## Holiday Inn Express, Tom Wood Toyota coming to Noblesville

Two big commercial projects have been granted building permits in Noblesville.

A Holiday Inn Express, valued at \$8.8 million, will be built at 13625 Tegler Drive in the Saxony Corporate Campus. It will be five stories and 123 rooms. The hotel will be located east of Famous Dave's toward I-69.

A Tom Wood Toyota automobile dealership, valued at \$2.8 million, is slated for the northeast corner of State Road 37 and E. 146th at 14701 Tom Wood Way at the Crossing. The dealership joins 13 others in Central Indiana.

"We're excited to have Tom Wood open a new dealership in Noblesville," said Mayor John Ditslear. "It gives our people more choices in vehicles and adds to our tax base."

# Carmel Police looking for robbery suspect

The Carmel Police Department is looking for a man that robbed the Orange Leaf frozen yogurt store at 365 W. 116th St. Thursday evening.

At 6:48 p.m., a white male suspect, approximately 6' and 160 pounds, entered the store wearing a dark hooded sweatshirt and dark jeans. The suspect went directly to the restroom and came out 20 minutes later. He then walked to the front of the store with his hand over his mouth and had the sweatshirt hood pulled up.

The suspect sat down on a couch, then approached the front counter a few minutes later and asked an employee if she could make change for a \$20 bill. The employee opened the register, and then the suspect told her not to say anything, stay calm, and said if she didn't give him the money, he would shoot her. The employee noticed the hammer portion of a

gun in the man's left hand partially in one of the sweatshirt's pockets. As this was taking place, the employee's father entered the store to drop off an item. The employee told her father the suspect had a gun and was going to shoot her, after which the suspect ran to the rear of the store.

The suspect appears to be in his early to mid 20's with a thin beard.

The city purchased 80 acres of land adjacent to the current government center. The land was farmland, a well used strip mall and an old empty grocery store. The land ran along Range Line Road and included several stand alone retail stores. The typical development in such cases of available land is to create more urban sprawl with bits and pieces of commercial properties with no connection. The Mayor had to move if he was going to make something special for his citizens. He knew his idea would not be easy and it required City government and the private sector working together to make something new happen. It also take citizens who will support new ideas and stand behind the decisions. The City Center was born and today stands the 1600 seat Palladium world-class concert hall. Inside the Palladium is The Tarkington 500 seat performance theatre, a 200 seat studio theatre making up the gathering place on a international level. Not without budget problem, critics, a few empty seats on occasion and the question of how sustainable is the arts as a driver for quality of life and community development?

**Never Looking Back**

The multimillion dollar investment call the Palladium and the Center for the Performing Arts opened in January, 2011. Announced costs of \$126 million for the project, takes vision beyond what sometimes makes for common sense. As an elected official, Mayor Brainard put it all on the line. That is called leadership. The city of Carmel also shares almost 1 million dollars of the city budget each year with the arts working within the community. That is a commitment to the vision. It is said the Palladium will last 500 years or more due to the investment in the best construction and design available. Looking forward 500 years and beyond is a rare example of community development and personal courage by an elected official. Most communities cannot look beyond the next paving contract and the pot holes it hopes to fix.

# 106th Street traffic shift begins Monday

To accelerate construction on the US 31/106th Street interchange, crews plan to shift traffic on 106th Street on or after Monday, Aug. 24 (overnight). This shift will occur about one month ahead of schedule.

Traffic on 106th Street will be shifted to the south side of the road so crews can construct the north side of the new roundabout interchange. Following this shift, all turning movements will remain open, and traffic on 106th Street will be reduced to one lane in each direction (combined through and left-turning lanes), plus right-turn lanes to northbound and southbound US 31.

**Various lane restrictions in Carmel, Aug. 22-26**

Between 7 a.m. and 3 p.m. tomorrow, Aug. 22, crews plan to restrict the left lane of northbound US 31 from just south of 96th Street to 103rd Street. This lane restriction will resume on Monday, Aug. 24, and continue daily through Aug. 26 between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m.

On Monday, Aug. 24, motorists should expect various lane restrictions on northbound and southbound US 31 near 136th Street and 131st/Main Street. These lane restrictions will occur between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m.

**103rd Street to close permanently on or after September 6**

Beginning on or after September 6, crews plan to permanently remove access to/from US 31 at 103rd Street. When the traffic signal at US 31/103rd Street is removed, access from southbound US 31 to the eastbound and westbound I-465 ramps will become free-flowing from south of 106th Street.

As part of the final configuration of US 31, 103rd Street will become a cul-de-sac on either side of US 31, and nearby access to/from US 31 will remain available via I-465, 106th Street and 116th Street. The 103rd Street closure will not begin until after the City of Carmel opens 106th Street at Illinois Street (expected in early September).

Access to/from US 31 and St. Vincent Health/Heart Center will remain available via 106th Street. See the map illustration below for suggested routes to St. Vincent Health/Heart Center from northbound and southbound US 31 following the 103rd Street closure.

## 116th/Pennsylvania streets closure begins in September

Starting in mid to late September, INDOT plans to close the 116th/Pennsylvania streets intersection for approximately 60 days to construct a roundabout. During this closure, the signed detour route will include 106th Street, College Avenue and Old Meridian Street.

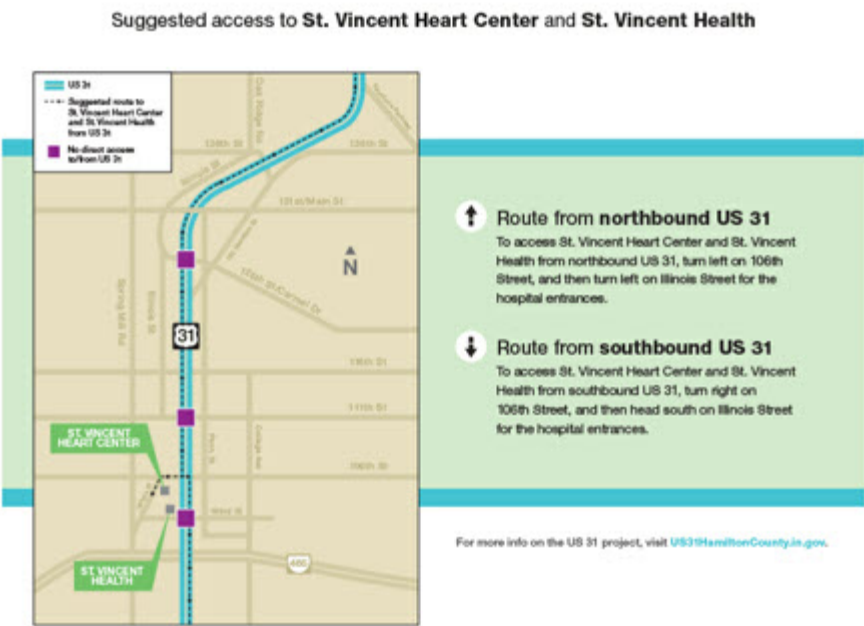

# With 21.8 left, Youree scores

Lance Scheib said he was “excited.” So were more than 2,000 Noblesville football fans following one of the most exciting games ever at Hare Chevrolet Stadium.  
Arguably, the most exciting. Arguably, one of the most exciting wins in Noblesville football history.  
After scoring three touchdowns in the fourth quarter to beat Lawrence North 36-33 last year, this time Noblesville scored with 21.8 seconds remaining to knock off

the Wildcats from the MIC Conference, 55-50, in a back and forth battle.  
Fancy stepping Jarel Youree, who danced around would-be Lawrence North defenders all night long, put the capper on this contest by two heavyweight fighters when he zipped 16 yards into the end zone with 21.8 seconds remaining.  
Just when it appeared the Wildcats had won, Noblesville took away the victory. The visitors grabbed a 50-49 lead on a touchdown and two-point conversion before the Millers bounced back to pull the rabbit out of the hat.

“I told our team that they would have to fight off the challenge of adversity tonight,” said Scheib, “and they did. I told them they would have to make plays, and they did.”  
In a game which lasted nearly three hours, Noblesville won in the final seconds. Noblesville led 21-14 after one quarter. Noblesville led 35-28 at halftime. Noblesville led 42-35 after three quarters.  
With Noblesville leading 49-42, the Millers made what appeared to be a game clinching defensive stand, holding the Wildcats at midfield following tackles by Justin Ogle, Zac Tuinui, Harris Camp and Grant Bullard.

Melloh ran for 141 yards, with Youree rushing for 122. Melloh was extremely efficient, completing 17 of 21 pass attempts for 158 yards. Youree caught six of them for 69 yards, with Jackson Thurman gaining 51 yards on five catches.
