

Entries will be displayed on downtown Noblesville light poles from October 1 - October 31. Scarecrows will be discarded after they are removed from the light poles on October 31.

CONSTRUCTION: Scarecrows must be durable and able to stand up to sun, wind and rain. Use care in choosing your materials. Fake straw is recommended. All decorations must be firmly attached to your scarecrow. Minimum height is 4 feet, maximum height is 6 feet. Each scarecrow must have a vertical wood support for the body. All scarecrows will be displayed vertically on the light poles. Noblesville Main Street will furnish a basic frame, which can be picked up at the Noblesville Main Street office, Monday – Thursday between 1:00-4:00 p.m. starting September 14.

PRIZES: First place prizes will be awarded in the following categories: Adult (15 & over), Youth (14 & under), Business, Most Hipstoric, Best Community Pride and People's Choice (\$1 = 1 vote at the Fall Festival on October 2).

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Noblesville at Westfield

Hamilton County football fans may, at times, get trapped into believing that most local matchups are "rivalries." They're not, if the true meaning of a rivalry is both teams grab their share of victories.

Take Noblesville and Westfield, for example. The Millers are jut 1-9 against Hamilton Southeastern and 3-7 while playing Fishers the last 10 years. Westfield is 2-8 against Southeastern and 1-9 against Fishers. Neither Noblesville nor Westfield has faced Carmel in a regular season game during that 10-year period.

But, when it comes to Noblesville and Westfield meeting, now that's a true rivalry. In the last 10 games, Noblesville and Westfield are 5-5.

That's one reason much will be on the line Friday when the Millers visit Westfield's brand new Riverview Health Stadium.

Also on the line is this game is a Hoosier Crossroads Conference matchup. Noblesville has started its HCC season in a 0-1 hole after losing to Fishers, 38-13, last week. Westfield is at the top of the HCC after a 45-30 smashing of Zionsville.

Overall, the Shamrocks are 3-0; Noblesville is 2-1.

This victory Friday means a lot.

"Westfield's quarterback, Ryan Pepiot, has really improved from last season," Noblesville coach Lance Scheib looks at Westfield. "Pepiot has made some incredible throws through 3 weeks. He is going to be a handful to slow down.

"I am impressed with their offensive line, and their wide receivers catch everything they touch," Scheib continued. "Their running game has been solid, and with the quarterback runs they will cause us issues that we will need to address."

Pepoit is 58-of-90 for 711 yards slinging the pigskin. He has tossed for five touchdowns and has been interception

Pepoit has a car load of receivers. Evan Manley has 14 catches for 242 yards; Lucas Schultz 13 for 158 and Will McCool 16 grabs for 161 yards.

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

Scheib wasn't as impressed with Noblesville's loss to Fishers.


"Very disappointed how we played," said the Noblesville coach. "We played without focus and this caused too many mental mistakes and thus the game was not played the way we wanted it to be played."


