

INDOT to conduct public hearing about...

## New interchange at I-69, 106th Street

will conduct a public hearing Thursday. Sept. 10 to an- will provide a variable six foot to eight foot wide sidewalk nounce plans to construct an interchange at 106th Street and Interstate 69.

The hearing begins at 6 p.m. and takes place at the Fishers City Hall Auditorium, One Municipal Drive, Fishers. Indiana 46038.

INDOT is coordinating with the City of Fishers and Hamilton County as partners on this project. The interchange configuration will be a two-lane, oval-shaped roundabout centered over the I-69 centerline. The existing 106th Street structure over I-69 will be totally removed as right-of-way and will impact approximately 0.6 acre of part of this project and replaced with two one-way struc-

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) tures (south structure and north structure). The north bridge along the north side of 106th Street for the entire project length, with crosswalks across 106th Street at Crosspoint Boulevard and USA Parkway.

> Construction along I-69 will include new bridge piers in the median and new bridge abutments to the outside of mainline I-69. No roadway work is proposed for existing mainline I-69, and all roadway work along I-69 will be limited to construction of the ramps for the new interchange.

> The project will acquire approximately 10 acres of wetlands. No impacts to floodplains, streams, forests, or endangered species are anticipated.

The purpose of the proposed project is to increase operational efficiency along the I-69 corridor in Fishers by:

Reducing congestion at the existing I-69 interchanges with 96th Street and 116th Street

Improving traffic safety within the project study area

Providing direct access between I-69 and 106th Street to serve existing land uses and growth patterns



## **Bats slowing** park construction

There may be brown bats in the park area, which will slow down construction of

Federal Hill Commons.

"We don't know if they (the bats) are there, but if they are their season won't end until mid-September," Bennett said. "That will delay our work a week or two."

Bennett said a study to find the bats would be too costly, and that the delay is not that big of a deal.

"There are lots of things we can still do," he said, "like beginning to move the power lines, which is a big job."

OK, what happens if the park is built and the bats come back next year, flying around the amphitheater, or the market place or the splash area?

"They won't come back," Bennett answered. "They'll find different habi-

Bennett, working with local Eagle Scouts, will help the bats find new homes. Several new habitat areas are being built along White River.

Federal Hill Commons is a 6.5 area piece of property being built on land which sits on the northeast corner of the intersection of State Road 19 and State Road 32.

## Coxhall Gardens reopens after body discovered in restroom

Coxhall Gardens, a Hamilton County park located in Carmel, has reopened following an investigation of a body found in the park early on Tuesday.

Hamilton County Sheriff's Office deputies responded to the park on 116th Street shortly after 7:30 a.m. on a report of a welfare check after a park employee discovered a male body in a restroom.

Sheriff's Office investigators and deputies closed the park throughout the morning while investigating the incident. The preliminary investigation indicates a male subject died from an apparently self-inflicted gunshot wound. Investigators do not suspect foul play and would like to reassure the public that there was no sign of an attack or other suspicious activity.

## Jury duty scam rears head again

Once again, a scam involving the threat ty. In an even more interesting twist, the lend credence to the calls.

The scam works like this: A victim answers the telephone and the caller says a warrant is being issued for not appearing for jury duty (or paying taxes or another offense). The caller may give the name of a courthouse employee, a deputy, or a name similar to an employee. Caller ID may even show the call originating from a local number as these ID's are easy to fake with current technology. The caller then states fine submitted by wire transfer or pre-paid credit card. Pressure is put on the victim to pay quickly in order to avoid jail time since imminent. ## Motorcycle crash claims life of Carmel man

A Tuesday morning motorcycle crash claimed the life of a Carmel man near the intersection of 106th Street and U.S. 31.

At approximately 9:56 a.m., Carmel Police responded to an accident involving a motorcycle near that intersection of 106th Street and US 31. Officers arrived and found one vehicle involved in the crash.

Based on preliminary information, it appears that a blue 2015 Yamaha motorcycle operated by Matthew Smith, 27, Carmel, was traveling southbound on US 31 near 106th Street. The driver collided with the curb on the west side of the roadway. During the collision, Smith was ejected from the motorcycle and died at the scene as result of his injuries.

Accident reconstructionists from the Carmel Police Department are investigating the crash. The intersection of US 31 and 106th Street was temporarily closed during the

At this point of the investigation, the exact time of the accident is unknown. Carmel Police Department asks that if anyone has information or was a witness to this crash contact the Carmel Police Department at <u>317-571-2500</u>.

In a separate incident, Carmel Police responded to a vehicle vs. motorcycle accident in the area of West 96th Street and Hazel Dell Parkway early Saturday morning.

At approximately 12:20 a.m., Robert Middleton, 43, Indianapolis was traveling westbound on 96th Street in a 2012 Dodge Charger when he collided with motorcyclist Rick Hubbard, 50, Indianapolis, who was stopped on his 2014 Harley Davidson motorcycle at a red light.

Hubbard sustained minor injuries to his head and was taken by Carmel Fire Department ambulance to 86th Street St. Vincent Hospital where he was treated and released. During the course of the investigation, Middleton was arrested for Operating While Intoxicated (Endangering a person-Class A Misdemeanor). Middleton was later transported to the Hamilton County Jail and bond was set at \$2,500.

### Heartland Food Products acquires Splenda

Carmel-based Heartland Food Products Group announced on Tuesday that it will acquire Splenda, the well-known artificial sweetener, from Johnson & Johnson, according to numerous reports.

The deal's financial terms were not publicized. Splenda was approved by the Food and Drug Administration in 1998, and began to be sold in the U.S. the following year. A report on the Bloomberg financial news Web site said that the acquisition will bring 100 jobs to not only Heartland's Carmel corporate office, but also to the company's manufacturing plant in Indianapolis, as well as its distribution center.




