Kathy becomes first female Lion

History was made at the beginning of the Noblesville Lions Club meeting on Wednesday night.

For the first time since the club opened in 1942, a woman became a member of the club. She is certainly a familiar face in Noblesville: Kathy (Richardson) Williams, the State Representative for Indiana House District 29.

"It's a great honor," said Williams. "It's a great club. When Dave Marsh called and

asked me if I would consider it, I knew that there had not been females in here before, but knew that they had actually voted to do that several years ago, and that there are Lions Club members, female Lions Club members across the state. I was honored that he asked me to consider it, and look forward to working with all of the other Lions Club members."

Williams noted that the Lions Club is around at "nearly every function" she attends, doing everything from picking up

trash to serving food to giving out dictionaries to children.

" They're very important to our community and I'm glad to be a part of it," said Williams.

David Marsh, the president of the Noblesville Lions Club, said that the club "was male only " for many years.

"But I think this could really stimulate membership and there's a lot of talent, un-

Entries will be displayed on downtown Noblesville light poles from October 1 - October 31. Scarecrows will be discarded after they are removed from the light poles on October 31.

CONSTRUCTION: Scarecrows must be durable and able to stand up to sun, wind and rain. Use care in choosing your materials. Fake straw is recommended. All decorations must be firmly attached to your scarecrow. Minimum height is 4 feet, maximum height is 6 feet. Each scarecrow must have a vertical wood support for the body. All scarecrows will be displayed vertically on the light poles. Noblesville Main Street will furnish a basic frame, which can be picked up at the Noblesville Main Street office, Monday – Thursday between 1:00-4:00 p.m. starting September 14.

PRIZES: First place prizes will be awarded in the following categories: Adult (15 & over), Youth (14 & under), Business, Most Hipstoric, Best Community Pride and People's Choice (\$1 = 1 vote at the Fall Festival on October 2).

Two huge rivals will clash....

Noblesville at Westfield

Hamilton County football fans may, at times, get trapped into believing that most local matchups are “rivalries.” They’re not, if the true meaning of a rivalry is both teams grab their share of victories.

Take Noblesville and Westfield, for example. The Millers are just 1-9 against Hamilton Southeastern and 3-7 while playing Fishers the last 10 years. Westfield is 2-8 against Southeastern and 1-9 against Fishers. Neither Noblesville nor Westfield has faced Carmel in a regular season game during that 10-year period.

But, when it comes to Noblesville and Westfield meeting, now that’s a true rivalry. In the last 10 games, Noblesville and Westfield are 5-5.

That’s one reason much will be on the line Friday when the Millers visit Westfield’s brand new Riverview Health Stadium.

Also on the line is this game is a Hoosier Crossroads Conference matchup. Noblesville has started its HCC season in a 0-1 hole after losing to Fishers, 38-13, last week. Westfield is at the top of the HCC after a 45-30 smashing of Zionsville.

Overall, the Shamrocks are 3-0; Noblesville is 2-1.

This victory Friday means a lot. “Westfield’s quarterback, Ryan Pepiot, has really improved from last season,” Noblesville coach Lance Scheib looks at Westfield. “Pepiot has made some incredible throws through 3 weeks. He is going to be a handful to slow down.

“I am impressed with their offensive line, and their wide receivers catch everything they touch,” Scheib continued. “Their running game has been solid, and with the quarterback runs they will cause us issues that we will need to address.”

Pepiot is 58-of-90 for 711 yards slinging the pigskin. He has tossed for five touchdowns and has been interception twice.

Pepiot has a car load of receivers. Evan Manley has 14 catches for 242 yards; Lucas Schultz 13 for 158 and Will McCool 16 grabs for 161 yards.

On the ground, Coach Jake Gilbert’s Shamrocks can hit an opponent in different ways. Pepiot has carried 35 times for 185 yards; Brandon Karsnick 35 times for 173 yards and Johnathan Swiden has 200 yards in 31 trips.

“We have a ton of respect for Noblesville,” said Gilbert. “They are very well coached. We have barely scored against them in the past. Their offensive line is always coached up. Last year Jarel Youree lit us up and obviously their senior quarterback (Luke Melloh) plays with poise and energy. We will have to stop the run much

better than we did last week. I think this will be a great game.”

Melloh has hit on 37-of-69 passes for 354 yards and four touchdowns. He has not been intercepted. Melloh and Youree key the running game. Melloh has carried 47 times for 143 yards and four touchdowns and Youree has carried 37 times for 377 yards and five TDs. Jackson Thurman has

13 catches for 155 yards and Youree 11 catches for 123 yards.

Noblesville’s defense is led by Justin Ogle, McGwire Plumer, Harris Camp, Ja’Shaw Dickman, Hank Davis and Grant Bullard. Leading Westfield are Jackson Garrett, Justin Frey and Hank Grenda.

The Hall of Famer wasn't happy with Sheridan's 54-13 loss to North White last Friday. Certainly not happy with the first half when Sheridan fell behind 47-7.

"It was," said Wright, "the worst half of football in the 51 years I've been coaching."

Hello! That's a lot of first halves in football games.

"We didn't come to play the first half," said the coach. "We've got to figure this out. We're a better team than that."


