mark with just 52 contests remaining during the 2015 season, is poised to become the team's first-ever manager to lead the club to five straight winning seasons.

Tribe outfielder Jaff Decker helped pace tonight's milestone, collecting three hits and driving in a pair of runs. Starter Chris Volstad (6-4) worked into the sixth inning to earn his sixth Triple-A win of the year.

Toledo cut the lead to just two runs in the sixth frame before Tony Sanchez put the game out of a reach with a two-RBI double that capped a four-run eighth inning.


