The County Line

\$100 million could be coming for 37 upgrade

The word around the Statehouse is that the Pence administration is very close to releasing something in the neighborhood of \$100 million for Hamilton County to upgrade Ind. 37. That upgrading would involve roundabouts at intersections thus eliminating stoplights between Noblesville and I-69 at Fishers.

County officials confirmed three weeks ago the contents of a story in the Reporter revealing that

funding was likely to be approved for Hamilton County in order to relieve severe congestion caused largely by thousands of daily commuters driving to and from Indianapolis.

Reports at that time indicated there was hesitation by some local officials to buy into the plan because the new construction could impact some businesses along 37. More recently it appears that officials of the county and the cities of Noblesville and Fishers are now on board. But, it may cost money from the local governments because even \$100 million will not be enough to build the full project.


Local government has the additional money needed, estimated to be 10 to 20 million dollars. Certainly it would be worth the cost to get relief on one of the busiest high-

ways in the state. As for the impact on businesses, certainly government does not want to disrupt private taxpaying business. But, if a business has to give up a few parking places or move their entrance back a short distance it's not too great a price to pay for the overall public good.

The current unofficial reports indicate the big announcement will come this week or next with great media fanfare. Not only will the funding for the 37 reconstruction be a big win for Hamilton County, but it could be helpful in Gov. Pence's campaign for re-election next year, something that may well have enabled the project to get front-burner status among highway projects.

County Commissioners to meet Monday regarding...

Judicial Center expansion

We may be getting close to learning what may happen concerning the expansion of the Judicial Center in downtown Noblesville.

If not close, then closer.

The Hamilton County Commissioners will hold a special meeting on Monday, the purpose being a discussion of the Judicial Center. The session, which is open to the public, will begin at 12 noon in Conference Room 1A in the Judicial Center.

Some type of expansion is necessary, following several months ago the County's decision to keep its offices in downtown

Noblesville and not expand to land owned by the County on the east side of the city.

Since that time, lots of questions. How? When? Where? How much?

First, it was a dollars issue. State law, which since has been changed, at that time allowing Hamilton County to spend \$12 million or less of its own money.

"We can't do the expansion for \$12 million," at that time County Attorney Mike Howard told the Hamilton County Reporter.

The other way to raise funds would be a referendum.

"It would be difficult to have a referendum passed," said Commissioner Steve Dillinger. "The schools did it, but they had the advantage of a tie in with Ivy Tech

coming to Noblesville. We don't have an ivy tech in our situation.

Everyone involved agreed that the expansion must happen. Along with the possibility of three new courts in Hamilton County, county offices are outgrowing their space.

"No one needs to tell us what we need to build or when," Howard said. "The growth here in Hamilton County tells us there is a need.

"This facility was built for county's needs for 25 years. That was back in 1990, so we hit the nail on the head," Howard added.

“Building costs have gone up 30 percent said Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt. “Cost will continue to rise, so it’s a penalty to the taxpayers if we can’t do all of this now.”

The County has awaited a study from the architects and that study now seems to be in place as the Commissioners meet on Monday.

One thing has changed since the County first began talking and planning for the expansion. Just recently there was a big squabble between the Commissioners and the Hamilton County Common Council over the \$3 million funding of an emergency training center in the county. The County Council, which must approve funding of all County projects, said no on this one by a close 4-3 vote.

Following that vote, two things happened. Council members Jim Belden, Steve Schwartz and Amy Massillamany, all voting in favor of the training center, walked out of the meeting. Paul Ayers, Brad Beaver, Rick McKinney and Fred Glynn, all opposed to building the center, remained and Beaver offered a motion to fund a \$568,000 fire tower, to be built on the center.

The Commissioners responded by asking who would receive the \$568,000 since, without the \$3 million from the county, there would be no training center.

Also, for such a funding proposal by the County Council, the Commissioners would then be on the other side of the coin and need to approve the dollars.

Will that last hassle between the County Council and County Commissioners boil over to any plan to expand the Judicial Center?

In a recent Commissioners meeting, \$475,000 was approved for the funding of a youth assistance program headed by Judge Steve Nation.

“You may want to hold a meeting with the Council to present your plan,” Heirbrandt cautioned Nation.

“We had a plan (concerning the training center) which didn’t go over so well,” Dillinger added.

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Construction begins in September for new...

Roundabout at Carrigan and Hague roads

The transformation of the three-way stop at Carrigan and Hague roads to a roundabout will begin in September. The overall project will cost \$1.1 million but because of funding received from the Indiana Department of Transportation the City of Noblesville's portion is \$150,000.

Utility relocation was recently completed and construction signs are being installed in the work zone. Rieth-Riley Construction will begin work on the intersection on Tuesday, September 1 with the installation of storm sewers.

While closures are limited, the public should be aware that construction activity will occur while the intersection is open to traffic.

One 20-day closure is planned for the project beginning on Wednesday, October 21. Hague Road immediately north of the intersection will be closed to complete work. During this period, Carrigan Road will still remain open for eastbound and westbound traffic, while Hague Road will remain open south of Carrigan Road. During the closure, it is recommended that northbound traffic use James Road to 211th Street to Hague Road or detour west to either Schullery Road or Mill

Creek Road west of the reservoir.

Key dates for the project include:

- September 1 – Construction begins.

- Week of October 21 – Hague Road north of Carrigan Closed for approximately 20 days.

- November 16 – Roundabout fully open to traffic.

- June 30, 2016 – Deadline for final surface and pavement markings (project complete).

* All dates are weather dependent.

Reminders about traffic restrictions will be announced during the construction process.

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Fishers Marching Band Invitational features 21 top bands

The Fourth Annual Fishers High School Marching Band Invitational takes place from 4 to 10:00 p.m. on Saturday, September 12, 2015, at the Fishers High School Reynolds Tiger Stadium. children under five are free. Admission is also free to any attendee who purchases a raffle ticket for the Fishers Band Booster Car Raffle at the gate. Entrants will have a

chance to win a 2015 Honda CRV or Civic Si from Fishers of Honda. The winner of the raffle will be announced at the end of the performances and does not need to be present to win.

The event opens with an afternoon leadership workshop conducted by Dr. Matthew Arau and the competition features a world-class, seven-member judging panel and an eighth evaluator/clinician. Bands performing in the Fishers Invitational are judged using the Bands of America judging system and are evaluated on general effect, music, and visual performances.

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
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Good for county football....

Millers-Huskies series

It was fun watching the atmosphere generated by the Noblesville at Hamilton Heights football game on Friday, a game won by the Millers, 35-9.



While seated high in the press box on the west side of the field, even following the opening kick-off, you could see a long line of traffic from the south trying to get into the Heights facility.

What really was encouraging was the number of students, from both schools, who were at the game.

Can this game ever become a true rivalry? Likely not considering the enrollments of the two schools. Noblesville is nearly four times larger than Heights. Football is a game of numbers.

But, for whatever reason, it appears that fans of the two schools treated the game as a rivalry, and that's good for high school football in Hamilton County.

The series will continue next season in Game 6. Carmel will replace Heights in Game 2 on Noblesville's schedule.

Last Friday's victory was Noblesville's seventh against the Huskies, without a loss. Actually, only one game has been close. In 1997, the Millers edged Heights 13-6.

If you're willing to go back to the days when Hamilton Heights was Jackson Central, Noblesville won six times and JC won two times. The Eagles were very strong when beating Noblesville 18-6 in 1948 and 26-20 in 1949. That series ended with a 41-0 Noblesville win in 1953.

I would guess it will be fun watching Noblesville and Hamilton Heights this season.

Heights, now 1-1 with a win over Mt. Vernon and the loss to Noblesville, this Friday will jump into the new Hoosier Conference, playing at Lewis Cass. Heights and Cass formerly were members of the Mid-Indiana Conference.

Heights had defeated Lewis Cass five consecutive seasons before Cass pulled out a 26-14 win last season. Cass and Noblesville were the only teams to beat the Huskies during the regular season in 2014.

Cass started this season with a 50-0 loss to Pioneer and then last Friday defeated Churubusco 23-0.

Noblesville, meanwhile, this week will take on Fishers at Hare Chevrolet Stadium. It's a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game. It will be a battle between two rivals in the "Highway 37 Shootout."

This will be the 11th meeting between the Tigers and Millers. Noblesville won the first two, but only one since then. Two years ago Noblesville won 27-24 during the regular season and then lost 17-13 in the sectional, the only post-season meeting between the two schools.

The last three games have been settled by a grand total of just 10 points.

Fishers, after beating North Central to open the season, last Friday scored a 20-8 impressive win over Pike.

Carmel rally falls short

In a game played Saturday at the University of Cincinnati, Carmel fell behind LaSalle 27-0 in the first half and then rallied to nearly pull out the victory.

LaSalle held on for a 35-28 victory.

LaSalle scored the first four touchdowns before Ethan Merriweather caught a 23-yard pass from Michael Viktrup to put Coach John Hebert's Greyhounds on the board with nine second left in the first half.

Carmel began its comeback when Tobias Watkins scored from the one with 8:33 showing on the third quarter clock.

The Greyhounds scored again with 14:03 left in the third quarter, Viktrup racing 23 yards into the end zone.

LaSalle scored what proved to be the winning touchdown with 6:10 left in the game.

Carmel bounced right back, Viktrup scoring again from the seven with only 40 seconds left in the game.

Carmel attempted an on-sides kick. LaSalle recovered and ran out the clock.

LaSalle dominated the stats, rushing for 229 yards and passing for 158. The Greyhounds ran for 171 yards and passed for 119. Viktrup was 14-of-29 through the air.

Watkins and Viktrup led Carmel's running game. Watkins carried 19 times for 90 yards and Viktrup 11 times for 78 yards.

Jalen Walker caught six passes for 60 yards.

Carmel will carry a 1-1 record into its first MIC Conference game of the season this Friday, hosting Center Grove.


