

### Westfield **Fire debuts** digital media screens

Westfield is the first fire department in the country to use digital signage screens running the Public Safety Information Network (PSIN) for internal communications.

"The digital screens display all internal and external communications in one accessible location at each fire station," says Joe Lyons, Westfield Fire Chief. "This portal of information will arm firefighters with need-to-know information, so that they become more effective servants of public safety." The screens will display information ranging from apparatus maintenance schedules, shift vacancies, weather radar, department notes, social media feeds and daily activities. The monitors are also connected with Active 911 and display dispatch information in real-time, including a map of the location, and the route from the station. As part of its service, PSIN displays recent alarms on a map at every Westfield fire station.

## **Citizens Fire Academy**

Fishers Department of Fire and Emergency Services is excited to announce its next Citizens Fire Academy. This eight-week course will meet every Monday evening starting Sept. 14, and graduating on Nov. 2.

This course will give the participant a "behind the scenes" look at how the department operates, the reasons why firefighters do things a certain way, and why it takes so many firefighters to respond. Due to the dangerous high-risk nature firefighters can be exposed to when working with fire, students will not actually have the opportunity to perform hands-on in most cases. However, they will be exposed to many demonstrations for that "up-close" interaction.

To attend the Citizens Fire Academy, you must be at least 16 years of age, and a citizen of Fishers. To participate is free but due to the large response to this class, we ask only those that can commit to the 8 weeks apply. The class is shared between class room, training grounds and field trips and is a rain or shine event.



## Attracting the best and brightest teachers

Recent news reports have raised concerns about a decline in the number of new teachers who have obtained teaching licenses in Indiana over the past four years. These concerns are valid and are worthy of action.

My career in education spanned 40 years, including roles as a teacher, principal and superintendent. With this background, I have a deep understanding of how important it is to attract the best and brightest individuals to provide a high quality education for every Hoosier student.

Fortunately, some action has already has been taken to address the issue of teacher shortages. As a member of the Education Committee, I worked on legislation this year to attract more STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Mathematics) teachers. I voted to establish a program to permit individuals with a STEM major and an education minor to obtain a teaching license.

Although the 2015 legislative session is complete, interim study committees continue to meet throughout the summer and fall to discuss proposals for potential legislation that may be introduced during the 2016 session. I was recently appointed to serve on the Education Study Committee, which will allow me the opportunity to continue working on similar issues that I studied during session.

I am committed to working with my colleagues to address the issue of teacher shortages so that the next generation of Hoosier children can receive a high quality education. 

## New and familiar faces for Golden Eagles

Dilley said this about his team as the summer winds down, something that many football coaches understand as they prepare for a new season:

"Some new faces in some new places," said the coach, who is entering his second year as the head of the Golden Eagles' program.

But there are also some familiar faces who will be on the GC sidelines. They will give the team some continuity from last year's Guerin squad that finished 9-4 and won a sectional championship.

The returners include seniors such as tight end Isaac Fettig, right tackle Matthew Hook, safety Brennan Thieneman and wide receiver Arion Shinaver, all of whom are co-captains. Shinaver will be making a return to the team after injuring his ACL during the last week of the regular season. Dilley said the Golden Eagles "missed him throughout the playoffs," but reported that Shinaver "is back and looks good as new."

Other seniors returning include tight end Dax Schanse and corner Dawson Mc-Mahon. Senior Jack Sahm was a starter on the defensive line; Dilley said that Sahm is "a little banged up right now," but hopefully will be able to play.

One big role to fill will be that of quarterback. Matt Labus was a star for opponents this season. Dilley said that a junior, Elliott Charlebois, will be the starting quarterback for this season.

"We have some juniors that are returning starters as well," said Dilley. That Guerin Catholic football coach Tom includes Carter McGinnis, who played tailback for the Golden Eagles last year. Will Bates started at guard, while Joe Boise was one of the starting offensive linemen.

> Dilley said the team went to a Bishop/Dullaghan team camp over the summer, and scrimmaged opponents such as Munster, Merrillville, Warsaw, Lebanon and Delta. The coach is pleased with how things are progressing over the summer.

> "I think we've gotten a pretty good amount of work done," said Dilley. "The execution's getting a little better. People are getting comfortable with what we're doing. We're just kind of not wholesale changes or anything, but just kind of building on things we did last year."

> As the summer wraps up and the season begins, the Golden Eagles will get a week off, "just to kind of charge their batteries back up," said Dilley.
