There are lots of connecting parts to the expansion. More space will be needed at the Hamilton County Corrections Facility and how will all of this tie into preserving a courthouse which dates back to the horse and buggy days in Noblesville.

The Courthouse was built in 1879.

The Commissioners stressed to Structurepoint that the historical value of the Courthouse must be maintained.

The Courthouse currently is going through a face lift, which Heirbrandt explained has nothing to do with the expansion at the Judicial Building.

What will happen first on the west side of the building is that the first floor will be expanded for immediate usage and the second and third floors will be shells until addition space is needed.

"It is all part of a master plan, including what must be completed at the Correction Facility (on the east side of Noblesville)," Heirbrandt said.

Space in the Courthouse likely will be rented out to different (non-government) offices, as likely will unused space in the Judicial Building.

Structurepoint is being told when talking with department heads that there is a great need for conference space.

"We have to take care of the courts," Heirbrandt said, "and that is an immediate need. We've been told (by the State) that two new courts will be needed very soon."

# Golden Eagles get Saturday victory

No matter what kind of win it is, a football win always feels good.

Guerin Catholic coach Tom Dilley admitted that his team's 13-7 win over Marmion Academy Saturday at the Eagles Nest wasn't pretty. But it was a good way for Guerin to bounce back from last week's loss, and also got GC's record back on the winning side at 2-1.

"That was a good, physical team and a good, physical game," Dilley said of Marmion, which traveled to the Eagles Nest from Aurora, Ill.

After a scoreless first quarter, Guerin Catholic got on the board when Elliott Charlebois connected with Isaac Fettig for a 3-yard touchdown pass. Caleb Quick kicked the extra point.

Quick would score the remainder of the Golden Eagles' points, as he made two field goals in the fourth quarter to put Guerin up 13-0. Dilley also credited Quick with doing well punting, including one that wound up inside the five.

Marmion did score with 1:47 left, keeping things interesting right at the end. The Cadets tried on an onside kick, but it didn't go the necessary 10 yards. Guerin got the ball back and held on for the win.

Charlebois had a nice passing game, completing nine of 15 attempts for 124 yards and the one touchdown. Brennan Thieneman was the leading rusher, with 77 yards in 25 carries.

Next up for the Golden Eagles is Indianapolis Howe, who they will play on Friday. The game is actually an away game for Guerin, but it will be played at the Eagles Nest with Howe hosting.




