Members young and old enjoy cat show

Anyone wanting to beat the Saturday afternoon heat at the Hamilton County 4-H Fair headed into the Exhibition Center.

They would've seen some furry friends, as the cat show took place that afternoon. A cat show may seem unlikely at a county 4-H Fair, but there have been several 10year members that have spent their entire career showing their feline companions.

"This is the only project that I've done for 10 years," said Shawn Piccock. The Carmel graduate was there with her cat, nine-year-old Buttercup. Piccock has been showing Buttercup for eight years; she showed another cat her first two years.

"It's really fun because you get to learn more and more as you go on, and how to better groom your cat," said Piccock, who turns 19 on July 27 and is headed to the University of Southern Indiana. "So I really liked it."

Piccock said Buttercup gets nervous. although she said the judges don't really see that when her cat is on the stage. Piccock has been the overall grand champion twice and also earned reserve champion honors

"Getting ready for the show, she knows when it's going to happen, so she goes and hides," said Piccock. "But other than that, she's totally fine with it."

Another 10-year-member is Rachel Bledsoe, who also just graduated from Carmel. She brought Max to the 4-H Fair for the first time, after years of showing another cat, Boomer. Max is 11 months old, Boomer is now 15.

Bledsoe said her vounger cat is "playful and energetic," although he was cool at the cat show Saturday.

"Max is just really calm, it's not really fazing him right now," said Bledsoe. "He's been asleep."

It's a different story at home, however. "He likes to get into things and climb and play with toys," said Bledsoe. "He wants to play with Boomer, and Boomer doesn't really like it."

Bledsoe, 18, will be going to IUPUI this fall. She has also enjoyed showing cats calling it a "very positive experience."

The next generation was also on display at the cat show. Brooke Daugherty will be a fourth-grader at Brooks School Elementary in Fishers, and she was at the show for the first time with her cat, Henry, who looked cool in a Hawaiian-themed cage.

"I was definitely nervous, but I think it went really well," said Daughtery, 9. She noted that Henry is a little shy.





Admission is free, donations are welcome. Patrons are also welcome to bring picnics and lawn chairs or blankets. More information is available at www.noblesvillearts.org












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Community First Bank opens in Noblesville

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



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Bud is 8 wins away from goal

The final numbers appear to be in the hand of Bud Wright, and the Sheridan football coach isn't talking. Well, not yet. Well, not much.

Entering the 2015 season, Wright is the winningest coach among those still coaching. He also is

Bud, a Sheridan graduate who played football for the Blackhawks, is about to enter his 50th season as Sheridan's coach. Overall, his 51st season coaching high school football.

Wright has won 392 games. That's No. 1 on the active coaches list. No. 2 is Russ Radtke of New Prairie with 324 victories. Should Wright retire today, which he won't, Radtke still is 68 wins behind. That's a lot of wins, considering regular seasons in football consist of just nine games. Then comes the playoff.

Just when you think Bud is about to retire, something special comes along. This season it's a group of strong, promising comes to football wins. sophomores.

Wright appears to be pumped. Again. But, Bud also likes to fish in Florida and now that son Kevin is coaching in Florida, well, who really knows.

Wright will say this. He wants to win 400 games. Then let the others chase. In

today's world, you probably won't see coaches staying in the game long enough to catch Bud Wright.

"That's my goal, winning 400 games," Wright told me this past week.

He needs eight. With this year's schedule, playing in the Hoosier Heartland Conference, reaching eight wins will be difficult. Bud Wright has accomplished lots of difficult tasks in his football coaching

So, this year, maybe next year, it won't be shocking if Bud reaches his goal.


Sheridan's home schedule this year at Bud Wright Stadium will include games with North White, Eastern and Taylor. On the road, Sheridan will play at Western Boone, Clinton Central, Carroll, Tri-Central and Tipton.

The big difference in the schedule this year is a regular-season playoff game based on the conference records.

Here's kind of something interesting in Wright's search for eight wins. Sheridan's last season to do that was 2012 when the Blackhawks went 9-2, losing to Lafayette Central Catholic in the semi-state. The Blackhawks won five games the next season and seven games last season.

Keating wins Boys State Junior Championship

One month ago, Noblesville's Josh Keating earned a spot on the All-State team after a top 10 performance at the IHSAA state golf finals at Prairie View Golf Course in Carmel

Last week, Keating led everyone in the state at The Hawthorns in Fishers. The recent Noblesville High School graduate won the Indiana Golf Association's Boys State Junior Championship, winning six rounds of match play to earn the trophy.

Keating, who will play college golf at IPFW, easily won his first three matches. He defeated Carter Goodson of Elkhart 4&3, Ethan Shepherd of Greenwood 4&2, and Cedric McAree of Fishers, 6&5.

Keating then beat Muncie's Blake Vise in the quarter-finals and Ryan Ward of Indianapolis in the semi-finals, both by scored of lup. In the final match, Keating beat Nicolas Ostenburg of Indianapolis, winning in 20 holes.

The win marked the second big championship for Keating in July. He triumphed in the Central Junior Masters tournament at Lebanon's Ulen Country Club, a two-day tournament that took place July 5-6. Keating was victorious by the score of 71-69=140, an even par score.

Keating led the 10 Hamilton County golfers that competed at the Junior Championship. Six of them made the Round of 16. Andrew Lewis, one of the Westfield High Zionsville, 2&1; lost to Blake Vise, Mun-School golfers that won the team state cie, 4&2 championship at Prairie View, reached the semi-finals.

Lewis' Shamrock teammate Timmy Hildebrand also got to the round of 16, along with Fishers' Cedric McAree and Jack Juskow, and Noblesville's Noah Lodin.


