





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Royals stun Tigers

In 10 seasons of Mudsock football games - yes, we're up to 10 now - there has never been a game quite like the one that was played at Fishers Friday night.

The Tigers cruised to a 28-0 halftime lead over Hamilton Southeastern. But the second half was a different story. The Royals scored 32 unanswered points in the final 14 minutes of the game, and that led to a stunning 39-33 victory over Fishers. With that, Southeastern reclaimed the Mudsock trophy that had been in the Tigers' claws since 2012.

Southeastern is now 3-1 for the season, having won three games in a row after an opening-season loss to Carmel. It was Fishers' first loss after starting the season with three straight wins.

So what changed in the second half?

"We just kept playing," said Royals coach Scott May. "We didn't do anything different."

Southeastern did do something: It persevered in that second half.

"Early in the game we couldn't do anything right," said May. "Fumbled the ball, threw an interception for a touchdown. Just nothing went right. So the kids just came back out, and we kept doing what we're doing. Coaches kept coaching, and plays started working. It's a game of momentum. We started getting that momentum and it just kept rolling. These kids did it last week against Avon, now they come out and do it against Fishers."

Making comebacks is something Royals quarterback Carter Poiry is getting

"Well, I thought last week was as intense as it gets, in the comeback against Avon," said Royals quarterback Carter Poiry. "We're just out here putting on a show."

The comeback began early in the third quarter, when Curtis Goss ran 21 yards for a touchdown to get HSE on the board. A good kick from Noah Haxton cut Fishers' lead to 28-7.

The Tigers got some of those points back with three minutes to go after Ben Norton kicked a 25-yard field goal. But exactly one minute later, David Tsetse answered with a touchdown, a three-yard run to the end zone. A 45-yard pass from Carter Poiry to Greg Miller put HSE in scoring position.

The score was now 31-13, and that held until the end of the third period. That was just coming attractions for the fourth quarter, however. The Royals took the lead in a span of less than three minutes. Tsetse began the rally by grinding into the end zone on a one-yard touchdown. Haxton's kick made the score 31-20 at the 9:50 mark.

Southeastern then stepped up on defense, forcing an immediate Tiger turnover

Westfield wins 18-14

While preparing for a huge Hoosier Crossroads Conference game with rival Noblesville last week, Westfield mentor Jake Gilbert spent some time singing the praises of first-year junior place-kicker William
