Health Department gives tips after positive test for ...

West Nile Virus in Hamilton County

Hamilton The County Department's Division of Vector Control IR3535 to any exposed skin. confirmed today that the first mosquito sample of the season has tested positive for West Nile Virus (WNV). The sample was collected from the Meadowlark Park area in Carmel. The detection of WNV activity is evidence that the disease is present and the public should take proper precautions to stay protected. For optimum protection the Health Department recommends individuals:

1. Wear long sleeves, pants, socks, and shoes when outdoors.

2. Apply insect repellent containing DEET,

3. Keep mosquitoes outside by keeping doors and windows closed or making sure screens are in good repair.

4. Avoid outdoor activities at dusk and containers weekly. dawn, when the mosquitoes that transmit 5. Clean rain gutters. WNV are most active.

In addition, all Hamilton County resito eliminate mosquito breeding sites around their home:

As a response to the finding of WNV. the Health Department will increase its surveillance and control activities in the Meadowlark Park area. Adult mosquito fogging will be conducted to rapidly decrease the number of adult mosquitoes.



Coach Mitch Street believes he has the tools to rebuild the offense.

The quarterback returns. A senior this year, Ethan Jones passed for over 1,200 yards last season. Josh Feltz, as a sophomore, got in some solid varsity action.

The post-season schedule also will change with Hamilton Heights traveling


In doing so, Heights will exchange Four starters from the offensive line south toughies such as Guerin Catholic and Indian Creek with Twin Lakes and West Lafayette.

Newly married coach leads experienced Miller team

The biggest news with the Noblesville girls basketball team this summer didn't have anything to do with the players on the team.

The coach of the Millers is no longer named Donna Keck. That's because she got married on July 4, and is now Donna Buckley. Her new husband Chris Buckley works for the Indianapolis Colts, and of course saw Noblesville play a few times during last year's season.

"He's a big fan," said Donna Buckley.

The Millers gave their fans many reasons to cheer during the 2014-15 season, embarking on Noblesville's most successful season in years. The Millers finished 23-4, were undefeated Hoosier Crossroads Conference champions and won their first sectional championship since 1996. Noblesville's only losses were to Lawrence North (which won a Class 4A regional), Heritage Christian (2A state championships) and twice to Homestead (4A state runnerup).

The Millers graduated five seniors, and they will be hard to replace. But, the majority of Noblesville's team is back, and that includes seniors-to-be Katelyn O'Reilly and Alexis Shannon.

Both O'Reilly (The Reporter's girls basketball Player of the Year) and Shannon were named to the Indiana Junior All-Stars North team after the basketball season. Shannon averaged 19.3 points per game during last year's regular season, with O'Reilly pouring in 16.1 points per game. O'Reilly was also the county's top free-throw shooter (83 percent) and second-best rebounder (8.8 per game) during last year's regular season as well.


Buckley said that Shannon has verbally committed to Florida Atlantic University.

"They definitely had an awesome summer," said the coach, noting that both Shannon and O'Reilly "have continued to improve their games. We definitely look for them to help lead this team."

Noblesville will have plenty of senior leadership this year, with Haley Conway and Rachel Shipman back as well. Buckley said both have had great summers.

Returning juniors are Brooke Herron and Sam Salmon. Herron is a good 3-point shooter, making 33 percent of her shots last season. She was a member of last season's semistate qualifying Miller softball team, which gave her a late start in summer basketball. But Buckley said once Herron got back on the floor, "I think she played really well for us."

Salmon will be making the move up from junior varsi-



ty. "She is a really good shooter," said Buckley.

A sophomore coming back is Emily Kiser, who saw significant varsity time last year as a freshman. Buckley said that Kiser is "stepping into a new role" where the Millers are looking for her to score more. The coach also said that the 6-2 Kiser is drawing much interest from colleges.

Potential new faces on varsity include sophomore Olivia Morales, and four freshmen that played with the big girls: Madison Whetro, Maddie Knight, Mallory Johnson and Kaylin Mertens.

"They played well," said Buckley. "They did a nice job for us."

Buckley said Noblesville didn't play in too many tournaments over the summer. The Millers played four games in the Plainfield Shootout, with the host Quakers and Vincennes Rivet among the teams Noblesville played. 

Viewership Up for NBCSN's Iowa Telecast: NBCSN's prime-time telecast of the Iowa Corn 300 on July 18 drew an average viewership of 541,000, making it the network's most-watched Verizon Indy-Car Series race since 2011 at Baltimore.

It is the third consecutive NBCSN telecast of a Verizon IndyCar Series race this season that has attracted more than 500,000 viewers and shown dramatic growth in ratings and viewership compared to 2014.

Viewership of the action-packed race at the 0.894-mile Iowa Speedway was 22 percent higher than the 2014 race telecast and peaked at 650,000 viewers during the laterace duel between Ryan Hunter-Reay and Josef Newgarden for the victory. Hunter-Reay became the ninth different winner in 13 races this season and led a 1-4 finish by American drivers.

The July 12 telecast of the ABC Supply Wisconsin 250 at Milwaukee IndyFest (64 percent increase) and the June 27 telecast of the MAVTV 500 (82 percent increase) also recorded substantial viewership gains over 2014.

Average viewership and ratings for all Verizon IndyCar Series telecasts this season are up nearly 10 percent and a continuation of the growth in 2014, when INDYCAR experienced a 25 percent viewership gain over the previous year. With three races left, the Verizon Indy-Car Series championship remains up for grabs. Front-runner Juan Pablo Montoya of Team Penske holds a 42-point advantage over the surging Graham Rahal of Rahal Letterman Lanigan Racing. Three-time Verizon IndyCar Series champion Scott Dixon is 48 points out of first, while Team Penske's Helio Castroneves and reigning series champion Will Power also are in striking range. The championship has been decided in the final race for the past nine years, and the season-ending GoPro Grand Prix of Sonoma on Aug. 30 carries double points.
