Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership, a consortium of law enforcement agencies in Hamilton County, announced today its participation in the national and statewide 2015 *Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over* enforcement mobilization occurring August 19 through September 7, 2015. Officers will join more than 250 state and local law enforcement agencies, and thousands more across the country, to conduct high-visibility patrols encouraging drivers against drinking and driving.

"This campaign provides us another opportunity to educate and enforce messages that save the lives of Indiana drivers and passengers," said Hamilton County Sheriff Mark Bowen. "Driving intoxicated is not only illegal, it's unsafe and unwise. We will be out in full patrol and if you do drink and drive, you will be caught."

Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over is an annual enforcement effort supported by federal funding allocated to the Hamilton County Traffic Safety Partnership from the Traffic Safety division of the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI). Officers from the Sheriff's Office, Carmel Police, Cicero Police, Fishers Police, Noblesville Police, and Westfield Police will work overtime to conduct sobriety patrols and checkpoints around the clock. According to ICJI, in 2014, there were 94 fatal alcohol-impaired collisions in Indiana. While this accounted for 13 percent of all fatal crashes, there was a 17 percent decrease in fatal alcohol collisions between 2013 and 2014.

"The decrease in the number of fatal alcohol collisions in Indiana is a clear indication citizens are realizing drinking and driving don't mix," said ICJI Director Dave Mur-

taugh. "Through the hard work and dedication of all of Indiana's law enforcement agencies, we continue to work toward our goal of zero intoxicated drivers on our roadways."

Indiana law enforcement agencies have been actively involved in the *Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over* campaign for over 20 years.

Heights demographic presentation to take place Thursday

116th Street widening project proposed east of I-69

The City of Fishers announced today an infrastructure improvement project to widen eastbound 116th Street from Interstate 69 to Cumberland Road. The project also includes the relocation of the 116th Street and USA Pkwy traffic signal to the east to allow for a better traffic flow.

“This project was identified to improve traffic flow during peak hours and efficiency,” said Director of Engineering Jeff Hill. “We see a significant uptick in traffic during the P.M. commute. By increasing the capacity on the eastbound lanes, we can reduce travel times for the residents in a smart way.”

Currently, the corridor sees 40,000 a day with the evening commute experiencing the peak traffic volume.

The project includes a new eastbound lane from I-69 to Cumberland Road. The existing traffic signal at USA Pkwy would be removed and the intersection will become a right-in and right-out alignment with a dedicated right turn lane from I-69 to USA Parkway.

Significant improvements will be made at the 116th Street and Exit Five Parkway (Oak Drive) intersection where a new traffic signal will be installed. The improved intersection will include double left turn lanes at 116th Street (eastbound) onto Exit Five Parkway and at Oak Drive onto 116th Street (westbound). In addition, Oak Drive will be widened and extended to intersect USA Parkway.

“When businesses think of Fishers, they think opportunity,” said Mayor Scott Fadness. “Interest in the I-69 business corridor continues to increase, and it is important that we take a proactive approach to infrastructure as the area develops. This project is a smart solution to mitigate the congestion our residents experience today and improve traffic flow as more businesses are drawn to our entrepreneurial culture.”

The City of Fishers is currently working with INDOT to evaluate the extension of

the new eastbound lane as far west as Commercial Dr.

“The 116th St. Bridge sees so much traffic, day-in and day-out,” said Hill. “By extending the new 116th St. eastbound lane as far west as Commercial Drive, we could create added capacity for those exiting I-69

from both directions. I’m encouraged by the initial discussions with INDOT.”

The project is slated to start construction in summer of 2016. Construction is estimated to costs approximately \$6 million.

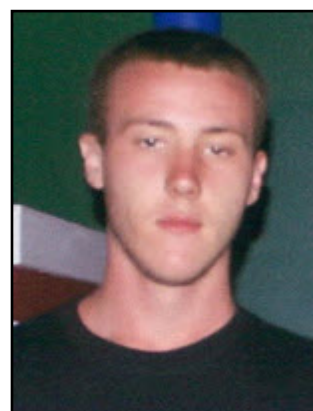

Lawrence North at Noblesville....

Millers ready to step over 50-50

In similar ways, the two football teams which will square off Friday (7 p.m.) at Hare Chevrolet Stadium, host Noblesville and visiting Lawrence North, face challenges.

Hurdles to clear.

Arguably, Lawrence North has higher hurdles to clear than do Coach Lance Scheib’s Millers.

Under new coach Patrick Mallory, the Wildcats went 0-9 two years ago. They were 1-9 last season, beating only winless North Central. Lawrence North opened the year by losing to Noblesville, 36-33, blowing a three touchdown lead.

This is, many will tell you, a turnaround season for the Wildcats.

While Lawrence North is trying to leap from the basement, Noblesville is trying to climb a hill. A hill to capture a winning season. The Millers have been 5-5 each of the last two years, following a 5-6 record three years ago. Last season, Noblesville started 4-1, losing only to Fishers 16-13. NHS defeated only Brownsburg in their next five games, bowing out to Carmel, 28-6, in the sectional.

Friday, one football game; one victory so important to each team.

Noblesville’s schedule is extremely tough, especially so in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference. There isn’t a cupcake in the HCC.

Noblesville’s offense will be keyed by senior quarterback Luke Melloh. Last season, while sharing the position, Melloh passed for 620 yards and ran for 535 yards.

“Melloh continues to make good decisions in both the running game and passing game,” said Scheib after watching his quarterback scrimmage against North Central last Friday.

“Jackson Thurman scored and played well at wide receiver,” said Scheib. “Chandler Hurst ran hard and played well at running back and I thought Max Atkins and Eli Davis did more than hold their own with the offensive line.”

Atkins, at 205 pound playing guard, is the smallest member of a huge starting Noblesville line, which includes Eric Ferguson at 290, Austin Dreyer at 260, Jeffrey Musselman at 260 and Ben Collins at 290.

Noblesville’s starting lineup is a mixture of seniors and juniors. The seniors are Ferguson, Musselman, Atkins, JD Scheib at wide receiver, Jarel Youree at tailback and Melloh.

“Hank Davis (200 pound senior linebacker) led our defense in the scrimmage,” Scheib said. “He is flying around and playing very physical.

“Clay Wiese did a nice job on the defensive line,” Scheib continued. “So did Roman Dziennik and Brad Killion. I was happy with the way Alex Foster and Justin

Ogle played at outside linebackers. I like the way McGwire Plumer continues to improve and our free safeties Ja’Shaun Dickman and Zac Tuinui played well verse the run and the pass.

“Overall, it was an ok scrimmage. We have to continue to trust the process and understand that we will play like we practice,” Scheib added.
