HAND's Behind the Walls tour

HAND held its Behind the Walls tour at Spicewood Gardens Thursday, Aug. 20. The tour highlighted HAND's green construction standards which include constructing thicker exterior walls with increased insulation, utilizing construction materials made from recycled content, sealing gaps around windows and doors, and installing energy star products such as doors, windows, lighting and appliances. The tour allowed visitors to see the four buildings in various stages of construction and prior to any drywall installation. HAND (Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development) provides quality affordable housing to low income residents.

Construction is set to be completed this Fall offering eight additional units similar to the existing 52 units in Sheridan. "Our wait list for phase one and two has approximately 180 people on it. Some have been on the wait list since October 2009. The need for affordable senior housing is great." reported Nate Lichti. Executive Director of

"The current residents are really excited about us offering more units. What makes this property special is the sense of community that has grown from these residents," says Lichti. The residents plan pot-luck dinners, euchre tournaments and other events. According to Beverly Frederick a Spicewood resident, "We are a family, we take care of each other."







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Huskies host Millers

Does getting beaten up early in the season by a football opponent which school enrollment wise is three times bigger than your own have any bearing on what might happen to a team later in the season?

Sure didn't hurt Hamilton Heights last season when the Class 3A Huskies lost to Noblesville 34-0 and then lost only to Lewis Cass in a regular season game and to Guerin Catholic by a touchdown in the championship game of the sectional.

Coach Mitch Street's Huskies finished the year with a 9-3 record. Noblesville ended the season 5-5

Those same two clubs, those same two Hamilton County backyard neighbors, will meet again Friday when the Huskies host

Both teams are off to fast starts. Noblesville scored late to pull out a 55-50 victory over Lawrence North. Hamilton Heights led all the way in beating Mt. Vernon, 21-6.

"Hamilton Heights manhandled Mt Vernon," said Noblesville coach Lance Scheib. "They will have lots to prove Fri-

What the Huskies will have to prove is whether or not a small school with talent can contend with a large school with talent. That didn't prove successful for the Huskies last season.

And, arguably, for the same reason again this year. Heights' talent will seldom get a blow during the game, while Noblesville will come in with a much deeper lineup.

Seven different Huskies will start both on offense and defense.....Tyler Anderson at offensive and defensive tackle; Corbin Cook at offensive guard and defensive nose; Zach Stevens at offensive guard and defensive linebacker; Sterling Weatherford at offensive tight end and defensive safety; Nathan Roth at offensive fullback and defensive end; Riley White at offensive receiver and defensive linebacker and Caymn Lutz at offensive wide receiver and defensive safety.

That's a tough assignment going against a Noblesville team which does not have one Miller starting on both sides of the football.

"We will need to play at the same level this week that we played last week in order to have success," said Scheib. "This is a game which both teams know each other and the game will not be for the faint of

"I expect us to play fast and play physical in all three phases of the game," Scheib continued. "We are looking forward to Friday. It should be a great atmosphere, and we are looking forward to playing well."

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Young Blackhawks will face....

Long-time Sheridan foe

Not even Bud Wright, starting his 50th season as coach at Sheridan, can remember the first time the Blackhawks played Clinton Central.

"Not if you go back to when Clinton Central was Kirklin," said the coach. "That was before my time."

"I think the rivalry is the second-oldest in Indiana high school football," continued Wright, who as a coach has won more games than anyone in the history of Indiana football. "I think only Logansport and Peru have been playing longer."

Sheridan's trip to Clinton Central this Friday will be different than the rivalry in the past. This one is Sheridan's first contest in the new Hoosier Heartland Conference.

The conference consists of 10 schools, five each in each division. Sheridan and Clinton Central are in the East Division.

East Division: Tri-Central, Clinton Central, Eastern, Sheridan and Taylor.

West Division: Carroll, Clinton Prairie, North White, Frontier, Tri-County.

So far only two conference games have been played, both in the West Division. Last week Carroll defeated Tri-County 34-20 and Clinton Prairie defeated Frontier 52-16.

The ninth game into the season will be playoff week, matching the East against the West.

Sheridan defeated Clinton Central 42-12 last year. The Bulldogs haven't beaten the Blackhawks since a 13-6 decision in 2009.

Sheridan will enter this game in trouble in two areas. This is a very young Sheridan team. Six Blackhawks went down with injuries last week, including, Wright reports, a season-ending injury to freshman starting tackle Ian Pence and a four-week outage for wide-receiver Taylor Ly.

"It's a good thing that our roster is up in numbers," said Wright, who began the season with 55 Blackhawks.

Sheridan is coming off a 47-20 loss to Western Boone. Clinton Central started its season losing to Northwestern 26-13.

"Western Boone is a senior-dominated team," Wright said. "Our kids were shell-shocked."

Wright said his most outstanding players in the opener were junior nose tackle Alex Gipson on defense and senior quarterback Jake Chesney on offense.

"Our defensive backfield played well, but we didn't get a good pass rush," Wright continued. "The ground game was pretty even, but they passed for 193 yards against our defense."

Chesney rushed for 104 yards in seven carries. Senior K.J. Acevedo carried 17 times for 104 yards.

"Acevedo leeked good." Wright gold.

"Acevedo looked good," Wright said. Clinton Central, like Sheridan, is a young team, but a team consisting mainly

of juniors, and not, like Sheridan, mostly freshmen

Like last week, Sheridan's defense likely will see lots of passing. Wright believes the key is containing junior quarterback Keenan Orr. He passed for nearly 1,100 yards and nine touchdowns last season.

Clinton Central was 4-6 last year, including the regular season loss to Sheridan and then a 60-24 sectional licking by the Blackhawks.

"They list Orr as 6-6, 190 pounds," Wright said. "He has quarterback the team since his freshman year."

Wright has faced Clinton Central-Kirklin all 50 years at Sheridan. He said his most memorable game was in 1997 when Sheridan trailed 54-41 with five minutes left, and punting. The Blackhawks won 55-54.

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


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Southeastern looks for win
