When they are not in the stands to cheer on their sons, they are helping out the band in other ways. Mom Shellie helped to make this year's costumes.

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I-65 closed between Lebanon, White County

An unprecedented closing of the major route from Indianapolis to Chicago is affecting tens of thousands of motorists each day.

Interstate 65 is closed for a 52-mile stretch between Exit 141 in Lebanon and Exit 193 in White County. The bridge had been closed earlier in the week, but was reopened Wednesday for what turned out to be a brief period.

Structural engineers monitoring the I-65 northbound bridge over Wildcat Creek since it reopened on Wednesday evening noticed movement in the same riverbank pier and ordered the bridge closed early this afternoon. Both in-state and out-of-state soils or geotechnical experts with the Indiana Department of Transportation, Federal Highway Administration and Walsh Con-

struction will be on site evaluating. Testing may be needed to identify the proper course of action.

What happened

Structural experts determined today that the existing riverbank pier has settled. INDOT will work to provide updates as new information is available throughout the weekend. At this stage in the investigation we do not have an estimated time for reopening the bridge.

Traffic

INDOT has asked contractors to suspend work where the official detour rejoins I-65 in White County at U.S. 231 (Exit 193). INDOT is working to identify and clear alternate routes other than the official detour. There are messages posted alerting traffic of the closure on dynamic message

signs as far south as the Louisville metro area.

Detour

I-65 northbound merges to one lane and is diverted onto U.S. 52 at Exit 141 north of Lebanon. Follow U.S. 52 north for nearly 17 miles, then turn left at State Road 28. Follow S.R. 28 west for about 10 miles, then turn right onto U.S. 231. Follow U.S. 231 north for about 33 miles until it intersects I-65 again in White County.

INDOT and law enforcement staff are helping to direct traffic where S.R. 28 turns north onto U.S. 231 at Romney. In addition, INDOT traffic engineers are monitoring traffic flow at U.S. 231 signals and adjusting timing patterns.

Marching band students perform as one

The cloudless sky provided no relief from the sun, with temperatures well on the way to a high of 88 degrees. But a steady breeze funneled down the track and helped cool the marching band students, clad in black jackets and blue feathered hats.

Before their performance, the Marching Eagles set up camp on the northern straightaway of the dirt track. The Anderson High School Marching Highlanders, a group of 77, was next to Lincoln's Marching Eagles. The band consumed the width of the track in their matching suits, their percussion carts pulled by ATVs.

Next door the 30-member Marching Eagles band paled in comparison, both in numbers and equipment, but they didn't seem bothered. Members said their main focus was on their performance and the other guys didn't matter much.

The Lincoln High School Marching Eagles traveled from Cambridge City to compete in the 69th annual Band Day at the Indiana State Fair, a full day high school marching band competition.

Band Director Daniel Jackson yelled above the fair loudspeaker, motivating the students to do their best and work out issues before the main performance.

He then spoke directly to seniors: "How do you want your last performance to be? This is it!"

After running through drills designed to loosen up both instruments and players, the group began practicing their performance. "No Strings Attached" is comprised of songs by Hollywood composer Danny Elfman including "This is Halloween" from "The Nightmare Before Christmas," the theme from "Beetlejuice" and the opening theme of the show "Tales from the Crypt."

"We picked these songs because it's something the kids have been working with for a while now, and we thought we could turn it into a creepy marching show," Jackson said.

The last group before lunch, the Marching Eagles wrapped up the first half of the show. To the casual observer, the show went off without a hitch, no major spills or sour notes, and the recognizable songs echoed through the Hoosier Lottery Grandstands.

Applause and cheering carried through the air, back down to the band as they walked out of the performance area to waiting water and fans. The cool-down area, sponsored by the Red Cross, allowed students to get a quick break from the heat before posing for pictures.

After the photo-op, the students made the long trek back to their buses, where they could change and start eating lunch.

"The parents enjoy tailgating and making lunch for the kids," band mom Amy Carter said. "It gives them an

opportunity to get more involved and helps them meet the other parents."

"It works and the kids love it," said Stephanie Mettler as she checked the crock-pot full of chili sauce for walking tacos.

It costs \$100 per band to enter the Band Day competition at the fair, with prizes ranging from \$500 to \$3,700.

But to students, the Band Day competition means a lot more than prize money.

"I always give performances 100 percent," said 15-year-old Carter Mettler. "But today I gave it my all and then some."

Today's contest wrapped up the competition season for the Marching Eagles since they didn't make the finals. Even though they didn't make it to finals, the performance was a learning experience for the band members.

Harley Blevins, 17, said she cried when she walked offstage.

"I gave it all I've got," Blevins said. "I've been in marching band since I was in middle school, and today really means a lot to me."

Coffee with a Cop provides a unique opportunity for community members to ask questions and learn more about the department's work in Westfield's neighborhoods.

The majority of contacts law enforcement has with the public happen during emergencies, or emotional situations. Those situations are not always the most effective times for relationship building with the community, and some community members

may feel that officers are unapproachable on the street. *Coffee with a Cop* breaks down barriers and allows for a relaxed, one-on-one interaction.

"We hope that community members will feel comfortable to ask questions, bring concerns, or simply get to know our officers," said Sgt. Billy Adams. "These interactions are the foundation of community partnerships."

Coffee with a Cop is a national initiative supported by The United States Department of Justice, Office of Community Oriented Policing Services. Similar events are being held across the county, as local police departments strive to make lasting connections with the communities they serve.

The program aims to advance the practice of community policing through improving relationships between police officers and community members one cup of coffee at a time.

Eller Road remains closed between 106th, 116th until Aug. 31

Due to the rainy summer weather, the schedule for the opening of Eller Road between 106th and 116th streets has been pushed back. Barring further weather-related delays, the road is expected to be open to traffic by the morning of Monday, Aug. 31.

Eller Road was closed on June 8 for the replacement of Bridge #159, over Cheeny Creek. The signed detour will consist of 106th Street, Allisonville

Road, and 116th Street. All through traffic is advised to follow the signed detour or find an alternate route.

Eller Road is closed just north of the intersection at 106th Street. The other three legs of that intersection will remain open during the period of construction, including the access to Fishers Heritage Park. Local traffic from the north (116th Street) will be able to proceed south on Eller Road as far as Round Up Trail and White Horse Lane.



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



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The love of the violent for the Saviour

“And from the days of John the Baptist until now the kingdom of heaven suffereth violence, and the violent take it by force” Matt 11:12 (KJV).

They had not gone out to see a reed blown in the wind (Matt 11:7). No, throngs of people from all of Jerusalem, and Judaea, and all about the region surrounding the Jordan (Matt 3:5) were rushing out to see John the Baptist, the herald in the wilderness (John 1:23). The greatest prophet born of women (Matt 11:11) was preaching along the Jordan - No longer live in rebellion, come “repent ye: for the kingdom of heaven is at hand” Matt 3:2 (KJV)! Flavius Josephus in his work *The Antiquities of the Jews* wrote of John the Baptist, referring to him as a good man who commanded the Jews to seek after righteousness and piety. Josephus penned that they came in crowds about him in such a manner and with an enthusiasm that caused King Herod to fear John’s “great influence” over the people, supposing John had it within his power to raise a rebellion against the king’s crown and Rome’s rule. The Jewish populace knew from scripture of old, from the mouth of God through the lips of the prophets, that the messiah would be coming with deliverance but before they were to see the savior, they would see the one crying in the desert: “Behold, I will send my messenger, and he shall prepare the way before me: and the Lord, whom ye seek, shall suddenly come to his temple, even the messenger of the covenant, whom ye delight in: behold, he shall come, saith the LORD of hosts” Mal 3:1 (KJV).

These crowds pressing upon John were the violent, having faith that the Kingdom was near at hand nothing would keep them from aggressively seeking it! As an army laying siege to the city of Heaven, they crowded and pressed in as John cried “now also the axe is laid unto the root of the trees: every tree therefore which bringeth not forth

good fruit is hewn down, and cast into the fire” Luke 3:9 (KJV)! He who was coming, John prophesied, would baptize with the Holy Ghost and with fire: His fan “is in his hand, and he will thoroughly purge his floor, and gather his wheat into the garner; but he will burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire” Matt 3:11-12 (KJV). The eternal Kingdom was nigh and not wanting to be shut out the violent pressed and crowded in (Luke 16:16) from all sides; they assembled seeking to be purified and thusly “were baptized of him in Jordan, confessing their sins” Matt 3:6 (KJV). And when Jesus comes unto John, John proclaims, “Behold the Lamb of God, which taketh away the sin of the world. This is he of whom I said, After me cometh a man which is preferred before me: for he was before me” John 1:29 (KJV). By and by the “*biastēs*” - the violent - began to press upon Jesus. Wherever Jesus was the multitudes followed and thronged about him (Mark 2:15, 3:7 & 5:24, Matt 4:25, 8:1 & 12:15, Luke 7:9, 9:11 & 14:25 and John 6:2). The violent were, and are, undeniably zealous to hear, to see and to touch Him; to have Emmanuel (which is God with us) touch them! The violent had an unrestrained desire for the King, and an overwhelming longing for the Kingdom. The blind man would not be quieted until the Son of David had mercy on him (Mark 10:48)! The woman with the issue of blood would not be held back without having first touched the hem of the Healer’s garment (Luke 8:44), and there was a “*certain*” woman, a Greek, a Syrophenician by nation, who refused to go away without first having received the crumbs of saving mercy (Mark 7:25)!

The effect of God’s work, of God’s drawing on the heart is to place within us a compelling desire to seek Him (John 6:29, 6:44 & Phil 2:13); in the beginning of and above all else the violent seek His kingdom and His righteousness first (Matt 6:33)! When God has begun that work, that drawing of the spirit, the violent embark on a determined mission to find Him that has the key to the Kingdom, the key of David which is Jesus Himself (Rev 3:7); they are on a fervent mission to seek Him with all earnestness. With a voracious force they find the narrow path (Matt 7:14) and locate the

highways (Isaiah 35:8). And when the door is found, the door of faith, the door to mercy, the door to the sheepfold, like violent soldiers they storm through and into the city whose builder and maker is God! Having found the gatekeeper who is Christ, the violent are impelled to lay hold and press on to know Him, to know the power of His resurrection, to participate in His sufferings, and to become like Him in death (Phil 3:10 (KJV). Having pressed their way into the Kingdom the violent occupy the city; they suppress the enemy with a “spirit of wisdom and revelation in the knowledge of Him” (Eph 1:17) and they stand their newly won ground as more than conquerors (Rom 8:31-39)! This is not a passive endeavor, it is aggressive! The violent are fervent in spirit (Rom 12:11), their soul is set on fire for Him who has no suffering for the lukewarm (Rev 3:15-16)! These are not those complacent and content to sit in a pew on Sunday mornings being spoon-fed pureed meal. The violent are meat-eaters. They have sought out their own salvation with fear and trembling (Phil 2:12) and have studied to show themselves approved unto God, workmen that need not be ashamed (2 Tim 2:15), they are no strangers to the things of God. The violent anguish over their sin and seek rest for their weary souls. They reach for the Savior with repentant hearts and find the balm in Gilead which is the blood of Christ (Jer 8:22). And like the publican, standing afar off, who would not lift up so much as his eyes unto heaven, but smote upon his breast, saying, God be merciful to me a sinner (Luke 18:13), in victory they find His Grace. The violent pray Lord let me not parish as the wicked (Psalm 37), they seek His counsel; they find His provision and take part in God’s providential plan. The world calls them peculiar (Titus 2:14) and fanatical, they will “think it strange that ye run not with *them* to the same

excess of riot, speaking evil of *you*” 1 Peter 4:4 (KJV). But the violent let nothing come between them and the incorruptible prize. They run with all force and endurance praying boldly in the Spirit while along the way keeping themselves in the love of God. They shall look for the mercy of the Lord Jesus and have compassion on those trapped outside the gate, but with some there is an attempt to save with fear thereby snatching them from the fire (Jude 1:17-23). The violent stand in a ready position fully prepared with the Word as their weapon to give a reason for the hope that lies within them (1 Peter 3:15).

We know not the day nor the hour (Matt 25:13) when the Lord shall come in His glory but it is up to us to violently grab hold and like Jacob, not let go until the blessing is received (Gen 32:24-30)! He will not “always strive *with us*, Nor will He keep *His anger* forever” Psalms 103:9 (NKJV). He will come again. Soon we will see the King come in His Glory and He will come to judge (Rev 19:11) and He will reward all according to their works (Rev 22:12). So in the stillness and quiet of victory the violent are thankful knowing only those willing to give up all but Him will have in Him eternal life “For whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved” (Rom 10:13) and those that seek Him shall find Him (Matt 7:7-8)! In victory the violent know that they know they are born again and having entered in by the blood of Lamb they will “come boldly unto the throne of grace” Heb 4:16 (KJV) and as victorious soldiers they will hear “Well done, thou good and faithful servant” Matt 25:21 (KJV).

“Seek ye the LORD while he may be found” Isaiah 55:6 (KJV). “As for me, I will behold thy face in righteousness: I shall be satisfied, when I awake, with thy likeness” Psalms 17:15 (KJV)

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

The Tigers continue their season next Monday at the Cathedral invitational.



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
Summer basketball....

Things changed when Harp came

Last in the Series

Editor's Note: With the help of Dick Hutson, the Hamilton County Reporter has presented a series of articles about what summer basketball was like in Noblesville 50 years ago. Hutson played for the Millers and when graduating held the all-time career school scoring record. Retired, Hutson now lives in Chicago. Reporting, Don Jellison.



In a bit of high school basketball history, Hutson moved from the junior varsity to

a sophomore starter on the varsity in 1953. Cory LeCount was the head coach.

"We played in the Armory, a lousy venue. Our starting lineup included Jim Knotts, Ron Goble, Bill Butler and Norm Ault and myself. We won only 3-4 games that year, but it was a start.

"The next year we won 7 or 8 and then we won 9 my senior year. By then, Jack Clark, Jan Robinson and maybe Dave Porter became members of the team.

"In 1957 the team under new coach Glen Harper went on to do big things, reaching the semi-state at Fort Wayne where they were beaten by 5 points by South Bend Central and the Coleman brothers. That team went on to win the state championship.

"All 5 starters on that team went on to play college ball John Tener at DePauw, Arb Campbell at Butler, Porter at Indiana and Clark and Robinson went out west.

That may have been when Noblesville went from a football town to a basketball town. Noblesville had been known as a football town under Coach Forest Page and a football and track town under Bill McClain."

Back to summer basketball, one summer later Noblesville had its best team ever. Hutson, now a sophomore at Ball State, was the coach/manager. The starting lineup had 4 players who played in the NBA. The team consisted of Tom and Dick VanArsdale (co-Mr. Basketballs), Jon McGlocklin from Franklin (who played with the Milwaukee Bucks) and Tom Bolyard from Fort Wayne.

"I think Porter got all those guys to play that summer. I think we went 13-1, losing one game when the VanArsdale twins were gone."

It was a different day, a different time 50 years ago.

"One night following a game in Logansport," Hutson continued, "we stopped in a downtown Logansport restaurant to get something to eat. It probably was about 9 p.m. and we had Bill Butler with us. We waited and waited for service and we could see the staff looking at us. Finally I went back to talk with the manager. He said they would not serve us as long as we had a black guy along. That may have been my first exposure to racism. We, of course, walked out and went elsewhere.

"The other memories I have are those playing at Second Ward School, every Sunday from 1 p.m. to dark. We would only occasionally take breaks for water from a gas station hose about a block away on 10th Street.

"There just wasn't enough interest in those days to find 10 guys for pick up games, only the regular guys and we drafted Larry Sapper and Mike Casey."

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Marquez wins pole position for Red Bull Indianapolis GP

Two-time defending MotoGP World Champion Marc Marquez posted a time of 1 minute 31.884 seconds on his No. 93 Repsol Honda on Saturday while capturing the pole position for Sunday's Red Bull Indianapolis GP at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Marquez, who won from the pole during the last two MotoGP races at IMS, scored his fifth pole in 10 races this season. He has 27 poles in 46 starts in his MotoGP career. The 27-lap MotoGP race starts at 2 p.m. on Sunday.

"Yesterday, I saw that Jorge (Lorenzo) was really strong, but today we got closer and we had a similar pace," Marquez said. "Happy to be on the pole and we will see tomorrow because the tire degradation, it's an important thing here. We will be there. The key of the race, I think, on the last laps everybody will be struggling with rear grip. But we will try to do our best and try to be there, ready for a fight."

Marquez is the first to win three consecutive poles at the Red Bull Indianapolis GP.

He was tied with Dani Pedrosa for the most poles (two) overall in the event.

The winner of a remarkable 21 races since entering MotoGP competition in 2013, Marquez will look to win his fifth race at IMS following triumphs in Moto2 in 2011 and 2012 and MotoGP wins the last two years. Marquez is in fourth place in the MotoGP standings and will be looking for his third win of the season on Sunday. Starting next to Marquez on the grid will be his Spanish countryman and Repsol Honda teammate Dani Pedrosa, who posted a lap of 1:32.055. A two-time race winner (2010 and 2012) at Indianapolis, Pedrosa failed to make the podium at IMS for the first time since 2009 when he finished fourth last year. The all-Spanish front row of the grid was assured when two-time world champion Jorge Lorenzo posted a lap of 1:32.186 on his No. 99 Movistar Yamaha. Lorenzo will be looking for his fifth win of the season to go along with victories at Jerez, Le Mans, Mugello and Barcelona.

The legendary Valentino Rossi of Italy, a seven-time MotoGP world champion and winner of the inaugural Red Bull Indianapolis GP in 2008, will begin Sunday's race in the middle of the third row after posting a time of 1:32.511 on his No. 46 Movistar Yamaha. The ageless Rossi sits atop the MotoGP standings, 13 points clear of his Yamaha teammate Lorenzo. Rossi has wins this year in Qatar, Argentina and Assen.

"For me, from the third row, it's always difficult," Rossi said. "But mainly the problem for tomorrow, I'm a little bit worried, especially because also Pedrosa is very strong. He's a little bit stronger than me. So Jorge, Marc and Pedrosa, to stay with them, we have to make another step."

Nicky Hayden of Owensboro, Kentucky, who won the 2006 MotoGP World Championship, qualified 20th on his No. 69 Aspar Honda in 1:34.030.

"Well, we thought we had found a little bit of a direction yesterday afternoon," Hayden said. "This morning we probably went backwards a little bit and qualifying obviously didn't go very good. We just tried a few things that probably didn't bring as good a result as we'd hoped."

During a MotoGP practice session, Andrea Iannone posted a record trap speed of 217.0 mph (349.3 km/h) for a motorcycle at the Indianapolis Speedway, topping the 216.9 mph (349.0 km/h) recorded last year by Pedrosa.

Alex Rins of Spain won his second pole position of the season in Moto2 qualifying with a time of 1:36.549 on his Kalex bike. The 25-lap Moto2 race will start on Sunday at 12:20 p.m.

Current points leader Danny Kent of Great Britain captured the sixth Moto3 pole position of his career and fourth of the season with a lap of 1:40.703 on his No. 52 Leopard Racing Honda. Kent will look to post his sixth victory of the season during the 23-lap Moto3 race Sunday at 11 a.m.

The first MotoAmerica race contested at IMS was won today by Garrett Gerloff on his No. 31 Yamaha in the Supersport class. Bobby Fong finished as the runner-up on the No. 50 Triumph bike, and with his third-place finish, JD Beach captured the 2015 Supersport title with two races remaining on the schedule.

The first of two MotoAmerica Superbike / Superstock 1000 races this weekend ended with polesitter Cameron Beaubier winning the Superbike race - his seventh win of the season -- on his No. 6 Yamaha. Finishing a close second on his No. 95 Suzuki was Roger Hayden, the brother of MotoGP star Nicky Hayden. Josh Hayes, who entered today's race tied for the series points lead with his teammate Beaubier, finished third on his No. 1 Yamaha. Hayes is a four-time AMA Superbike champion. Also contested during the Superbike race was the first of two MotoAmerica Superstock 1000 races won by 2014 AMA Pro Daytona Superbike champion Jake Gagne on his No. 32 Yamaha. This was Gagne's 10th win in Superstock 1000 competition this season. MotoAmerica racing action will conclude Sunday with the second MotoAmerica Superbike / Superstock 1000 race beginning at 3:30 p.m.
