

Paving begins on State Road 19 after Labor Day

A contract to resurface four miles of ramps on the section of highway for \$1.2 State Road 19 between 206th and 241st million. streets is scheduled to begin after Labor Day (on or after Sept. 8).

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) has contracted Rieth-Riley Construction to repair damaged pavement, pave a new asphalt surface and replace curb

Motorists should be alert for road construction signage and drive cautiously through the work zone. Flaggers will be used to direct traffic around work sites, and drivers should be prepared for slow or stopped traffic.

All work on the project is expected to be complete in November.

Tips for Driving Safely in Work Zones Stay alert and minimize distractions: zone crash is the rear-end collision. Don't text, talk or adjust controls.

Expect the unexpected: Normal speed help keep you and other drivers safe. limits may be reduced, traffic lanes may be changed, and workers may be nearby.

HCTSP to conduct Sobriety checkpoint in Hamilton County Aug. 29-30

sobriety checkpoint on the night of Saturof Sunday, Aug. 30.

At a sobriety checkpoint, law enforcement officers evaluate drivers for signs of alcohol or drug impairment at a specified point along a roadway, often depending upon the support of local property owners for the use of appropriate land. Checkpoint sites are selected based upon analysis of available crash and impaired driving arrest data along with a consideration of officer and driver safety.

The Hamilton County Traffic Safety the driver of being stopped at a Hamilton Partnership (HCTSP) will be conduct a County Traffic Safety Partnership sobriety checkpoint and asks for the driver's license day, Aug. 29 and the early morning hours and vehicle registration. If in the course of the contact with the driver the officer detects that alcohol may be involved and the driver may be impaired, or if some other issue arises, then the vehicle is directed into a pull-off area for further investigation. This further investigation may involve Standardized Field Sobriety Tests (SFSTs). If, on the other hand, all looks right during the initial contact, the driver is usually released in less than two minutes.

The HCTSP is a consortium of law During a checkpoint, vehicles are enforcement agencies in Hamilton County working to increase the usage of seatbelts, crease impaired driving with the overall County Sheriff's Office, Fishers Police Department, Carmel Police Department, Noblesville Police Department, and Westfield Police Department with the assistance of the Indiana State Police.

Temporary stoppages at off-ramp to SR 32 today

Between 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. tomorrow, Aug. 28, crews plan to perform work on the off-ramp from northbound US 31 to SR 32 that will require several temporary stoppages of up to 15 minutes each. During these stoppages, motorists will be directed to use US 31/196th Street.

Street/Oak Ridge Road begins on or after Aug. 31

The City of Westfield plans to close the intersection of 161st Street/Oak Ridge Road on or after Monday, Aug. 31, for the construction of a roundabout. This new roundabout is expected to open in early November. Detour signage will guide motorists around this closure. 103rd Street closure and US 31 traffic shift on or after September 8

On or after September 8, crews plan to permanently remove access to/from US 31 at 103rd Street.

Also, on or after September 8, all US 31 traffic between 96th Street to just north of 116th/Pennsylvania streets closure be-103rd Street will be shifted to the east side of the roadway so crews can begin work on the new lanes of US 31 on the west side of DOT plans to close the 116th/Pennsylvania the road. All turning movements to/from streets intersection for approximately 60 I-465 and 96th Street will remain available. Traffic will remain in this configuration through November.

When the traffic signal at US 31/103rd Street is removed, access from southbound US 31 to the eastbound and westbound I-465 ramps will become free-flowing from south of 106th Street.

As part of the final configuration of US 31, 103rd Street will become a cul-de-sac on either side of US 31, and nearby access City of Westfield closure at 161st to/from US 31 will remain available via I-465, 106th Street and 116th Street. The 103rd Street closure will not begin until after the City of Carmel opens 106th Street at Illinois Street (expected in early Septem-



Seven of Hamilton County's eight high school football teams

will compete in conferences this 2015 season. Only Guerin Catholic will not play in a conference. The Golden Eagles will begin in a new conference starting with the 2016 season.

Noblesville, Westfield, Hamilton South-

eastern and Fishers again will compete in the seven-team Hoosier Crossroads Conference. No changes in the HCC, with Avon, Brownsburg and Zionsville joining the four Hamilton County schools.

Five of the seven HCC teams started their season with victories, Noblesville over Lawrence North 55-50, Avon over Plainfield 41-0, Fishers over North Central 28-0, Westfield over Harrison 38-21 and Zionsville over McCutcheon 35-6. Southeastern lost to Carmel 28-7 and Brownsburg lost to Pike 55-34.

Carmel is back playing in the Metropolitan Conference, along with Ben Davis, Warren Central, Lawrence North, Center Grove, Pike, Lawrence Central and North

In the only conference game played last week, Center Grove defeated Warren Central 42-38. In non-conference games, Carmel defeated Southeastern 28-7, Ben Davis beat Tech 63-0, and Pike hammered Brownsburg 55-34. Lawrence Central lost to Cathedral 32-14, Lawrence North fell to defeated by Fishers 28-0





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
