Will commissioners accept council’s offer for fire training tower?

Following a controversial August 5 County Council vote against funding a county public safety training center, the council did vote to approve money for one component of the training center, a fire training tower.

The question now is whether County Commissioners will choose to accept the council's offer of \$568,000 and proceed with construction.

The thorny question has been referred to the County Public Safety Committee for a recommendation, according to Commissioner Christine Altman.

The issue is thorny because if the offer is rejected as it looked like it might be following the Council's meeting, it can be said the safety committee and commissioners don't want to compromise, and prefer to maintain an all-or-nothing position. And, that might indeed mean nothing.

The proposed training center would be located at River Road and 160th Street on land owned by the City of Westfield. A building currently stands on the property with a sign in front identifying it as the Hamilton County Training Center.

But, the proposal was to vastly expand facilities there including a fire training tower where firemen would learn various aspects of fighting, rescuing and escaping from a burning structure.

There has been no immediate word of when the safety committee will present its recommendation. The group is composed of the county sheriff and officials of the various fire and police agencies in the county.

And, before that happens there is a technical point to clear up regarding the council's so-called compromise of-

PHHC’s Holly Wheeler speaks at Sheridan Rotary

Sheridan Rotarians welcomed Holly Wheeler, Assistant Director of Partnership for a Healthy Hamilton County (PHHC) as their guest speaker this past Tuesday, August 18th. Healthy People. Healthy County. This is the PHHC motto, and their mission is to “Collaborate across all sectors of the community to advocate for and implement strategies that help to improve the health of Hamilton County residents where they live, work, play and learn”.

Wheeler pointed out that while Hamilton County is the healthiest county in Indiana as well as being the most affluent and

having the lowest smoking rate, Indiana in general is ranked among the 10 least healthy states in American and has the 7th highest smoking rate among the 50 states. Indianapolis, our next door neighbor, is the least healthy of the 50 most populous cities in the U. S. Mixed news, indeed, for us to ponder.

Based on a 2013 Community Health Needs Assessment survey, PHHC was created and has identified 3 top priorities it

fer. Altman says commissioners are not certain whether the offer amounted to an appropriation of \$568,000 or just a resolution to give the amount favorable consideration.

In the meantime, two likely candidates for County Council in next year's Republican primary have emerged. Jeff Hern of Fall Creek Twp., and Scott Baldwin of Noblesville have indicated they will run against incumbents Brad Beaver and Rick McKinney, both of whom voted against the original \$3-million appropriation request to fund the full training center.

".....pray also for us, that God may open to us a door for the word, to declare the mystery of Christ, on account of which I am in prison, that I may make it clear, which is how I ought to speak" (Col 4:3-4). Paul arrested and under guard, speaks of a mystery unknown until revealed in Jesus, the Son of God. The mystery, God's plan & purpose for the salvation of His fallen creation, now made known to the saints (Col 1:26-27, Rom 16:25-26). A revelation of

divine truth, this is the gospel message - the proclamation of Jesus! It doesn't take eloquent words or a masterpiece of composition with precision oratorical delivery. Just a simple, clear message, Jesus Saves! Plainly put, "if you confess with your mouth the Lord Jesus and believe in your heart that God has raised Him from the dead, you will be saved. For with the heart one believes unto righteousness, and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Rom 10:9-10).

Fully God and fully man, He left the throne of heaven to be born of the virgin. Without sin and with his own blood He redeemed our sinking souls because it took blood to make the atonement, "For the life of the flesh *is* in the blood, and I have given

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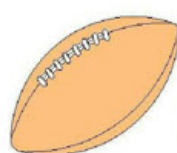

Gehlhausen sets new Huskies record

A school-record performance by Caitie Gehlhausen led Hamilton Heights at the Western Boone Invitational.

Gehlhausen shot a two-under par 68 at Cool Lake Golf Club in Lebanon, a Huskies' school record for an 18-hole round. Gehlhausen finished as the second low individual, behind Brownsburg's Maddie Cody. She carded a three-under par round of 67.

The Huskies finished fifth as a team with a 365. The Bulldogs won with a total of 297, with Western second at 317. Other players from Heights also had season-best rounds, including Syd Lucas 88, AirieAnna Stretch 101, Lexi Tucker 108 and Kate Biggs with 128.

Guerin Catholic finished fourth with a team total of 385 in the Connersville Invitational at Willowbrook Country Club.

Marissa Singer was the individual tournament champion with a solid 78 on a tough golf course. Dani VanBuren shot 97, Mckayla Tallman and Kylie McMullen both carded 105 and Megan Ahlgrim scored 106.

Down at Country Oaks Golf Club, No. 1-ranked Evansville North and No. 2 Westfield had a close showdown at the Hall of Fame Invitational.

The Shamrocks finished second to North by one shot - 316 to 317. Hamilton Southeastern placed fourth, Carmel fifth and Fishers 10th at the tournament as well.

Cailyn Henderson and Adrienne Montalone tied for third individually; both carded 75s.

"Great day for us on a course we our unfamiliar with," said 'Rocks coach Trevor Neu. "Adrienne Montalone had a fantastic day."

Ciara McAree shot a 77 for the Royals, while Angie Kavanaugh's 79 led the Greyhounds.

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

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
