

sions, computer monitors/peripherals/mice/keyboards, mainframe computers, integrated circuits surge protectors servers, modems, pagers, radio scanners, DVD/VCR players, fax machines, answering machines, video game systems, printers, power supplies and backup power supplies, toner cartridges, copiers, motors, electronic wiring, power cables, power supplies, satellite components, car batteries, cameras, Christmas Tree lights, small and large appliances, stereo equipment, microwave ovens, cash registers, and metal filing cabinets, shelving and office furniture.

## Facelift for Old Courthouse, Historic Jail

For the past month, people

driving past or walking near the old Hamilton County Courthouse and Historic Jail might have noticed workers and scaffolding around the buildings.

Those are both part of a maintenance project involving both historic buildings. Both the old Courthouse and the Historic Jail, which now houses the Hamilton County Historical Society, are getting what Steve Wood, Hamilton County buildings and grounds superintendent, is calling a "major restoration." The work being done on the buildings includes "cleaning of the brick and the stone, sealing, caulking, painting and repair of anything that's wrong," said Wood.

Since both the buildings are on the National Register of Historic Places, the building cannot be altered; it must retain its character and integrity. The guidelines are posted on the National Park Services Web site, and one of them says, "Distinctive materials, features, finishes, and construction techniques or examples of craftsmanship that characterize a property will be preserved."

from the road," said Wood. "Carbon monoxide doesn't stick. You don't get that black film on it and it'll come off easier and help protect it."

Pioneer's owner, John Reid, was on hand Thursday afternoon painting the shutters that had been removed from the Historic Jail building.

"It'll be pretty much a complete makeover," said Reid of the project.

Access to the old Courthouse is still available, and the Historical Society remains open at its regular hours. Wood said while some areas have had to be blocked off, the county is keeping walkways open.

"And everybody's been pretty understanding about it," said Wood. "Had a lot of compliments about what they've already completed, like on the front side where people can see."

One note: The elevators inside the old Courthouse will be shut down in mid-November for updates and improvements to bring them in line with Americans with Disabilities Act requirements.

Work on the project begin on Aug. 1, and Wood said everyone is hoping for it to be finished by the first of December. It will be the culmination of three years of work, which included figuring out what all needed to be done, and also getting the funding approved. Wood himself spent 78 hours on a lift over a year's span taking pictures for the purpose of the project.

# 103rd Street closed, Illinois Street open

Beginning after the evening rush hour on Tuesday, crews permanently removed access to/from US 31 at 103rd

While crews adjust lane configurations in preparation for the traffic shift (see next story), the existing signal will ists on 103rd Street will no longer have direct access 16 to/from US 31. On Friday, Sept. 11, when the traffic shift is expected to be complete, the signal at US 31/103rd Street 116th/Pennsylvania streets intersection for approximately will be removed and traffic heading south to Meridian Street and to I-465 south of 106th Street will become

As part of the final configuration of US 31, 103rd Street will become a cul-de-sac on either side of US 31, and nearby access to/from US 31 will remain available via I-465, 106th Street and 116th Street. Also, the 111th Street overpass is expected to open in mid-September, which will allow eastbound and westbound access over US 31. The 126th Street/Carmel Drive bridge is now also open to two lanes in each direction over US 31.

Access to/from US 31 and St. Vincent Health/Heart Center will remain available via 106th Street.

#### US 31 traffic shift between 96th and 103rd streets today and tomorrow

After the 103rd Street closure, crews will work to shift traffic on US 31 in this area.

Overnight tonight, Sept. 9, and Thursday, Sept. 10, all US 31 traffic between 96th Street to just north of 103rd Street – including a new roundabout at 106th and Illinois, Street will be shifted to the east side of the roadway so just west of U.S. 31 – was opened to traffic over the Labor west side of the road. Turning movements to/from 106th Carmel project that will provide an alternative parallel Street, I-465 and 96th Street will remain available. Illinois Street will be a valuable option for local traffic not wanting to travel along that highway for their north/south commute."

> The section of Illinois Street will be a key link between 106th and 116th Streets that previously did not exist. From an Economic Development standpoint, the \$7 million road project helped spur the Bridges Development, which will include a major grocery store and restaurants, while also unlocking several parcels along U.S. 31 that previously did not have good access. In addition, Illinois Street will serve as a buffer between future commercial projects and the largely residential neighborhoods along Spring Mill Road.

advantage in playoff games. Fishers has won the last two games in the series, 41-10 last year and 51-31 two years ago. When the Royals

and the Tigers meet this Friday at Reynolds Tiger Stadium on the campus of Fishers High, Fishers will come in unbeaten in three games and HSE will bring a 2-1 record.

Both teams are coming off huge Hoosier Crossroads Conference wins, Fishers over Noblesville 38-13 and Southeastern over Avon 21-18. Southeastern's lone loss was to Carmel 28-7, and the Royals have also beaten North Central 41-14. Fishers has defeated North Central 28-0 and Pike 20-8.

"Southeastern showed that it is once again one of the top teams in 6A football with the defeat of Avon," said Fishers coach Rick Wimmer. "They are an outstanding tackling team which did a very good job of forcing Avon to the air and then Like, for example, the getting pressure on them. They sacked Avon four times and created fumbles.

"Offensively, Carter Poiry is executing very well, spreading the ball around to a number of weapons and creating some big

On the ground Jeremy Chinn has rushed for 226 yards in 37 carries and Jermaine Huddleston has 121 yards in 31 carries.




