


Ward named to NACo Board of Directors

Hamilton County Surveyor Kenton C. Ward has been recently reappointed to the Board of Directors of the National Association of Counties, better known as NACo. The appointment was made by the Board of Directors of the Association of Indiana Counties (AIC) to represent Indiana on the NACo Board. Ward has served on the Board from 2006-2008 and 2012 to present.

The NACo was founded in 1935 for the betterment of county government. NACo serves the nation's 3066 counties, ensuring that they are heard and understood in the White House and Congress. The NACo Board of Directors is made up of elected county officials from across the US and is responsible for overall policy and management of the Association. NACo serves its members through lobbying, education, publications, research and technical assistance.

Ditch Road closing around 146th Street



Ditch Road immediately south of 146th Street to Lemond Drive was to be closed on or after Thursday.

The road is scheduled to be closed to all thru traffic for 30 calendar days, tentatively opening back up to traffic on Sept. 12, or 30 calendar days after closure.

During the closure, local traffic should utilize the signed detour route of Spring Mill Road, 141st Street and 146th Street. The closure is part of the improvements to 146th St., which will expand the two-lane roadway to a divided four-lane roadway with a new roundabout intersection at Ditch Road.

Two intersections receive flashing yellow left-turn arrows

Hamilton County has activated new traffic signals featuring flashing yellow left-turn arrows at the intersections of 146th Street and Oak Ridge Road, and 116th Street and Eller Road.

Signs mounted beside the signals will advise drivers: "Left Turn Yield on Flashing Yellow Arrow".

A flashing yellow arrow for left turns at an intersection means that motorists should slow down and use caution when turning, and must yield the right-of-way to oncoming traffic as well as to any pedestrians who may be crossing the intersection.

National research has shown that the flashing yellow arrow signal is more intuitive for drivers, results in fewer crashes and moves traffic more efficiently at an intersection. Hamilton County plans to replace most of its left-turn signals with the new national standard featuring a flashing yellow arrow as the old signals reach their scheduled life expectancy.

Proceed with left turn.

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Hamilton County eligible for loan assistance...

Fifty-three counties approved for disaster declaration by USDA

On Thursday, the U.S. Department of Agriculture approved a secretarial disaster declaration for 53 of Indiana’s 92 counties as requested by Governor Mike Pence, Lt. Governor Sue Ellspermann, and Indiana Farm Service Agency Executive Director Julia A. Wickard [in a letter](#) to U.S. Department of Agriculture Secretary Thomas Vilsack in late July. The request came after Indiana farmers suffered significant crop damage and losses caused by flooding and excessive rain since May 1 of this year.

Hamilton County is not among the list of 53 disaster-declared counties; however, it is among the 35 counties contiguous to the declared counties that are eligible for loan assistance.

“Farms in counties all across the state have suffered because of the excessive rainfall we’ve experienced during our spring and summer months this year,” said Governor Pence. “I’m thankful to the Indiana Farm Service Agency and the United States Department of Agriculture for recognizing the need for assistance for our Hoosier farmers, and I hope that those affected will apply for the loans they need.”

Under the secretarial disaster declaration, low-interest emergency loans are available to all producers suffering losses in the 53 counties for which the secretarial disaster declaration has been approved, as well as in affected contiguous counties, of which Hamilton County is one.

Information regarding loan uses, eligibility, and loan requirements can be found on the attached document as provided by the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

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

The bells ring again

For over 215 years the school bells have rang in Indiana to summon the fortunate children to learn. In the Colonial days, where it all began, the Pilgrims arrived at Plymouth rock in the year 1620. The families may have brought along a couple books but the Bible was on everyone's table and was the main source of education. As the planters became more successful in the Virginia Colony, the children would be divided into the boys being taught by a male tutor who came to the plantation and the girls were taught by a governess usually from



England with some ability. Boys studies included higher math, Greek, Latin, science, celestial navigation (navigating ships by the stars) geography, history, fencing, social etiquette and plantation management. Higher education was for boys only. Boarding Schools in England was the next step in education followed by Law or Medical schools in Europe.

Girls in the day learned enough reading, writing, arithmetic to read their Bibles and be able to record household expenses. Girls studied art, music, French, social etiquette, needlework, spinning, weaving, cooking and nursing. Girls did not go to England for higher education.

Children who came from poor families became apprentices that lasted between 3 and 10 years. This training would help them survive life in the colonies. Education

in the 17th century was for the well to do and the European emigrants. All other groups were schooled at home or sometimes by a church.

In England, the Puritan Church managed the schools of learning but in 1642 the first school change came in the form of Massachusetts Education Laws indicating Puritans in towns of 50 or more must hire a man to teach reading. Many schools were sponsored by different religious denominations in the new world. Benjamin Franklin stressed education and was influential in progressing the need. In the latter part of the Colonial years New England Colonies established school districts to expand education to more people. Colonial American is considered between the years of 1492 and 1763. By 1770, 2 million people lived and worked in Great Britain's 13 North American Colonies. Things were about to change.

Indiana followed the trends as people moved west in the 1800's. Today, there are still school districts that often give concern to families who live in one town, go to school in another and have a address of another town. No wonder there is confusion. Today, all children have learning access however not all schools are equal. Today, all a student has to do, to find out something is look on their phone or computer or the school assigned iPad. Things have changed from the hard benches, dark and cold schoolhouses that required the students to bring the wood from home to heat the school. Today it is a hassle to pack a lunch let alone pack an arm load of wood off to school. The question is are we any smarter? When you have to walk 3 miles

through the snow in the winter, perhaps paying attention was a little easier. Glass lamps to study by, few books or paper, long cold nights and that was not as long ago as one might think.

The United States ranks 14th of 40 countries in successful education ranking in all elements of education. 1st is South Korea, followed by Japan, Singapore, Hong Kong, Finland, UK, Canada, Netherlands, Ireland and Poland. Italy is the most unaware of 14 countries about social areas with the US ranking 2nd. This includes pregnancy, unemployment and voting patterns. US students can't read ranking 24th out of 65 countries. Shanghai, China ranks 1st. The US ranks 72nd in girls going to grade school with enrollment at 92%. The US is tied with countries like the Bahamas, Brazil, Egypt and Turkey. Only 91% of US boys attend grade school. The lowest ranking was Sudan with only 43%. More students graduate from College than any other country in Iceland. Somehow that seems understandable - those cold nights must lead to good study habits. The US ranks 15th in graduation rates. The US spends \$12,401 per student per year on secondary Education coming in at 4th. Luxembourg ranks 1st at \$18,144 per student. On ranking say the US government is 134th in the world for commitment to Education along with Belgium and Nigeria.

Indiana ranks 17th in the Nation for progress and reform out of 50 states. The District of Columbia (Washington DC) is the 50th worst. DC is the lowest in reading

Marko Milovac is only 16, but he’s aware of what his talent in soccer is doing for him.

"It's opened a lot of different doors," said the Noblesville teenager. One of those doors will be on a plane that will take him to Madrid to take part in a training program with one of the most legendary soccer clubs in the world.

Milovac was selected as a Generation Adidas International player, making him eligible for the Real Madrid CF Training Program. The program is hosted by Real Madrid, the famous club that has been a worldwide force in soccer since 1902, with such superstars as David Beckham, Cristiano Ronaldo and Zinedine Zidane - names even the casual fan knows.

Milovac plays for the Indiana Fire team, and was already a Generation Adidas player. He has playing soccer since he was six, starting at Noblesville, then spending six years with Carmel United. Last year, he joined the Academy Indiana Fire career, and that's where he got noticed.

"Because I'm a Generation Adidas player, they go through a process where they select players over time," said Milovac. "They pay attention over the course of the year. They saw and asked the coach if they had anyone to nominate, and Coach nominated me."

"Coach" is Phil Presser, who Milovac credits with helping him to improve over the year. Presser is the Indiana Fire Academy director and head coach.

"He's taught me different ways to look at the game," said Milovac. Presser has seen it all in soccer, winning back-to-back state championships at Fort Wayne Canterbury High School in 1997-98, a college championship in Indiana in 1999, and he also had a brief professional career before going the coaching route.

Milovac said Presser helps him "a lot because we can relate and we understand each other very well. And he's helped me to get to this level and play on the next level."

The level that Milovac eventually wants to get to is to play professionally. Marko's
