Two men sought in SR 19 robbery

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office is requesting assistance from the public in locating and apprehending two suspects involved in a Sunday night robbery.

At 9:50 p.m. the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office responded to an armed robbery in the 22200 block of State Road 19, about a mile south of Cicero. The female victim stated she was driving north on State Road 19 when a black truck suddenly stopped in front of her.

The male occupants of the truck exited their vehicle with firearms and both pointed their weapons at the victim. One suspect stood in front of the car while the other approached the victim, removed her from her vehicle, and struck her about the face before entering the vehicle and ransacking her belongings. The suspects then left at a high rate of speed continuing north on State Road 19.

The victim described one suspect as 6'4" or taller with unknown skin color and the second suspect as 5'6"-6' with unknown skin color. Both suspects were dressed in black clothing and ski masks. The truck was described as a dark color Chevrolet truck with a lift kit and the word "CHEVROLET" printed on the tailgate.

An undisclosed amount of money and prescription medications were taken from the victim, who sustained bruising on her face but refused medical treatment.

Noblesville Works to be announced Friday

Noblesville city, schools, business and community leaders have collaborated to create a new initiative, Noblesville Works, that will help citizens get to work – find jobs and retain jobs. It also is the first community-wide initiative of its kind in the State of Indiana.

The event is scheduled for 10 to 10:30 a.m. Friday at the Council Chambers in Noblesville City Hall, 16 S. 10th St.

Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear will be joined by Noblesville Schools Superintendent Dr. Beth Niedermeyer, Workforce Development Council and members of the Noblesville community and business leaders.

Sheridan Community Schools' Superintendent Dr. David Mundy announced the district's next steps in being a full-service community provider through Sheridan Community Schools' Blackhawk Care Program.

Starting with the 2015-16 school year the district will now manage and run a fully staffed before and after school care program for elementary and middle school aged students. The program will be located at Sheridan Elementary School and staffed by Sheridan Community Schools employees.

Blackhawk Care will start with before and after school programs and will expand into a summer daycare experience for those who wish to participate in the summer of 2016. For families who cannot find child care through the various holidays and ex-

- tended breaks, the program will also be available for a family's convenience.

- About Blackhawk Care:
1. Childcare hours will be 6:45 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., excluding school hours.
 2. Childcare will be available on all regular school days, conference days, half days and during holiday breaks.
 3. Childcare will not be available on Labor Day, Memorial Day, over Thanksgiving Break, on Christmas Eve day or Christmas, on New Year's Eve day or New Year's, on President's Day, or on Martin Luther King Day (unless any of these days are used for snow make-up).
 4. Summer and holiday care are offered in addition to the full school year care program for our families who do not need care on school days.
 5. Discount rates will be given for each sibling of an enrolled child.
 6. Financial assistance may be available and is based on local and government funding guidelines.

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“Pocket Park” under construction in downtown Noblesville

Noblesville Parks & Recreation has a new project underway in downtown Noblesville. A project not found anywhere else in the city. A “Pocket Park”, defined by Wikipedia as “a small park accessible to the general public that are frequently created on a single vacant lot.” The City of Noblesville is doing just that.

Located behind Bolden’s Cleaners on the walkway that runs between Forest Park and the Riverwalk into downtown is the new Riverwalk Depot, the official name of the “pocket park”. According to city officials the park will include a walking path, a covered bench and two specific components to increase the functionality for cyclists - a bicycle repair station and a sculptural bicycle rack. It is being built by the City of Noblesville, with assistance from Duke Energy Foundation and Sagamore Ready Mix. Grand opening for Riverwalk Depot will be held Friday, Oct. 2.

Parking Task Force survey mailed to homeowners

The Parking Task Force is seeking input from the public as it works to collect and review information that will shape the recommendations it presents to city leaders on short- and long-term improvements to the downtown parking situation in Noblesville.

The task force has created a 10-question survey which will be mailed directly to all homes inside the group’s focus area of Wayne Street to the north, 16th Street to the east, the White River to the west, and Division Street to the south. Those surveys were mailed Monday, July 27.


The survey also may be completed online at www.cityofnoblesville.org for those who do not live in the focus area but would like to share their thoughts on downtown parking. All surveys are asked to be completed by August 10.

“While we’ve had public meetings and hosted an open house, we want to make sure we’ve reached out to everyone to state their opinion,” said Rick Taylor, Noblesville Common Council president and task force member. “This is such a hot-button topic that we are seeking input from many citizens and businesses as possible. We want to be thorough and offer a number of outlets for the public to express themselves.”

A second survey for the business community also is available online at www.cityofnoblesville.org. Noblesville Chamber of Commerce President Bob DuBois, who is heading the Parking Task Force, said assistance is available for those that need it in completing or returning the survey. For more information, call 773-0086.

The survey includes questions about the two-hour parking limit, metered parking, issues and priorities in the study area, and ways to improve the parking situation.

“We’re asking for a little more feedback from the taxpayers. One of the questions asks, ‘Are you willing to fund a parking garage?’ This lets us know where everyone is at because if they want us to build it, it will come with a price tag,” Taylor said.



Mayor John Ditslear, in cooperation with the Noblesville Common Council, appointed a Parking Task Force to examine current conditions in the downtown area and make recommendations for short- and long-term improvements to the parking experience. Your input is central to the work of the task force.

The Parking Task Force is reviewing hard data related to regulations, patterns, capacity, demand, accessibility, signage and the enforcement process. It also is listening to comments, concerns and suggestions of residents and businesses. Together, the information collected and reviewed will shape the recommendations of the Parking Task Force to city leaders.

We invite you to complete this survey and return it by August 10th to City Hall or one of the many alternative drop-off sites*. If you require assistance in completing or returning the survey, you may visit the Hamilton East Public Library or call the Noblesville Chamber of Commerce at 317-773-0086. Mayor John Ditslear created the Parking Task Force in February to examine and address concerns that have been expressed about parking in downtown Noblesville. The Task Force consists of representatives from the City of Noblesville, Noblesville Chamber of Commerce, Noblesville Main Street, Noblesville Common Council, and downtown business owners, merchants and residents.

Since its formation, the group has compiled and is evaluating a master list of parking issues expressed by the public and other stakeholders. It also is reviewing hard data related to regulations, patterns, capacity, demand, accessibility, signage and the enforcement process. The goal after the survey is to create various options to help solve parking concerns.

“While we cannot solve each concern to everyone’s satisfaction, we are working together to create solutions that address the biggest issues identified by the community,” DuBois said.

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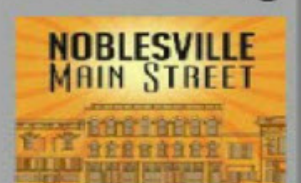

Do you see the statistician’s hand at work? Jessica Springman’s hand-drawn patterns and intricate designs are sure to have visitors taking a closer-than-usual look during her August Showcase Artist show inside the Stephenson House on the Nickel Plate Arts campus, Aug. 1-31 (Wednesday-Friday, 12-5 p.m., and Saturday, 10 a.m.-5 p.m.). Meet Springman during a free reception on **Aug. 21, 6-9 p.m.**

Jessica Springman was born an artist, but it took decades for her to find balance where the artist and analyst in her could co-exist and surface as her defining art style. The mother of two worked as a statistician and database programmer for some of the world’s largest media and market research firms before the artist in her really resurfaced.

Local Fishers art lover and friend Greg Farrell coined Springman’s style “Vennism,” defined by “breaking apart multivariate reality into constituent and relational elements as separated and nested 2-D representations.”

Everything Springman draws or cuts is done entirely by hand using nothing more than a ruler, compass, pencil and pen. She rarely sketches. She sees the finished image in her mind. The challenge, and excitement, is figuring out how to faithfully render her visions on paper. The mathematics behind her art is intense, but the result pushes her as an artist to find correlation between stark

geometry and the irregularities (and color) of “life.”

NFD responds to two Sunday calls

The Noblesville Fire Department responded to two calls Sunday.

At approximately 5:35 pm, Noblesville Fire suppression units were dispatched to 1384 Conner St. The home owner, Toni Gooding, called 9-1-1 to report that there was a strange smell inside her home. Upon investigating the incident, fire suppression personnel discovered smoke in the attic.

Additional fire units were dispatched to help extinguish the fire. It took fire crews approximately 30 minutes to

mitigate the incident. The fire originated at an electrical connection in the attic and caused approximately \$30,000 in damage.

A couple hours later, at approximately 8:20 pm, the Noblesville Fire Department was dispatched to a residence fire located at 380 Pebble Brook Circle.

The home owners, Kevin and Barbara Stuckwisch, stated that a thunderstorm was in the area prior to them discovering the fire. Mrs. Stuckwisch stated that she believes the home was struck by lightning. At 8:25 pm, fire

units arrived on the scene with smoke and flames showing from the roof of the structure. Fire suppression crews made an interior attack on the fire, and had the incident under control in approximately 20 minutes.

The fire originated in the attic of the residence. There is evidence that lightning struck the roof of the structure. The estimated damage to the structure, and contents is approximately \$40,000.

There were no injuries in either fire.

Firefighter alerts NFD to Tuesday morning blaze

A Noblesville Fire Department firefighter alerted the NFD to a fire at the Don Marr Mobile Home Park Tuesday morning.

As Firefighter Brumbaugh drove into the mobile home park he witnessed the homeowner, Wayne Underwood, exiting the structure. Firefighter Brumbaugh assisted Mr. Underwood to a safe area where they waited for fire suppression crews to arrive.

At 7:12 a.m., fire suppression crews arrived to see smoke and flames showing from the south side of the mobile home. An attack on the fire had the incident under control at 7:41 a.m.

The fire originated in a bedroom. The circumstances surrounding the fire include the use of an oxygen machine, a C-PAP breathing unit, and incense burning. The occupant stated he saw the hoses from the oxygen machine and C-PAP burning. Those items were next to the incense he had burning on a table in the bedroom.

The fire caused approximately \$15,000 in damage. There were no injuries.

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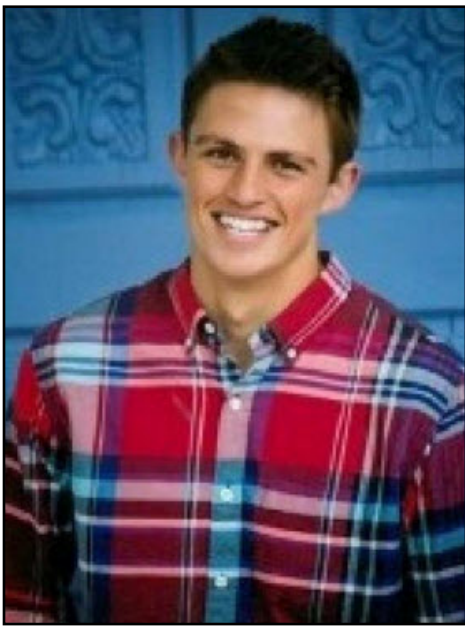

Fadeaway jumper clinches victory...

Fever wins in OT, Catchings moves into career scoring second place

Tamika Catchings' fadeaway jumper with 6.5 seconds left in overtime was the exclamation point to a 75-73 victory Tuesday night as the Indiana Fever withstood a second-half rally to defeat the Connecticut Sun.

The Fever snapped a two-game losing slide while beating the Sun on the road for the second time this season, but it was Catchings' first and final buckets that will grab headlines.

Three days ago, Catchings became the WNBA's career scoring leader in All-Star history. Tonight, just 38 seconds into the contest, she passed Diana Taurasi as the WNBA's second-leading regular season scorer as her 3-pointer helped Indiana streak to an early 11-0 advantage.

Already the league's career leader in steals and free throws, Catchings had 15 points and also finished with eight rebounds to pull within 33 of passing Tina Thompson as the league's No. 2 all-time rebounder. Her five steals were a season-high.

Catchings and Shavonte Zellous guided the Fever into their first overtime contest of the season, snapping the Sun's unbeaten streak of three overtime wins. The Sun, after starting the year 7-1, have lost seven of the past eight including two to Indiana.

Off the bench, Zellous paced Indiana with 19 points on 9-of-17 shooting. She twice beat the shot-clock buzzer in overtime to stake Indiana to a 71-67 lead.

"Z brings us experience and poise," said Fever coach Stephanie White. "She was very poised and under control in overtime. She hit some big shots."

Kelsey Bone's three-point play brought the Sun within 71-70 and Camille Little's 3-pointer put the home team into the lead for just the second time of the game, with 1:52 remaining in OT.

Catchings scored the game's final two buckets, though. First, she knotted the score with a reverse layup, then, after corralling a defensive rebound, she cradled the ball for a timeout with 33 seconds left.

Zellous appeared on the verge of extending the narrow lead with free throws when she was fouled on an offensive rebound and tip with 18.6 seconds to play, but the common foul was ruled before her shot. It was her only rebound of the game, but perhaps the game's largest.

Indiana retained possession with a 14-second shot clock and Catchings canned her game-winner as she entered the lane and knocked down the 8-foot jumper for the 6,735th point of her career.

With the win, Indiana (9-8) leapfrogged past the Sun (8-8) into fourth place in the Eastern Conference standings.

"We really tried to be more aggressive down the stretch," said Catchings. "Coach put the ball in my hand and spread the court. Thankfully, I found a shot I liked."

"Records are meant to be broken," she replied when asked of passing Taurasi, "that's why they're there. But it's pretty cool for now. It's kind of overwhelming."

"She saw the help defender," said White of Catchings' final play. "She's a pro. She knocked it down when we needed it most."

Indiana matched a season high with 13 offensive rebounds, leading to 21 second-chance points compared to just four by Connecticut. The Fever's 35-31 rebound advantage was led by Catchings and another eight from Erlana Larkins, who also added four steals. Shenise Johnson added 13 points and seven rebounds in her first game since July 10. Rookie Natalie Achonwa netted eight points in her return from the Pan Am Games where she helped her native Canada to a gold medal.

"I felt like our energy and effort were good all the way through," added White, whose team played with 12 healthy players for the first time in 17 games. "I thought our toughness showed."

After Indiana led from the opening tip, Connecticut used an 18-7 streak to knot the score at 63 with 6:14 remaining. Connecticut forced the Fever into consecutive shot clock violations, then took its first lead of the contest on Bone's layin with 3:50 to play. Larkins knotted the score for Indiana 11 seconds later and Natasha Howard put the Fever back into the lead, 67-65, as the game entered its final stretch of regulation.

Bone tied the score again at 67 with 1:10 to play. After misses on each end, Indiana called timeout to call a final play, but Connecticut forced another shot clock infraction with 4.7 seconds left. Alex Bentley's 3-point attempt was off the mark as regulation came to a close.

Buoyed by its 11-point head start, Indiana led 42-34 at the break behind nine points from Johnson. The Fever rebuilt its 11-point advantage with an 8-0 run in the third quarter sparked by Zellous. But the Sun matched that spurt with eight of their own. Indiana took a 60-54 lead into the fourth quarter.

The Fever hosts New York at Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis, Wednesday at 7:00 p.m.
