The County Council has budget hearings scheduled on the 8th, 9th and 10th to review each of the departmental budgets that make up



The courthouse is an example of French Second Empire architecture, believed to be the only intact surviving courthouse of such design in the state. This style was popular in the 1860s-70s. It was built in 1878 at a cost of \$100,000.

Pioneer Construction Company has the contract to do painting of trim, tuck pointing of some brickwork and replacing of some window ledges. Inside the building repairs and upgrading of the elevator is planned.

The work will also include painting and repairs on the former jail, currently the county museum located adjacent to the Courthouse.

Marion native and founding partner, Shelby Bowen, said he believes The Refinery will be a great addition to the thriving entrepreneurial culture in central Indiana.

"The Refinery team is excited to work with residents, students, and visitors, of all ages and trades," said Bowen, "and to provide extraordinary local and state resources for entrepreneurs to continue to start and grow businesses in central Indiana."

The Refinery will offer co-working desks, conference rooms, private offices, Wi-Fi, a café area, patio seating, and other professional office amenities for members and guests as well as educational programming for new entrepreneurs. Bowen said the center will also house a large, versatile classroom intended for entrepreneurial-oriented youth and adult programming.

The Hamilton Southeastern volleyball team has become good at winning dramatic matches against ranked opponents.

The Class 4A No. 3 Royals bounced back after dropping the first set at Avon Thursday to win the next three sets and defeat the 4A No. 5 Orioles. It was a tough match, as Southeastern won all three of those sets by two points, and two of them went into volleyball's version of overtime: A team usually wins a set when it gets to 25 points, but it must win by two points, so if the score is 24-24, a team has to get to 26 points, and so forth.

The Royals absorbed a 20-25 first set loss to battle Avon all the way to a 32-30 second set victory. Southeastern won the third set 25-23, and needed extra points again in the fourth before finally clinching that set - and the match - 30-28.

Hayden Huybers had another career night with 23 kills in the middle. The outside tandem of Meredith Phillips and Caitlin Kane combined for 17 kills. Kenzie Hinshaw had 42 assists running a highly effective offense for the Royals.

"I was really proud of how our captains and seniors stepped up in set two and got us back in the match," said HSE coach Jason Young

The Royals are now 10-1 on the season. Up next is what Young calls "Tiger week," with the Yorktown Tigers on Tuesday and the Fishers Tigers on Thursday. 
