Man charged with robbing Hamilton Town Center CVS

A man is in custody after allegedly robbing a CVS in Hamilton Town Center Thursday afternoon.

At approximately 5:09 p.m., police officers from the Noblesville Police Department responded to a report of a robbery at the CVS Pharmacy located at 13085 Tegler Drive. Officers arrived on the scene a short time later and began to investigate.

Initial information from the caller alleges that a subject came into the store and presented a note to employees in the pharmacy. As a result, employees provided the

suspect with items from the pharmacy and the suspect then reportedly fled the scene. Witnesses stated that they observed the suspect flee on foot towards a wooded area and then into the McDonald's located at 13255 Tegler Drive. Officers located the suspect in McDonald's and he was taken into custody without incident. He was later transported to the Hamilton County Jail and booked.

The suspect is identified as Shawn Deron Baker, 18. He is charged with Robbery, Theft and Possession of a Controlled Substance.

Officers and investigators were able to locate and recover a quantity of pills in the wooded area where the suspect was initially observed. The pills are believed to be a product of the robbery.

No employees or officers were injured as a result of the incident.

Noblesville Schools launches community survey

Noblesville Schools announced today that they are launching a community-wide survey to seek feedback on a variety of issues.

Through the survey results the district hopes to better understand how their current performance is perceived, and also to gain important insight into community expectations for the future.

Part of the survey will ask about the district's current operating referendum, which covers the shortfall of state funding and draws to an end soon. The school board is considering a vote next year to continue the referendum.

The survey also seeks input on topics like district leadership, communications, learning culture, finances, facility management and more.

While the district has sought survey input from parents on specific topics, this is the first time in over five years that a comprehensive survey has been done across the Noblesville community.

"A lot has changed in our district and the Noblesville community since the last time we did a survey of this type," said Dr. Beth Niedermeyer, superintendent of Noblesville Schools. "This feedback will provide us critical guidance for future strategic planning, communications and budgeting. I encourage all residents to make sure their voice is heard."

The Noblesville community is invited to participate by going to www.nobsurvey.com. The survey will be available until August 30, 2015 and should take 10 minutes or less to complete.

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Rep. Cook congratulates local family on long-standing farm

State Representative Tony Cook (R-Cicero) congratulates Steven Osborne and family for receiving the Hoosier Homestead Award. Lt. Governor Sue Ellspermann presented the award during a ceremony in the Farm Bureau Building at the Indiana State Fair.

The Hoosier Homestead Award Program recognizes farming families that have owned and operated the same farm for 100 years or more. Centennial and sesquicentennial awards are given for 100 and 150 years of ownership, respectively. Bicentennial awards are given for 200 years of ownership.

The Osborne Farm of Hamilton County has been in operation since 1863. The family received the centennial and sesquicentennial awards.

“At a time when Indiana’s agriculture industry is rapidly advancing, the Osborne’s bicentennial achievement reminds us that Indiana’s farming roots lie in family and community,” said Rep. Cook. “I applaud their innovation and commitment to upholding our state’s rich agricultural heritage and was honored to take part in their recognition.”

“This program was established in 1976 to recognize the heritage of farming in Indiana and how Hoosier family farms have been passed down from generation to generation,” Lt. Governor Ellspermann said. “I salute our Hoosier farmers today for being part of both our state’s legacy – but more importantly, a vital part of our state’s future.”

The program was first established in 1976 to acknowledge the contributions made by long-standing farming families to Indiana’s economy, culture and overall advancement. Since the program’s inception,

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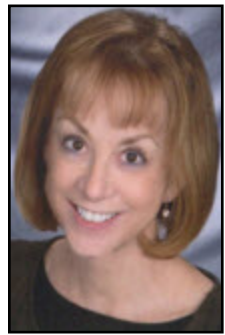
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Long swims or not, baby boomers are still in the game

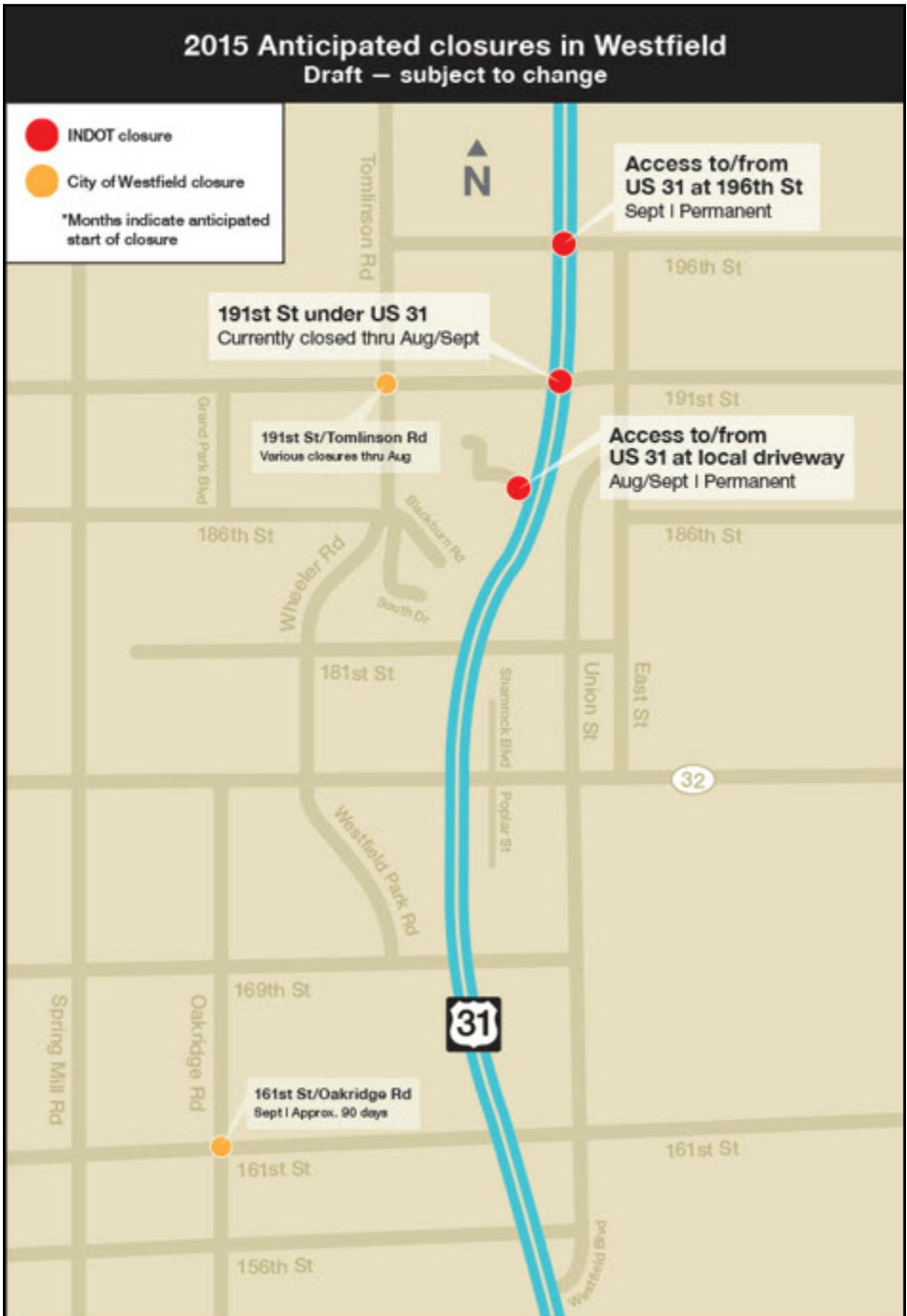
Eastbound 106th Street across US 31 - Motorists will be directed to turn right to head south on US 31

The Greyhounds, who finished state runner-up to Ben Davis, allowed 13.36 points a game, according to stats from the John Harrell web site. Fishers allowed 15.82, Southeastern 19.30 and Noblesville 19.30.

Hamilton Heights was No. 9 in 3A, the Huskies giving up giving up 13.50 points a contest.

Defense has been on the lips of most coaches through the first two weeks of practice this season.

“We believe we are the deepest front we have had here at Fishers,” said Tigers coach Rick Wimmer. “We return defensive tackles Jeff Inman and Steven Chakiry and defensive end Shawn Taylor.

“Senior Alex Butterfield may earn a starting position at one of the defensive tackle spots and two others, Tyler Denson, Kris Sanders and Terrel Stephen, also are showing some promise. Volleyball preview

On its third consecutive trip to the Class 4A state championship match, the Carmel volleyball team finally broke through to win last year.

Without a doubt, that was the main story for Hamilton County volleyball last season. This year promises to be another exciting season, as all nine of our teams have talented returners, and several are hoping that new talent can make their mark.

Last year's win over Cathedral at Ball State was the Greyhounds' first-ever state title in volleyball. That might be hard to believe, considering how Carmel is always considered to have a top-level team in every sport. Volleyball is no different: The 'Hounds are tied for third on the all-time sectional championship list with 31.

But now that it's finally gotten the biggest trophy of all, Carmel has a never-before experienced goal in mind for this upcoming season:

"We look to defend our State Championship with a well rounded and deep roster," said new Greyhounds coach Matt Fishman. He takes over after four highly successful years for Rich Coleman, although Fishman has good credentials as well. He graduated from Carmel in 2005, played at Bowling Green University, and was a varsity assistant for Bishop Chatard when it won a 3A state championship in 2012.

The Greyhounds lost six seniors to graduation, including three starters. But that means half the starting line-up is back. That includes senior middle hitter Carly Cason, who is committed to Stony Brook. She hit 213 kills last season, the most of the returning players.

Another big name back is junior setter Morgan Seaman, a Miami of Ohio commit. Seaman had 1116 assists last year during the high school season. She was named an AAU All-American in the 16 OPEN division during the past year's club season.

"Morgan's aggressiveness in play will make her a threat in all 6 rotations," said Fishman.

Sophomore Madeline Armstrong returns as an outside hitter; she totaled 212 kills during last year's Carmel run. That includes seven in the state championship game. Armstrong is being looked at by Big Ten teams, and Fishman said she "brings physicality to our team and looks to play a leading role."

Melissa Browning and Kari Truax are two other seniors on the Greyhounds' team.

New players who could make an impact are Emily Horvath, a junior libero/defensive specialist, and freshman outside hitter Bonnie Bostic, who won an AAU National Championship in 14 OPEN and was also named an AAU All-American.

"Bonnie's speed and fearlessness to attack is an exciting element to add to our roster," said Fishman.

Noblesville had the second-most wins among the county big schools last season, earning a 24-13 record. The Millers finished as sectional runner-up to the Greyhounds last fall, and return several key players. Noblesville coach Steve Hawthorne named three players as his top returners.

"The Millers' offense is led by junior setter Allie Phillips and offensive statistical leaders from last season, juniors Ashley Birkhimer and Josie Sanders," said Hawthorne. Birkhimer smacked an NHS-leading 280 kills last year, with Sanders hitting 238 kills. Phillips handed out 370 assists, and brings back the most aces with 50.

Hawthorne expects four more Noblesville players to have a breakout season.

"Delaney Kluger, senior outside hitter, will make a big impact in both the front and back court for the Millers this season," the coach said. "Senior Amy Hayes and sophomores Victoria Dittmar and Lexie Bowler add depth as middles to the already explosive attack of the Miller offense." Kluger hit 163 kills last year.

A group of three sophomores will form the Noblesville defensive core: Abbey Brown, Brenna Everingham and Stephanie Meysembourgh.

"With the infusion of talented newcomers and six returning varsity players, the Millers expect to make a splash in post-season play," said Hawthorne.

Hamilton Southeastern compiled a 22-11 record. A big part of that was due to

Hayden Huybers, who powered 390 kills and earned a .460 hitting record, breaking the mark set by Kierra Jones - who went on to a successful career at Purdue University.

Huybers is now a senior, and an Indiana recruit. She also has a solid supporting cast, including junior Caitlin Kane, an outside hitter who put down 202 kills last year. Senior Natalie Mills, junior Olivia Burgess and sophomore Grace Kane are part of what HSE coach Jason Young calls a "strong returning backrow," he noted that Grace Kane was the varsity libero as a freshman.

The setter will be junior Makenzie Hinshaw, who was the starting setter for the Circle City club team that went 16-1 in play this year.

"She was named to JVA World All Tournament Team," said Young.

Sophomore Caroline Kirchmer, who stands 6-1, missed last year due to an ACL tear, but is back at full force this year.

"She is fully healed and has had a strong summer," said Young.

Young said that his Royals team finished third out of 62 at the Purdue summer camp.

"Overall, we are a stronger more complete team front row and back row," said the coach.

The last team to win the local sectional before Carmel's streak began was Westfield, which won in 2011 and made its way to the semi-state championship. The Shamrocks, who were 22-12 last season, begin the 2015 campaign with a new head coach, Michelle Mapes.

Westfield will have some good hitters returning, starting with junior Natalie Ravanell. She led the 'Rocks in kills last season with 308. Junior Abigail Huser put down 204 kills.

Another junior, Cassidy Ferrer, brings back the most aces for Westfield, serving 44 last season. Sophomore Caroline Sinicki hit 37 aces. Senior Kari Losch will be a strong defensive player; she totaled 427 digs.

Fishers is looking forward to another winning season; the Tigers were 17-14 last year.

"Fishers returns seven varsity letter winners from last season," said second-year coach Nate Thompson. "Great senior leadership will pace the Tigers as Rachel Desmarais, Brooke Leonard, Disney Stallworth, and Kate Yancy look to end their careers in a big way."

"Offensively the Tigers will be lead by senior outside Disney Stallworth, junior outside Maggie Markwood and sophomore middle/outside Mallory Hernandez," Thompson continued. "Hernandez looks to build off a freshman year that included

Markwood was the leading hitter last year, smacking 193 kills and 37 aces in her sophomore season. She was just as adept on defense, with 253 digs. Stallworth added 145 kills.

Ellie Adams led the Tigers' dig total, making 351.

"Junior Ellie Adams will lead the defensive attack after being named Honorable Mention All-Conference and First Team All-County last season," said Thompson. The coach said his team adds senior setter Kate Yancy, freshman setter Rose Duffy, sophomore outside/defensive specialist Julia Drozd and sophomore opposite Elizabeth Weeks to the list as well.

Over in Class 3A, Hamilton Heights had some success last season, despite having a young team. The Huskies finished their season 18-12, and went undefeated in the Mid-Indiana Conference.

"We are still really young again this year with only two seniors this year," said Heights coach Steve Ward. "We will be relying on our returning starters to lead the rest of the team."

Those returning starters include outside hitter Sarah Sipe, now a senior. She led the team in kills with 276. Also back is junior outside hitter Kenna Burman, who did well with 196 kills.

What impressed Spencer Pigot about the No. 1 Verizon Team Penske car? In a word - everything.

Pigot, 21, was among seven Indy Lights Presented by Cooper Tires competitors to drive Verizon IndyCar Series cars Aug. 13 during a shared test day with Verizon IndyCar Series drivers on the 2.38-mile, 12-turn Sonoma Raceway road course.

Per the Verizon IndyCar Series rulebook, teams are allowed two additional on-track days to test a current Indy Lights driver. It's a valuable opportunity for the young drivers short and long term.

With the Verizon IndyCar Series championship to be determined in the season finale -- Aug. 30 at Sonoma Raceway - for the 10th consecutive season, six of the 10 drivers eligible in the tight title chase also utilized the valuable on-track opportunity.

Pigot, who has won a series-high four races this season for Juncos Racing, is six points behind Harvey in the standings with two races left.

"After a few laps I was able to start pushing more and more. I was able to get comfortable fairly quickly," Pigot said. "We went through a lot of video and data beforehand,

and I talked to Will a lot. Team Penske has helped me a lot to get up to speed quickly.

"This car carries so much speed through the corners and carries so much downforce. It's a new experience and a lot of fun."

Harvey, who turned about 55 laps in the Schmidt Peterson Motorsports Honda set up by Briscoe, agreed.

"I loved every minute of it," he said. "In Indy lights last year I won both races (at Sonoma), so I was really excited when I knew this track was going to be my first test. I'm pretty happy with what we've achieved.

"This car is so much bigger, so much more power. I mean at the end of the day it's still a race car, but the power and the weight of the car and the size of it were the things I noticed straight away."

The Verizon IndyCar Series championship will be decided on a road course and the GoPro Grand Prix of Sonoma carries double points. Montoya enters the penultimate race of the season Aug. 23 - the ABC Supply 500 at Pocono Raceway - with a nine-point lead over the surging Rahal.

"Double points will definitely be interesting here with the hairpins and different strategies; you definitely won't know until the end who's going to win the championship," said Dixon, a two-time Sonoma winner who is third in the standings.

Also on the race course was Mikhail Aleshin, who was participating in a refresher test in a Schmidt Peterson Motorsports Honda. The Russian, who sustained injuries in an August 2014 practice crash at Auto Club Speedway, is scheduled to make his return to the Verizon IndyCar Series at Sonoma Raceway.

"I feel like I'm home," he said. "It's a great team and a very nice car. The difference is very big compared to last year.

There's more downforce now so it's not very easy, but I have some experience handling it, so I am enjoying it."

Team Penske gets unique tribute at Woodward Dream Cruise:

Thousands of spectators lined the east and west sides of Woodward Avenue on a late Thursday afternoon - smart phones at attention for snapping photos - as pace cars representing Team Penske's record 16 Indianapolis 500 victories formed a uniform line.

With seven Indianapolis 500 winners included in the collection of current and former Team Penske Indy car and stock car drivers behind the wheels, the sun-splashed parade on the opening day of the Woodward Dream Cruise was a quick-moving and burnout-turning 20-mile procession.

"This is like a family reunion," said Al Unser, who joined another four-time Indy 500 winner, Rick Mears, along with his brother Bobby and son Al Jr. -- who combined for another five Indy 500 triumphs -- in the salute to speed. "And I'm not talking about just the Unser family, but I consider this the Penske family."

From team owner Roger Penske taking the pole position in the 1972 442 Hurst Oldsmobile convertible that commemorates the team's first Indy 500 win with driver Mark Donohue to the Chevrolet Corvette Z06 that paced the field for Team Penske's most recent win at "The Greatest Spectacle in Racing" with Juan Pablo Montoya in May, the first-ever unification of all the cars and the star-studded lineup of drivers was a unique tribute to the historic race and annual Metro Detroit summer event.

Also along for the ride were three-time Indy 500 winner Helio Castroneves, 2006 winner Sam Hornish Jr. and '03 winner Gil

de Ferran, first-year Verizon IndyCar Series team member Simon Pagenaud, NASCAR Hall of Famer Rusty Wallace and current Team Penske NASCAR drivers Brad Keselowski, Joey Logano and Ryan Blaney.

"Each one of these cars has a special place in Team Penske history, along with each of these men that have meant so much to our organization," Penske said. "To have the drivers in the pace car that they won the Indy 500 with is pretty special and I'm thankful that everyone could make it. The Indianapolis 500 is such a unique event and it is an honor to be able to share these wonderful cars from our victories at Indianapolis, and the great stories that go along with them."

Many stories were being swapped pre- and post-cruise between the drivers about their favorite 500 Mile Race memories and the importance of the 100th Running of the Indianapolis 500 Mile Race next May. Penske will mark 50 years in auto racing in 2016.

"When you drive for Team Penske, there is a lot of cool stuff you get to do," said Pagenaud, who drove the 2002 50th anniversary Chevrolet Corvette C5 on Woodward Avenue. "All these years, all these wins, all these backgrounds are all together. It makes you realize that you're part of something really special.

"To have 16 wins in the Indy 500 is just incredible to even say that number. I'm not a big number guy, but obviously with a team like this with such history, you do think about it. It would be the biggest achievement in my career to win the 100th Indy 500."

In its 20th year, the Woodward Dream Cruise rekindles the years when the thoroughfare that connects the northeast suburbs to downtown Detroit was a hub for weekend cruisers. On Aug. 15, more than 1.5 million people will again raise their smart phones to snap a sampling of the 40,000 vehicles from around the globe taking part in the parade.

"The Woodward Dream Cruise is a great event for the City of Detroit," Penske said. "You don't need an entry blank, you don't need to go through inspection. All you have to do is bring your car and go have fun." The pace cars will be displayed throughout the weekend at the Art Van Furniture store location on Woodward Avenue, between 13 and 14 Mile Roads in Royal Oak.

Tale of two halves for Indians

The Durham Bulls and Indianapolis Indians rode solid outings from their starting pitchers to split a doubleheader Friday night at Victory Field.

Top prospect Blake Snell struck out six over 5 1/3 innings in the Bull's 6-1 victory in the first game of the twin-bill. He held the Tribe to just one run for the second straight start, and after previously striking out seven over five innings on Aug 4 in Durham, owns a 1.74 ERA with 13 strikeouts to just two walks against Indianapolis.

Ryan Brett doubled, homered and drove in three runs for the Bulls, while Tony Sanchez doubled and scored for the Indians' lone run.

In the second game, Brad Lincoln led the Tribe to a 7-1 win after pitching five innings for the first time since August of last season. He allowed just three hits and one walk during tonight's scoreless outing, improving to 6-1 in 35 total appearances.

Willy Garcia homered for the second straight night, Keon Broxton drove in three runs and Alen Hanson scored three times in the win.
