2nd annual contest...

Beards & Brews scheduled for Oct. 24

Last year they came, they conquered, they cultivated a new fall favorite. Beards & Brews The Championship, now year two, will be back to deliver all of the competitive flare you can imagine associated with beards and those who sport and love them.

On Saturday, October 24th from Noon to 4 PM, Noblesville’s Hipstoric Downtown will host the event in the parking lot at 8th Street & Maple Avenue.

“If you were at Beards & Brews last year I can guarantee you’re coming back,” said Chris Owens, Executive

Director of Noblesville Main Street. “Beards & Brews has created a cult following and we are committed to making this an annual event that brings people to experience all that our city has to offer.”

Just in time for the cool breeze of fall, The Beards & Brews Championship will heat up a battle of beards, many representing local Central Indiana breweries. The event will be held on Saturday, October 24th from Noon to 4PM in the 8th & Maple Ave. Parking Lot (just behind the Visitor Center alley) in downtown Noblesville.

Prior to the October 24th championship, five Central Indiana brewing companies will host a preliminary beard contest at their brewery.

Each of these participating breweries will invite interested contenders to participate in their qualifying contest, naming a bearded representative in the following categories: Best of Show, Longest Beard, Thickest Beard, and Most Creatively Groomed Beard.

Officials break ground on Federal Hill Commons

A groundbreaking was held today for Federal Hill Commons, the fifth park in the City of Noblesville. The 6.75-acre park in Downtown Noblesville is anticipated to open in the fall of 2016.

Mayor John Ditslear said he is excited about the park’s potential and the numerous memories it will provide patrons.

“Federal Hill Commons will not just be another great park in Noblesville. The 6.75-acres will extend our downtown across the White River. It will be a catalyst for economic growth and development on the west side. It will be used not only as a gathering

space for events and music but will become a destination for residents, employees and guests,” Ditslear said. “We want the park to be a focal point and be everlasting like our 100-year-old Forest Park.”

Federal Hill Commons will provide a setting that encourages the arts and cultural programs while incorporating the rich history of Federal Hill, which dates back to the 1800s. The park, located between Ind. 19 and Logan and Conner streets, will be a year-round community amenity that mixes fun, art, history and green space and serve as an economic driver. The park meets 13

of the 84 objectives on the recently completed 10-year comprehensive master plan. Federal Hill Commons will improve the city’s west gateway and provide Downtown Noblesville to extend across the White River.

“I’m excited about this new amenity for the community to utilize. It think it is going to be a great asset and is going to be the catalyst to expanding our incredible downtown to the west. It will become the gathering space for culture, play and fun,”

“The hipstoric™ initiative in Noblesville is an effort to connect and engage people, places and experiences with community,” said Alaina Shonkwiler, Economic Specialist focusing on downtown culture for The City of Noblesville. “Connecting with visitors or those new to Noblesville is important when keeping our hipstoric™ square an attraction. Why not host an event that attracts people with an idea that is timely and on trend.”

Noblesville’s own Barley Island, Grand Junction Brewing Company from West-

field, and Indy-area breweries Fountain Square and Bier Brewery will all host preliminary beard contests on their turf during the first two weeks of October. Their bearded representatives will compete at the Beards & Brews Championship, alongside any interested community members wishing to “walk up” and enter their own beard into the contest.

“This contest is not exclusive to those representing the participating breweries,” added Chris Owens, Executive Director of Noblesville Main Street. “ Anyone wishing

to enter their beard into the ‘community call out’ portion of the event is encouraged to do so—the more bearded, the better.”

During the championship, a panel of judges will name an overall winner for each of the said contest categories. Winners will be awarded a prize package but more importantly bragging rights.

There will be more than beautiful beards at this event. In addition to the contest, Barley Island, Grand Junction Brewing Company, Fountain Square Brewing, Triton Brewing, Three Wise Men

Brewery and Sun King Brewing will all be on site selling their craft beers from Noon to 4 p.m. New this year, with the \$15 admittance, each attendee will receive a sample from each brewery on site.

Also new for this year’s event is our headlining band James and The Drifters. James & the Drifters is a midwestern folk rock/indie band with independent album releases and homegrown Indiana roots.

“Noblesville is known for having an abundance of great events,” said Chris Owens. “This one will be for those 21 years and older, which we feel adds to the diversity of our event offerings. Ultimately, the goal of this event is to bring new people to Noblesville, showing off the great places and experiences we have to offer. Adding James & The Drifters to our stage will add another element that we’re excited to offer.” Nickel Plate Arts and independent artisans and makers will host spaces within the event, alongside fashion-forward booths for all.

The Beards & Brews Championship is open to the public, those 21 years and older. Tickets are available at the event for just \$15 per person to attend, includes admission and limited beer sampling from participating breweries. There is no fee to enter your beard in the “walk up” community category. Beards & Brews is an annual event that raises dollars to support the initiatives of Noblesville Main Street, a 501-C3 dedicated to promote economic and cultural vitality of Downtown Noblesville.

Noblesville Parks Department Director Brandon Bennett said.

In November the Noblesville Common Council approved \$6 million in funding to build the park. Funding will come from the Logan Street TIF District, which pulls money from the tax base of Noblesville and can be used for city projects.

The estimated economic benefit for the city is estimated at \$1.3 to \$1.6 million annually, with a return on investment between six and eight and a half years. Surrounding properties to the park are estimated to see a 12 to 15 percent property value increase with its completion. It is also expected to create more private development in the area.

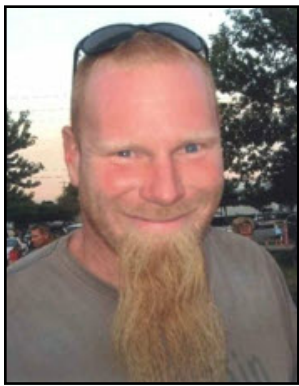

Zevacor Molecular installs commercial 70 MeV Cyclotron

Zevacor Molecular (Zevacor), a healthcare firm that manufactures and distributes PET and SPECT radiopharmaceuticals, announced the arrival of a 70 MeV Cyclotron at its new production facility in Noblesville.

The 140-ton *Cyclone 70P*, manufactured in Belgium by Ion Beam Applications, S.A., is the first commercial 70 MeV Cyclotron dedicated to medical use in the United States. Expected to be fully operational in the 1st quarter of 2016, the cyclotron is being installed in a new, state-of-the-art high capacity manufacturing center, which will house a complement of radioisotope synthesis equipment able to produce a broad range of radiopharmaceuticals for clinical and research applications.

"Our aim is two-fold," said John Zehner, Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer, Zevacor Molecular. "First,

we are working to stabilize the domestic supply of medical isotopes, including Strontium 82, needed to diagnose and treat critical illnesses. Second, we are taking the lead in securing the future of nuclear medicine and molecular imaging through the growth and development of new diagnostics and therapeutics. Our goal is to improve the diagnosis and treatment of cancer, cardiovascular disease and other critical illnesses."

The initial primary focus of the 70 MeV Cyclotron will be the commercial manufacture of Strontium 82 to ensure an ample, stable U.S.-based supply of Strontium 82/Rubidium 82 generators for use in the diagnosis of cardiovascular disease. The cyclotron will also be employed to produce a wide variety of other radionuclides for both research and clinical applications.

Indiana House Republicans seeking interns for the 2016 legislative session

State Representative Tony Cook (R-Cicero) wants to encourage college-level students and recent graduates, who are interested in state government, to apply for the Indiana House Republican Internship Program. The spring internship program will last from January through March 2016.

This paid internship provides opportunities for both academic and professional growth. Interns will be able to work directly with legislators and staff members while gaining valuable experience as they develop an understanding of the legislative process.

Applicants can apply for internships in one of the five departments listed below:

- **Legislative:** Interns will be paired with a full-time legislative assistant as they work directly with an assigned group of state representatives. Some of the responsibilities include: tracking legislation, working with constituents and researching legislative questions.
- **Communications:** Interns will be paired with a full-time press secretary as they assist with media relations for an assigned group of state representatives. Some of the responsibilities include: writing press releases, assisting with video production, working with social media, arranging interviews with reporters and covering press conferences.
- **Information Technology:** Interns will work with the IT Director and PC Technician to provide technical support and individual training to the caucus. Interns will

also troubleshoot diverse software, hardware and network problems.

• **Policy:** The policy intern will work with the Policy Director, Deputy Policy Director and Policy Analyst to research, track and analyze legislation.

• **Ways and Means:** The Ways and Means intern will work with the Senior Fiscal Analyst and Fiscal Analyst on issues that directly relate to the state's finances and biennial budget.

Applications for the program will be accepted until October 31. Most colleges and universities offer course credit for the internship, so applicants are advised to work with their school to obtain academic credit.

Each internship is a full-time position at the Indiana Statehouse, located in downtown Indianapolis. Interns will generally work from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. A bi-weekly compensation of \$700 will be provided to each intern, and they will also be eligible to apply for a competitive \$3,000 scholarship toward undergraduate or graduate expenses.

To encourage students to apply, the Indiana House Republican Caucus will be attending recruiting events at colleges and universities across Indiana. Royals win Mudsock, ‘Rocks edge NHS in five

Mudsock week continued on Thursday with the Hamilton Southeastern volleyball team hosting its counterparts from Fishers.

The Class 4A No. 3 Royals were straight-set winners, 25-15, 25-14, 25-19. With the win, HSE improved to 11-2 for the season.

Southeastern outside hitter Caitlin Kane had 11 kills on a .444 hitting percentage, topped only by Hayden Huybers' 13 kills and hitting mark of .588. Olivia Burgess also had a strong serve receive game which Royals coach Jason Young said "helped set the tone."

"I am grateful our group won the annual Mudsock match against Fishers," said Young. "The Mudsock is a terrific event for the community and was a great night for us. I am proud to coach this group of young ladies who have bought in from day one to the Royal way of playing the game."

Fishers stats were not available at press time.

Southeastern also won the junior varsity match 25-14, 25-13, improving its record to 6-3. Young said the JV Royals "did a great job of dominating the Mudsock match last night behind the high powered offense of Bria King and Julia Patras on the outside and the excellent serving of Taylor Shelton and Talia Trabue."

The HSE freshman team won 25-15, 25-19, keeping its record perfect at 8-0.

"All players contributed to the awesome win," said Young.

We have a great opening for a job in our sports department.

Like most jobs here at The Reporter, this is a volunteer position.

But, a fun volunteer position. You think?

How would you like to be the guy, or gal, who selects the quarterback for this year's Hamilton County All-County team? In doing so, you'll make some friends. And, lose some friends.

Just to give you an example of how tough that job might be, tonight, arguably, you'll see the best four quarterbacks (on the same evening) ever in Hamilton County.



There might have been great quarterbacks in the history of Hamilton County football. But, nothing like the two matchups scheduled tonight.

At Westfield we'll see the Shamrocks' Ryan Pepiot and Noblesville's Luke Melloh.

At Hamilton Southeastern we'll see the Royals' Carter Poiry matched up with Fishers' Zach Eaton.

Wow. Double wow.

Pepiot is on course to throw for more than 2,000 yards in the regular season. He has hit on 58-of-90 tosses for 711 yards. That's an average of 237 yards a game and a completion percentage of .644.

Pepiot has thrown for five touchdowns and has been intercepted just 2 times in 90 tosses.

The Westfield gunner throws the football all over the field, hitting 13 different receivers. His No. 1 receiver is Evan Manley with 14 catches for 242 yards. Lucas

Schultz has 13 for 158 and Max McCool 16 for 161.

Pepiot is a ground threat, too, with 36 rips for 185 yards and 3 touchdowns.

On the other side of the gridiron at Westfield will be Noblesville's Melloh. He has connected on 37-of-69 slings for 354 yards, 4 touchdowns and zero interceptions. Mellow has a .536 percentage and he is averaging 118 yards a game.

Noblesville's leading receiver is Jackson Thurman with 13 catches for 155 yards. Jarel Youree has 11 for 123, Travis Gillian 9 for 55, and JD. Scheib 7 for 75.

Melloh, like Pepiot, can run with the pigskin. He has carried 47 times for 143 yards and four touchdowns.

The other game tonight will match Fishers' Eaton and Southeastern's Poiry.

Poiry has nearly matched Pepiot's numbers. He has tossed for 645 yards while hitting on 51-of-84 attempts. That's a .607 percentage and Poiry is averaging 215

yards a game. He has tossed for 5 touchdowns and has not been intercepted.

Poiry has hit 11 different receivers. No. 1 is Greg Miller with 17 receptions for 201 yards and No. 2 is Aaron Matio with 12 for 250 yards.

Eaton is 29-of-53 for 483 yards, a .547 percentage and an average of 161 yards a game. He has passed for five touchdowns and has not been intercepted.

Eaton has hit 10 different receivers. Keyshawn Burrell is the leader with 12 catches for 213 yards. Kade Orris has 6 for 105 yards and DeVonte Adams a half-dozen receptions for 92 yards.

For sure, if you head for Westfield or Hamilton Southeastern tonight, you'll see some great quarterbacking. You'll also see lots of other standout players and four very good football teams.

All, of course, Hamilton County style.
