Candidates already filing for 2016 election

Apparently following the old adage that the 'early bird gets the worm' some candidates for next year's primary election are already beginning to emerge.

Filing for a host of offices in the 2016 election is four months away.

But, before that there are city elections to be held in November of this year. These municipal elections won't amount to much since nearly all Republican candidates in

Hamilton County are unopposed and in some cities and towns with no contests, there will not be an election this year.

So, folks interested in offices at stake next year are getting their names out now. This strategy sometimes has the effect of discouraging opposition.

At the county level Republican voters next spring will choose a new judge in Superior Court 2, two county commissioners, three county councilors, county auditor, treasurer and surveyor.

A possible race for judge to replace retiring Judge Dan Pfleging is shaping up. There are reports that Carmel City Judge Brian Poindexter might be running against an already announced David Najjar, courts magistrate.

Two new candidates are apparently in the field for seats on the County Council. Assuming the three at-large incumbents run for re-election, this would set up a five-way contest for three seats.

Jeff Hern and Scott Baldwin have indicated they will run, and incumbents Brad Beaver, Jim Belden and Rick McKinney are likely to seek re-election.

Former County Auditor Robin Mills has announced she will seek to return to the office after eight years as chief deputy. Thus far she has no opponent.

Incumbent County Commissioner Mark Heirbrandt is expected to run for a second

term while long-time Commissioner Steve Dillinger has not decided whether he will go again.

Treasurer Jennifer Templeton is eligible and likely to run for her second term as is the county's longest serving elected official, Surveyor Kent Ward.

Democrats have made no hints of seeking any of the county offices up next year. There have been fewer Democratic candidates on the ballot with each passing election.

Given the fact that no Democrat has won county office in more than 50 years, the mounting cost of a campaign is seen as the major reason that few if any want to come forward.

HAND talks Blackhawk Commons

As I looked around the room of folks, mostly elderly folks, who were listening to HAND's plans for a redevelopment of the former Adams Elementary School, I wondered just how many memories were going through their heads.

The meeting was held at a Sheridan Town Board session, but HAND wasn't there for informational reasons only. The Town Board will be asked to act at a later date.

I had my own memories skipping through my head, and not of Adams Elementary but as of old Sheridan High School.

The gymnasium, often labeled as Hobbs Hall, arguable could be considered as the greatest, the most historical in the history of Hamilton County high school basketball.

Larry Hobbs made it that way as principal; as athletic director and as

coach. He coached both the varsity and junior varsity teams.

I remember, as a young reporter, going to talk with Mr. Hobbs in his office. Scared to death. He was a kind man, but an imposing figure to most of us.

I remember watching games in the gym, games with powerful Crispus Attucks as the opponent. Games which packed what then was the largest high school gym in Hamilton County. Games with fans hanging from the rafters

What HAND (Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development) wants to do is to preserve the historic building and create housing opportunities for Sheridan residents.

The redevelopment project is being called "Blackhawk Commons."

HAND wants to restore the gym and keep it separate from the 30 proposed apartments.

The gym currently is in terrible condition and likely will deteriorate even more before HAND can complete its plan.

The 30 apartments will be in the areas which once were classrooms. One, two, three and even one or two four bedroom apartments are planned.

The monthly rental fees will be \$275 to \$550 for a one bedroom, \$330 to \$590 for a

two bedroom and \$385 to \$650 for a four bedroom.

Sheridan folks are well aware what HAND can do. The organization operates Spicewood Garden Apartments in Sheridan, just west of state Road 38 off 2nd Street.

"As alumni share fond memories of the school and sincere desire to help out, we're excited to see this restoration take shape," said Nate Lichti, executive director of HAND. "The Historic Society has all the school photographs, so we can share their dream of displaying these again in their natural home."

It likely will take a year to get things rolling. And, the line for apartments likely will be long. The current list of those waiting for openings at Spicewood Garden is very long.

It is crucial that redevelopment occurs as soon as possible. The building is vacant and in disrepair. The longer it remains vacant, the more likely even more damage will occur.

No action by the Town Council is being asked at this time.

Rezoning will be necessary. HAND will ask for a 10-year tax abatement.

The next meeting for the public is planned on September 30 at 5 p.m. at the Sheridan Library, 103 W. 1st Street.

County winners all over the state

Whether it was in the northern part or the southern part of the state, Hamilton County's cross country teams were winners all over on Saturday.

Noblesville dominated the Maconaquah Invitational, with both the boys and girls programs sweeping to team and individual victories. Carmel had a nice day at the Brown County Eagle Classic, also getting wins for both the boys and girls teams. Hamilton Southeastern earned a team sweep at the Wildcat Invitational at Indiana Wesleyan University as well.

The Millers cruised to their trophies at Maconaquah. Noblesville's boys team, ranked 12th in the state, scored 21 points, far outdistancing Warren Central's runner-up 100 points. Eric Hoffman won the race in 16:29; he was one of five Millers to land in the top seven. In the girls race, Abigail Little zoomed to a first-place finish in 18:17. Six of Noblesville's runners placed in the top 11.

Hamilton Heights also competed at Maconaquah. Abby Christiansen was the top Huskies racer, taking 36th in the girls race. Dylan Young led the boys by placing 38th. Sheridan's Nathan Smith was 43rd for the boys, while Allie Hopkins placed 75th in the girls race.

Carmel's boys took care of business in Brown County, scoring 64 points to win over Columbus North's 129. Calvin Bates was the leader, placing ninth. The Greyhounds girls had it a little bit closer, but still emerged victorious, scoring 41 to the Bull Dogs' 63. Sarah Leinheiser was the race winner, crossing the finish line in 17:49.56.

"A tremendous change in weather conditions late in the week really gave all competitors a great opportunity to race on a great course this morning," said Carmel girls coach Mark Ellington. "The course was a little wet and soft in places, but a good experience was to be had by most."
