# **State Road 19 paving** to begin in Cicero area

A contract to resurface four miles of State Road 19 between 206th and 241st streets is scheduled to begin after Labor Day (on or after Sept. 8)

The Indiana Department of Transportation (INDOT) has contracted Rieth-Riley Construction to repair damaged pavement, pave a new asphalt surface and replace curb ramps on the section of highway for \$1.2 million.

Motorists should be alert for road construction signage and drive cautiously through the work zone. Flaggers will be used to direct traffic around work sites, and drivers should be prepared for slow or stopped traffic.

All work on the project is expected to be complete in November. Tips for Driving Safely in Work Zones

Stay alert and minimize distractions: Don't text, talk or adjust controls.

Expect the unexpected: Normal speed limits may be reduced, traffic lanes may be changed, and workers may be nearby. Slow down: Speeding is the major cause of work zone crashes.

Don't tailgate: The most common work zone crash is the rear-end collision.

Pay attention to signs: Warning signs help keep you and other drivers safe.

Schedule enough time to drive safely: Expect delays and leave early.

# \$100 million could be coming for 37 upgrade

Pence administration is very close to releasing something in the neighborhood of \$100 million for Hamilton

County to upgrade Ind. 37. That upgrading would involve roundabouts at intersections thus eliminating stoplights Noblesville and I-69 at Fishers.

County officials confirmed three weeks ago the contents of a story in the Reporter

The word around the approved for Hamilton County in order to Statehouse is that the relieve severe congestion caused largely by thousands of daily commuters driving to and

from Indianapolis. Reports at that time indicated there was hesitation by some local officials to buy into the plan because the new construction could impact some businesses along 37. More recently it appears that officials of the between county and the cities of Noblesville and Fishers are now on board. But, it may cost money from the local governments because

revealing that funding was likely to be even \$100 million will not be enough to

build the full project.

Local government has the additional money needed, estimated to be 10 to 20 million dollars. Certainly it would be worth the cost to get relief on one of the busiest highways in the state. As for the impact on businesses, certainly government does not want to disrupt private taxpaying business. But, if a business has to give up a few parking places or move their entrance back a short distance it's not too great a price to pay for the overall public good.

The current unofficial reports indicate the big announcement will come this week or next with great media fanfare. Not only will the funding for the 37 reconstruction be a big win for Hamilton County, but it could be helpful in Gov. Pence's campaign for

re-election next year, something that may well have enabled the project to get frontburner status among highway projects.

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
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
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
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# Finding a life to savor

A one-yard spurt by quarterback Luke Mellow with 36 seconds left in the first half enabled Noblesville to enter halftime with a 21-7 advantage.

"That was a big touchdown," said Heights coach Mitch Street. "But our problem was the mistakes we made....the penalties; the dropped passes, and the passes which missed.

'The way we ran the football tonight, I would have thought we had a chance to win the game," Street added.

Hamilton Heights ran for 200 yards, keyed by the rushing of Clayton Cowan, 24 carries for 95 yards, and Jesse Brown, four carries for 77 yards. Brown scored Heights' TD on a 62-yard run in the first quarter.

Noblesville pulled away from the 21-7 first half lead by blanking Heights, except
