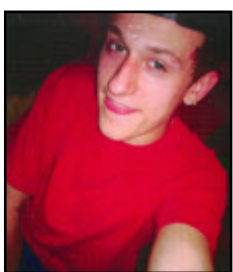

Township Trustee to seek Hamilton County Council at-large seat

Jeff Hern, Fall Creek Township Trustee, announced today that he is formally seeking a seat on the Hamilton County Council. Hern, along with his wife Kathy, and their three children reside in Fishers, where he has served his community as trustee since 2011.

As executive of the township, Hern has worked diligently for the residents of Fall Creek Township with a fiscally conservative hand since taking office. In his first

year in office, he took the Township to a debt-free status where it remains today. He has consistently lowered the tax rate (12.56% reduction since 2011). He has improved fire protection by purchasing a tanker truck, ambulance and rescue boat for the Fishers Fire Department with absolutely no debt. Hern has formed partnerships within the community with Youth Assistance Program and HSE Schools Vocational Adult programs. Under his guidance, the Town-

ship has developed other programs such as the annual backpack program, financial classes, coat drives, etc. without using tax dollars. In 2014, Hern initiated a \$193,500 restoration of 6 abandoned cemeteries and secured the purchase of two park properties with an overage of taxes collected from a previous administration.

Presley Boulevard construction to affect Pleasant Street traffic

The City of Noblesville is beginning the first phase of construction for the Presley Boulevard extension next week. As a result of this work, traffic will be impacted on Pleasant Street for a short period of time as a roundabout is constructed. The work has been separated into three continuous steps with a fourth coming at a time to be determined:

Step A – On Monday, Aug. 10, Pleasant Street traffic will be shifted to the two lanes

north of the median to complete the downstream pipe crossings/connection. This is expected to last at most six days.

Step B – Immediately following the completion of Step A, Pleasant Street traffic will be shifted to two lanes south of the median to build the north half of the roundabout. This work is anticipated to take 45 days to complete.

Step C – A 14-day full closure will take place on Pleasant Street for construction of

the south half of the roundabout from Mercantile Boulevard to Union Chapel Road. A detour route will be posted utilizing Mercantile Boulevard to Town & Country Boulevard to Union Chapel Road.

Step D – At a later time, Pleasant Street will have three consecutive 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. daytime closures for asphalt surface and markings. Flaggers will be available at the

Westfield Parks releases TRUSTEE second quarter report

Westfield's parks department is wrapping up its mid-year programming and is seeing excellent results.

Major events for this first half of 2015 included National Trails Day, Westfield Rocks the 4th and Community Plant Day. Other programming included Bingo Brunch, Yoga in the Park, cooking classes and the Movies in the Park summer series. The department also saw a record turnout for this year's Arbor Day tree seedling giveaway on April 25, in which 500 seedlings were given away in under 20 minutes.

"What we've seen from the community this year is that parks are becoming increasingly important in people's daily lives," said Parks Director Melody Jones. "From our trails to events to the parks themselves, Westfield residents and visitors are able to experience a great quality of life thanks to

the hard work of parks staff and our wonderful volunteers."

According to the report, the department saw a 138% increase in programming since last year, as well as record-breaking increases in revenues. The department has also seen an increase in trail expansions this year, with 74% of surveyed trail users listing the Monon as their favorite trail.

The parks department's next major event will be Voices from the Past, a guided walking tour of historic sites in downtown Westfield. Attendees will meet actors portraying notable residents from Westfield's past. Those interested in attending can [purchase tickets here](#).

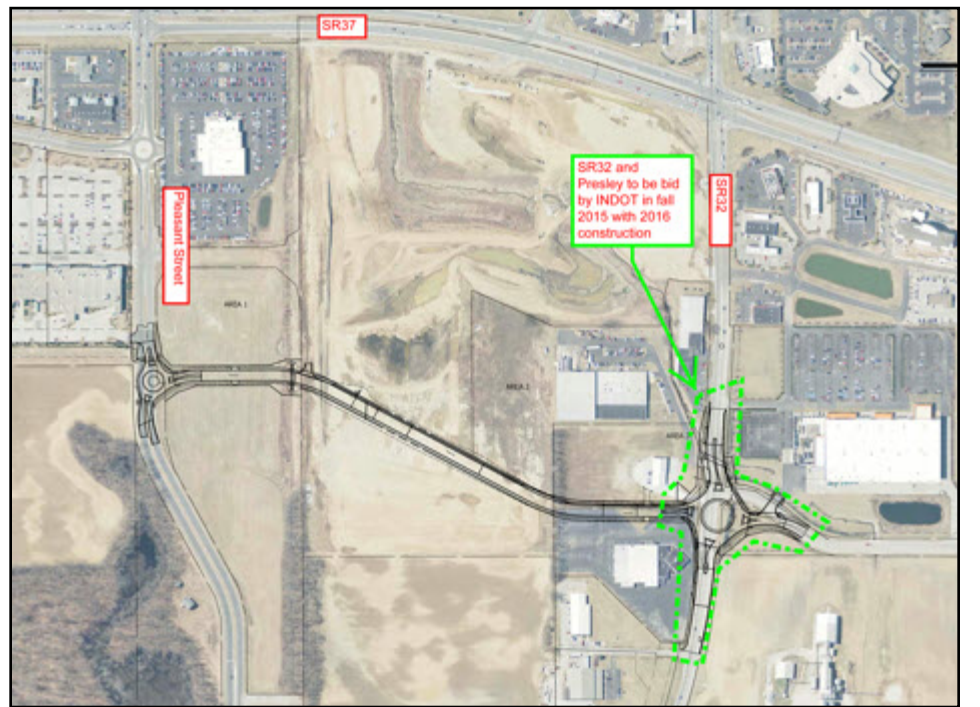

day time closure to assist in directing traffic.

Advance notice signs and/or message boards will be posted prior to the traffic

shifts and closures. Access will be maintained to all homes and businesses throughout the construction process.

Presley Boulevard will run parallel to Ind. 37. It will connect Pleasant Street to Ind. 32 with roundabouts at each end when

completed in 2016. The first phase is expected to cost \$2,150,000.

"Presley Boulevard will be another opportunity for motorists to access commercial development and retail stores. I know Union Chapel Road, which also has helped alleviate traffic on Ind. 37, has seen 5,000 cars per day since it opened," said City Project Manager Jim Hellmann.

The second phase is the roundabout at Ind. 32, which will be overseen by the Indiana Dept. of Transportation. Hellmann said that project is expected to go out for bid in November with construction in late spring 2016.

"We have to have the roundabout in place because Pleasant Street will be a detour route when the state is working on the other roundabout," Hellmann said.

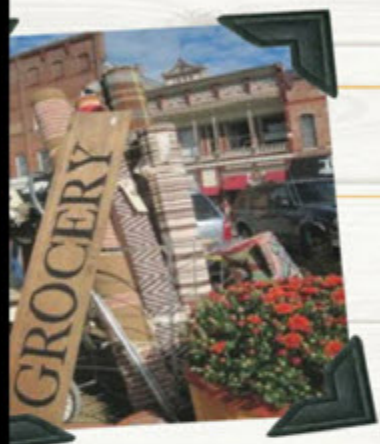

Dr. Scott Miller visits Sheridan Rotary

The Sheridan Rotary Club welcomed local optometrist Dr. Scott Miller to our Tuesday meeting as our guest speaker. Dr. Miller divides his office time between the Sheridan office and the office in Crawfordsville but since he lives in Noblesville he hopes business here in Sheridan picks up enough to allow him to work full-time right here in our community which is much closer to home for him.

Dr. Miller began by speaking about optometry as a profession. The Rotarians were surprised to learn that there is currently a nationwide shortage of optometrists, with as many as 80 class spots alone open right here in Indiana at the IU School of Optometry each year. He pointed out that it is really a great profession and provides a great deal of satisfaction to those who practice in it. Other parts of his talk dealt with the technological advancements in eye care that have occurred over the past couple of decades and the promises for more and better treatments in the future.

Sheridan Rotarians have formal meetings on the 1st and 3rd Tuesdays of each month and usually include an interesting speaker from the local community or surrounding area. The program portion of each meeting is open to the public and begins at 7:00 pm; it does not require any advance registration to attend. The Tuesday, August 18th program will feature a guest speaker from Partnership for a Healthy

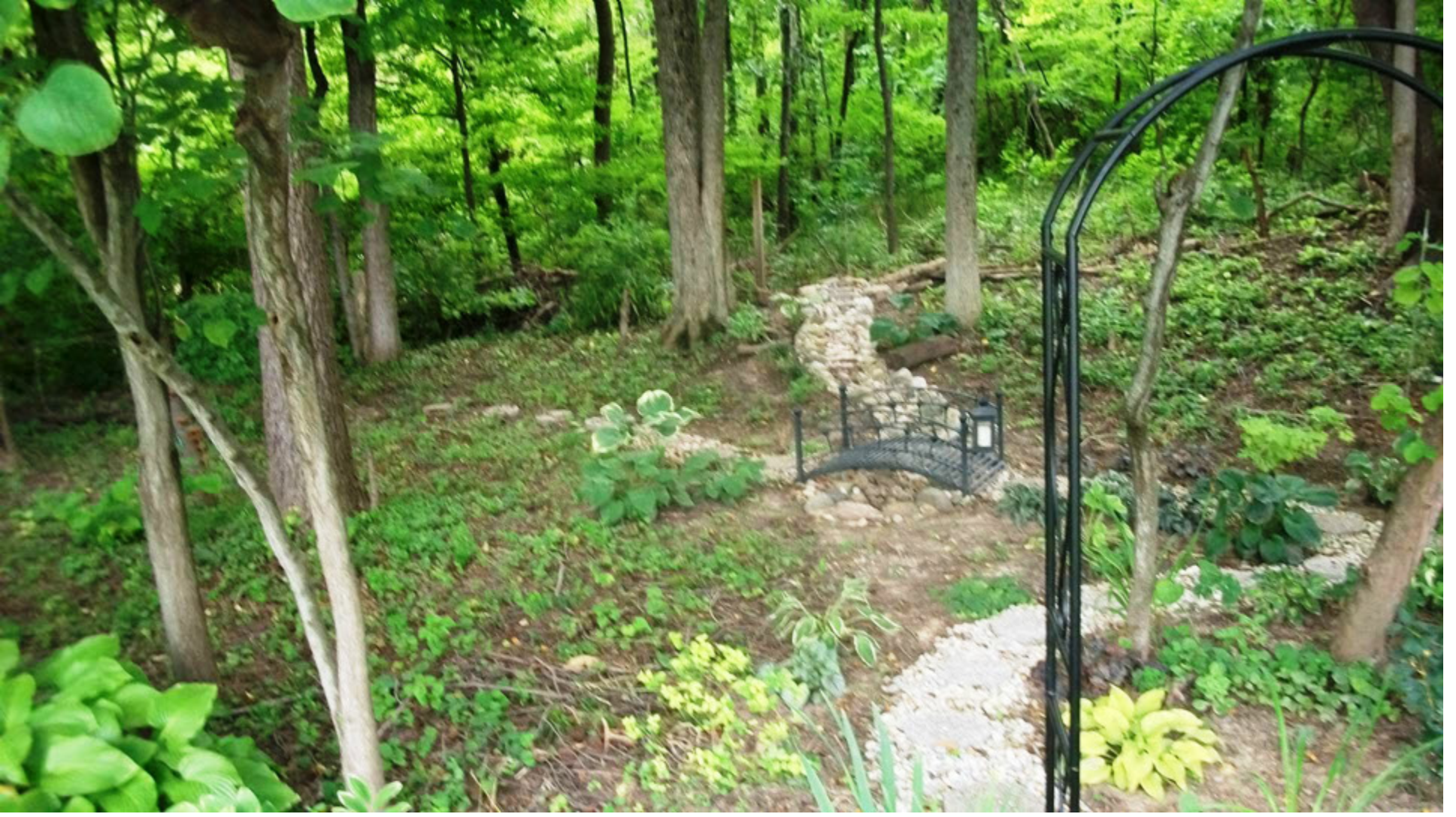

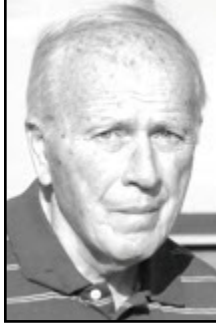
Summer basketball.....

Different game 50 years ago

First of a Series

Each summer as we've covered high school basketball in The Reporter, I think back to how it was years ago. Maybe, for example, 50 years ago.



Today, summer basketball for high school teams and their coaches is during the month of June. In July coaches cut loose their players for AAU ball.

Back when, coaches weren't allowed by the IHSAA to work with their players. Some towns, not all, formed their own home-town, AAU-type teams.

Noblesville had a team, mainly through the efforts of Dick Hutson. I've written about Dick. When he graduated from NHS, Hutson held the school career record. Believe it or not, it was less than 600 points.

Dick graduated the summer before Glen Harper came to coach the Millers. He missed playing for Harper during all those championship years. But, others who played with

Hutson on those summer teams did play for Harp. Many stories have been written about Jack Clark and Jan Robinson (both no longer living) that first year Harper was here.

My memory not being a strong point today, I went to Hutson, now retired and living in Chicago, for some help on summer basketball back then. I found that Dick's memory may not be much better than mine, but together we'll try to struggle through this story.

"I don't know when summer basketball began," Hutson began, "but I know the tourney at North Webster was among the first.

"Once we formed a team it was very difficult every summer to get a sponsor, funding from local merchants to help us pay for uniforms, entry fees and travel expenses. I remember that Don Porter at Porter Goodyear did help. I remember personally going around town trying to get help and I think John Tener did, too. None of us had any money to spare."

The core Noblesville teams for years was Clark, Robinson, Tener, Bill Butler and Hutson. Ernie Butler played one year and arguably was the team's best player that summer. Later on Dave Porter played and so did Bob Butler, Jim Knotts, Robbie Goble, Norm Ault and then later Arb Campbell, Jimmy Camp and Bill Kitchens.

"Larry Sapper would sub for just pick-up games at Second Ward School and so did Mike Casey," Hutson said. "We usually had only 5-8 players for tourneys, which was not good, except we got a lot of playing time.

"Eventually, we played all over the state, mostly up north," Hutson continued. "We played in tourneys on hot black asphalt courts, usually in city parks like at Logan-sport. That was the biggest and best tourney. North Webster was the first. We played at Zionsville and at Lebanon, tourneys which drew lots of players from the Indianapolis area. We didn't make all the tourneys, especially those up north. We had to get home in time to go to work the next day.

"There were teams playing from Marion and Logan-sport and Lafayette and Ft. Wayne, and Frankfort, Warsaw and Elkhart. Most teams were loaded with local players who played for Division 1, 2 and 3 college teams. Many of the players were highly recognized from around the state, including some Indiana All-Stars.

"All of this was before the now organized AAU and Travel All-Star teams with full-time paid coaches. For our games, sometimes college coach would show up, but not often."

Carmel graduate combines passions for tennis and service...

Fletchall wins Helen Shockley Award

Everyone knows that recent Carmel graduate Molly Fletchall is a great tennis player.

She's also a great person, someone who enjoys helping others. Fletchall co-founded the Special Olympics of Hamilton County tennis program in 2013, and it has grown steadily over the past two years.

"It's just so great that I'm able to combine my passion of tennis and passion of serving others in this program," said Fletchall.

Her dedication to serving others has gotten noticed not just in Hamilton County, but also in the Midwest. During a Special Olympic session Thursday evening at the Carmel Racquet Club, Fletchall was presented with the 2015 Helen Shockley Award.

Fletchall started the program two years ago, during her sophomore year at Carmel, and asked her friends to help out with it. During that first summer there were 18 athletes in the program.

That number grew to 25 the next summer, and 32 this summer. Fletchall said that "it's really cool just to see the growth and

NBCSN's same-day broadcast Aug. 2 of the Honda Indy 200 at Mid-Ohio drew an average viewership of 666,000, making it the most-watched Verizon IndyCar Series race on the network since NBC Sports Group acquired INDYCAR cable exclusivity in 2008.

It also marked the first time that four consecutive Verizon IndyCar Series race telecasts on the network each surpassed 500,000 viewers, continuing the trend of growth in viewership and ratings compared to 2014. Viewership was also up dramatically over 2014 for the races at Iowa Speedway (22 percent growth), The Milwaukee Mile (66 percent growth) and Auto Club Speedway (83 percent growth).

Average viewership for all Verizon IndyCar Series telecasts this season are up nearly 10 percent and represent a continuation of the growth in 2014, when INDYCAR experienced significant gains in ratings and viewership over the previous year.

Viewership of the NBCSN broadcast of the Honda Indy 200 at Mid-Ohio eclipsed coverage of the Edmonton race in 2011 (642,000) and was the most-watched Verizon IndyCar Series telecast on cable TV since the 2008 race at Sonoma Raceway (685,000; ESPN2).

The Honda Indy 200 at Mid-Ohio, won by Ohio native Graham Rahal 30 years after his father, Bobby, won an Indy car race on the same Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course, was broadcast live earlier in the day on CNBC.

In total, the Aug. 2 telecasts on CNBC and NBCSN drew 838,000 viewers.
