


Demolition has stopped on the site of the former Farm Bureau Co-op grain processing complex in Noblesville. The work stopped because the Noblesville Preservation Alliance and Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development (HAND) have come forward with a proposal to redevelop the South 8th Street site for housing and the saving of portions of the old grain facility.

The unique idea is to save a section of the grain elevator and incorporate it with new multi-family. The plan does not have anything to do with the giant silos which are already largely demolished, only the wooden elevator structure which is well over 100 years old, and the possible moving of the original mill office facing 9th Street.

Nate Lichty, Executive Director of HAND, says plans are in the works to submit an application for rezoning and a development plan for the two-acre site. If approved by City Planning officials, an

application will be sent to state officials in November for a grant to purchase the site and build 30 to 60 housing units. He says state housing officials have been receptive to other such projects.

The multi-family housing facility would incorporate elements of the old grain structure either as an entry point or other feature of the design. Preservation officials say the old structure would serve as a visible reminder of Noblesville history when grain milling was the city's largest employer. The Noblesville Milling Company, started in post-Civil War times, was responsible for the name Noblesville Mill-

Lichty says the plan is an "exciting opportunity" to provide housing for folks employed in the downtown area or in the newly renovated Noblesville foundry. Both areas are within walking distance of the site. There could also be parking provided for those attending functions at the historic Model Mill just north of the proposed proj-

He says the plans also fit with city efforts to redevelop South 8th Street and rejuvenate the Southwest Quad, something city officials have been considering since last year. Mike Corbett, an officer with Noblesville Preservation, says he hopes all groups involved can bring the plans to reality as rapidly as possible. He sees no reason to hold up remaining demolition of the grain silos and other clearing at the site with the exception of the elevator.



(Guilkey) King in Noblesville, Indiana.



Noblesville teen runs on to the field at Reds game

wound up winning many new fans on social media by making good on his portion of the dare.

Justin Buchanan, 19, ran on the field during a Cincinnati Reds-Chicago Cubs game Wednesday at Cincinnati's Great American Ball Park. Buchanan's actions made for a ton of Twitter fun, but he could also be facing some legal trouble.

Buchanan's field run was planned, and he didn't try to hide it on his Twitter account. In fact, one of his friends announced in a Tweet right before 5 p.m. that Buchanthe first out of the eighth inning, so everyone knew when to watch.

At 8:53 p.m., Buchanan tweeted "Here captured on video by two camera phones that were later posted onto social media one by Buchanan himself.

The other video was from a fan in the stands, and it showed Buchanan leap over the left field stands and dash across the outfield. He appeared to stop for a second to greet Reds outfielder Billy Hamilton. In Buchanan's video, one can hear him say later admitted to Cincinnati television sta-"not the nicest."

Buchanan eventually found his way back to Noblesville - he didn't run, he was driven home - and seemed to bask in his newfound social media fame.

However, there is a serious side to Buchanan's field run. WCPO talked with Cincinnati Police Sgt. Greg Lewton, who is in charge of the Reds' security detail, and he said that Buchanan's run is a first-degree misdemeanor. In fact, Buchanan was an was indeed going to make his run - after charged with criminal trespassing, which is punishable by up to 180 days in jail and/or a \$1,000 fine.





Fire damages home in Fishers

Fishers Firefighters responded to a report of a garage fire on Creekview Lane around 11 p.m. Thursday evening.

Upon arrival, firefighters found heavy fire in the garage extending into the second floor. The home's residents, a husband and wife and their two young children escaped unharmed. Smoke detectors were working in the house and activated.

Twenty-two firefighters had the fire out in 36 minutes. There are no estimates on damage at this time, but the house experienced heavy smoke and fire damage. The cause is under investigation but early reports indicate the fire started in the garage.

Firefighters were able to rescue the family's turtle and lizard.

Japanese wrestlers come to Carmel

Summers for the Carmel USA Wrestling Club have had an international flavor recently.

This summer alone, the Carmel Club has hosted two teams from different sides of Asia. In June, the CUSAWC welcomed a team from Turkey, and this past week, the club hosted a team from Gunma Prefecture in Japan. Prefectures are equivalent to states in the USA; Gunma is located in the central part of Japan.

The Japanese wrestlers, along with their coach, Shinji Morise, and an interpreter, arrived in Indiana at 5:45 a.m. Tuesday. Carmel coach Ed Pendoski noted that the travel time was rather long: The wrestlers flew 10 hours to get from Japan to Los Angeles, then another four hours to make it to Indiana. Some of the Carmel wrestlers traveled to Japan last summer as part of the Indiana State Wrestling Association's Cultural Exchange, so they were aware how involved the travel is.

"We had today scheduled kind of free, because we knew going there, you're pretty tired after traveling for 20 hours," said Pendoski.

But the Japanese wrestlers said they weren't tired.

"And so we went shopping, and then we went and had a pool party, and all the Japanese kids fell asleep at the pool," said Pendoski.

Everyone was awake by the evening,

and the Japanese wrestlers joined their Carmel counterparts for a practice at Carmel High School. Pendoski conducted the class, while Morise observed and videotaped.

"I will distribute to their parents, be-

"I will distribute to their parents, because they don't know what's going on," said Morise through an interpreter. "And then we can show them how we practice in Indiana."

Morise said that participating in the Cultural Exchange is "a valuable experience," and that students will "learn a lot from this, and utilize the experience for their future." The students get a chance to sightsee around Carmel and the Indianapolis area, participate in a competition at Zionsville Community High School, and also stay at a host family's house during the week. Morise said that since they are houseguests, they must learn to communicate in English.

"In Japan, there's not a lot of opportunity to communicate in English," said Morise.


