## Former choir director sentenced to 16 years



Douce

A former Noblesville High School choir director will spend more than a decade in prison.  
Michael Douce was sentenced to 16 years Thursday on two counts of child seduction. Douce took a plea deal in August, pleading guilty to the two charges.  
Douce had originally been charged with 11 felonies related to inappropriate

sexual conduct with two female students and was scheduled to stand trial in July. But in late June, he requested Hamilton County Superior Court 1 Judge Steven Nation to vacate the jury trial, and scheduled a plea hearing in August.  
Douce was arrested in January. Court documents that were released at that time indicated school officials and police first became aware of the incidents surrounding the case when the mother of one of the victims notified No-

blesville High School Principal Jeff Bryant that she had found nude pictures of Douce on her daughter's cell phone. Documents indicate Bryant took possession of the student's cell phone and notified Noblesville Police Department.  
Noblesville detectives learned that Douce first began texting the students during the 2013-2014 school year. Douce was also arrested in June for violating a no-contact order with one of the victims.

### Winkler deemed fit to stand trial

A Fishers teenager accused of murder has been declared mentally fit to stand trial.  
Maxwell Winkler was arrested last November for allegedly killing Henry Kim, 73, Fishers, in the Windemere subdivision on Nov. 1. His attorney filed an insanity defense last

December.  
Kim was found the evening of Nov. 1 with his throat slashed and shot. When police officers arrived, they found three .22 caliber shell casings near Kim's body.  
Police were searching a wooded area for evidence two days later, when they located Winkler. A search revealed he was carrying two knives. Police indicated one of the knives appeared to have blood on it. Later, it was revealed that there were handwritten notes by Winkler that were described by prosecutors as "A desire or methodology for planning to kill or injure people, were not the first of their kind."  
Winkler's case is scheduled to go to trial in January.

## Special Census coming to Westfield in October

The US Census Bureau will soon begin going door to door in Westfield in order to get an updated population count. This new count will help the city qualify for state revenues for essential services like street repair, education, programs and other important services.

Special census employment opportunities will be posted on the Census Bureau's regional office website at: <http://www.census.gov/regions/chicago/www/jobs/>. Crew leaders will be paid \$15.24 per hour, enumerators \$13.74 per hour and clerical staff \$10.74 per hour. Supervisors will be paid \$16.74 per hour. Prospective applicants:

- Should be at least 18 years old
- Must have a valid driver's license and a vehicle available for their use
- Should have the ability to hear responses and to read questionnaires
- Should be able to work several hours a day (a minimum of 20 hours per week), which often includes a lot of walking and climbing stairs
- Should be available for day, evening and weekend work as needed
- Should be available to attend a three-day training session
- Should have access to a private, corded home telephone.

Census Bureau enumerators will begin contacting residents mid-October. More information will be coming soon on ways to get involved.

# Tigers defeat Millers

“Chinn is a special type of player,” said Wimmer. “I didn’t use him as much tonight. I thought maybe I used him a little too much last week (in a win over Pike).”

On offense last evening, Chinn carried 7 times for 46 yards.

“We’ve got other backs capable of getting the job done,” Wimmer said.

Against the Millers, Trevor Newman had a big night with 14 carries for 96 yards. Fishers quarterback Zach Eaton also had an outstanding night throw the pigskin, hitting on 10-of-19 for 170 yards. Kade Orris had 4 receptions for 64 yards and Keyshawn Burrell 3 for 56 yards.

The game was another outstanding defensive performance for a Tiger team which now is 3-0 overall and 1-0 in the HCC.

“We played a strong game on defense,” Wimmer agreed after watching his team hold a good offensive Noblesville team to 88 yards rushing and 139 yards passing.

“Jarel Youree is tough for them,” Wimmer said. “And the quarterback (Luke Melloh) does a good job running and throwing the football.”

Fishers limited Youree to 41 yards rushing in six carries. Melloh was 15-of-27 through the air for 136 yards.

After Fishers had a 17-0 lead, Melloh and Youree got Noblesville on the board with just 26 seconds left in the first half on a 45-yard pass play.

But, before that happened the handwriting seemed to be on the wall for Noblesville. Fishers scored on a 10-yard run by Michael Noble with 2:59 left in the first quarter and then the Tigers took a 10-0 lead on a 20-yard field goal by Ben Norton with 9:54 left in the second frame. The Tigers went up 17-0 on Chinn’s 19-yard TD run.

The touchdown pass from Melloh to Youree seemed to give Noblesville a lift as the first half ended, but then Fishers answered that with 14 points in the third quarter. Eaton passed to Angelo Howze for 34 yards and a touchdown and then Chinn added a huge play when he recovered the block punt by Jake Winkle and returned it for a touchdown.

Noblesville scored with 2:06 left in the third period on a 16-yard run by Youree, but Fishers countered with a 17-yard TD run by Trevor Newman with 8:11 remaining in the game.

“Fishers is a good football team,” said Noblesville coach Lance Scheib, whose Millers are now 2-1 overall.

“They had more discipline than we did tonight,” Scheib added. “When you get to the one, you’ve got to score.”

Most of Noblesville damage came through the air. With Melloh doing the firing, Travis Gillian caught 6 passes for 39 yards; Jackson Thurman 5 for 30; Youree 3 for 48 and JD Scheib 2 for 22.

Fishers will host city rival Hamilton Southeastern next Friday, the same night Noblesville will travel to Westfield.

# Heights wins at Cass

Henry Magdun kicked both extra points

Hamilton Heights didn't score again until the fourth period. Leading 14-9, the Huskies put away the Kings when Clayton Cowan pounded over from the six-yard line.

Cowan, a junior, did most of Heights' damage on the ground. He carried 22 times for 77 yards.

Hamilton Heights rushed for only 89 yards, while Lewis Cass rushed for 141. But, the big difference was through the air. While Jones and Feltz were combining for 257 yards passing, the Huskies held Lewis Cass to 58 yards throwing the pigskin.

"We got the two first quarter touchdowns and then didn't score again until the second quarter," said Street. "We moved the ball but didn't score a lot.

"Our defense played well," said the Heights coach. "Sterling Weatherford did a nice job and so did (Nathan) Roth at defensive end."

Weatherford, White and Jesse Brown sparked the passing attack. Weatherford caught 3 passes for 62 yards; White 7 for 86 and Brown 5 for 51.

With the victory, Heights moved to 2-1 on the season and to 1-0 in the new Hoosier Conference.

The Huskies will be on the road again next Friday, playing at Tipton.

# Another Carmel comeback falls short

Just like last week, Carmel tried to make another comeback against a tough opponent in its Friday night football game.

Unfortunately, just like last week, the Greyhounds fell short. Carmel blasted back from a 17-0 deficit to take the lead in the third quarter, but Center Grove scored minutes after, and held off the 'Hounds to win 24-21 at Carmel Stadium.

The loss drops the Greyhounds to 1-2, and 0-1 in the Metropolitan Conference.

"First glance, I think we made a lot of mistakes," said Carmel coach John Hebert. "You turn the ball over twice in the first half. Defensively, we made a lot of mistakes that were preventable. Just not making the right adjustments and not getting lined up right. A lot of that is absolutely a credit to Center Grove. They're a great team and you can't make mistakes like that against a great team."

With 2:02 remaining, Jalen Walker ran the ball in from a short distance - the official stats call it a "0-yard gain." But what matters are the points, and Walker got Carmel's first six.

Seconds later, Michael Viktrup found Kurt Rafdal for a 5-yard pass that got the 'Hounds a second touchdown in less than two minutes. Nick Stacy kicked both extra points, and Carmel was back in it, 17-14, at halftime.

The 'Hounds then made a resolute run down the field in the third quarter to grab the lead. Viktrup did it by himself this time, racing in from 11 yards to give his team the lead. Stacy again kicked the extra point.

It seemed as if Carmel had the momentum, but the Trojans yanked it away when Titus McCoy ran the ball in from three yards.

That would be the last score of the game. Neither team got much room in the fourth quarter, although a potential Center Grove touchdown pass was broken up by Nathan Ebikwo midway through the period. Carmel had one more drive after that, but were stopped on fourth down.

Viktrup had a nice game, completing 12 of 20 passes for 147 yards. Walker caught five of them for 93 yards. Tobias Watkins was the leading rusher, gaining 89 yards in 20 carries.

Next up is a trip to Pike, which upset defending Class 6A state champion Ben Davis in a rain-delayed barn-burner Friday night. Despite the 1-2 start, Hebert, a longtime assistant before moving up to head coach this season, isn't hitting the panic button.

"We've been here before," said the coach. "This isn't new territory. You play tough teams and they show you what you have to work on and then it's up to you to learn how to fix it and get it right. That's what we'll do. I'm certainly not discouraged with our team's effort or the character of these kids. They fought hard and we've just got to look at just exactly, specifically where we need to get better."
