"Presley Boulevard will be another opportunity for motorists to access commercial development and retail stores. I know Union Chapel Road, which also has helped alleviate traffic on Ind. 37, has seen 5,000 cars per day since it opened," said City Project Manager Jim Hellmann.

The second phase is the roundabout at Ind. 32, which will be overseen by the Indiana Dept. of Transportation. Hellmann said that project is expected to go out for bid in November with construction in late spring 2016.

"We have to have the roundabout in place because Pleasant Street will be a detour route when the state is working on the other roundabout," Hellmann said.





# Different game 50 years ago

First of a Series

Each summer as we've covered high school basketball in The Reporter, I think back to how it was years ago. Maybe, for example, 50 years ago.



Today, summer basketball for high school teams and their coaches is during the month of June. In July coaches cut loose their players for AAU ball.

Back when, coaches weren't allowed by the IHSAA to work with their players. Some towns, not all, formed their own home-town, AAU-

Noblesville had a team, mainly through the efforts of Dick Hutson. I've written about Dick. When he graduated from NHS, Hutson held the school career record. Believe it or not, it was less than 600 points.

Dick graduated the summer before Glen Harper came to coach the Millers. He missed playing for Harper during all those championship years. But, others who played with

Hutson on those summer teams did play for Harp. Many stories have been written about Jack Clark and Jan Robinson (both no longer living) that first year Harper was here.

My memory not being a strong point today, I went to Hutson, now retired and living in Chicago, for some help ory may not be much better than mine, but together we'll try to struggle through this story.

"I don't know when summer basketball began," Hutson began, "but I know the tourney at North Webster was among the first.

"Once we formed a team it was very difficult every summer to get a sponsor, funding from local merchants to help us pay for uniforms, entry fees and travel expenses. I remember that Don Porter at Porter Goodyear did help. I remember personally going around town trying to get help and I think John Tener did, too. None of us had any money

The core Noblesville teams for years was Clark, Robin- including some Indiana All-Stars. son, Tener, Bill Butler and Hutson. Ernie Butler played one vear and arguably was the team's best player that summer. Later on Dave Porter played and so did Bob Butler, Jim Knotts, Robbie Goble, Norm Ault and then later Arb Campbell, Jimmy Camp and Bill Kitchens.

"Larry Sapper would sub for just pick-up games at Second Ward School and so did Mike Casey," Hutson said. "We usually had only 5-8 players for tourneys, which was not good, except we got a lot of playing time.

Eventually, we played all over the state, mostly up on summer basketball back then. I found that Dick's mem- north," Hutson continued. "We played in tourneys on hot black asphalt courts, usually in city parks like at Logansport. That was the biggest and best tourney. North Webster was the first. We played at Zionsville and at Lebanon, tourneys which drew lots of players from the Indianapolis area. We didn't make all the tourneys, especially those up north. We had to get home in time to go to work the next

"There were teams playing from Marion and Logansport and Lafayette and Ft. Wayne, and Frankfort, Warsaw and Elkhart. Most teams were loaded with local players who played for Division 1, 2 and 3 college teams. Many of the players were highly recognized from around the state,

"All of this was before the now organized AAU and Travel All-Star teams with full-time paid coaches. For our games, sometimes college coach would show up, but not



## Mid-Ohio INDYCAR broadcast draws largest NBCSN's audience ever

NBCSN's same-day broadcast Aug. 2 of the Honda Indy 200 at Mid-Ohio drew an average viewership of 666,000, making it the most-watched Verizon IndyCar Series race on the network since NBC Sports Group acquired INDYCAR cable exclusivity in 2008.

It also marked the first time that four consecutive Verizon IndyCar Series race telecasts on the network each surpassed 500,000 viewers, continuing the trend of growth in viewership and ratings compared to 2014. Viewership was also up dramatically over 2014 for the races at Iowa Speedway (22 percent growth), The Milwaukee Mile (66 percent growth) and Auto Club Speedway (83 percent growth).

Average viewership for all Verizon IndyCar Series telecasts this season are up nearly 10 percent and represent a continuation of the growth in 2014, when INDY-CAR experienced significant gains in ratings and viewership over the previous

Viewership of the NBCSN broadcast of the Honda Indy 200 at Mid-Ohio eclipsed coverage of the Edmonton race in 2011 (642,000) and was the most-watched Verizon IndyCar Series telecast on cable TV since the 2008 race at Sonoma Raceway (685,000; ESPN2).

The Honda Indy 200 at Mid-Ohio, won by Ohio native Graham Rahal 30 years after his father, Bobby, won an Indy car race on the same Mid-Ohio Sports Car Course, was broadcast live earlier in the day on CNBC.

In total, the Aug. 2 telecasts on CNBC and NBCSN drew 838,000 viewers.
