Trash pick-up in Noblesville...

Residents to pay?

Noblesville Mayor John Ditslear, following the Common Council meeting last evening, revealed that he will ask for a trash pick-up fee for Noblesville residents next presented by mid-October. year.

Noblesville is one of few cities in this area of the state which has avoided a fee.

"We're simply running out of money," Mayor Ditslear told The Hamilton County Reporter last evening.

The request must be presented to the Council before the City presents its budget for 2016. That budget must be

In order to pay for Noblesville's annual trash collection of \$2.4 million, Ditslear said his request will be for \$10.44 per residence, per month.

The average fee in Hamilton County is \$13.50.

"We've got to do something because of the tax cap," said Council President Rick Taylor, who admitted gaining four votes from the seven-member Council "could be tough. It's going to be a close vote," Taylor predicted.

Noblesville Schools, Noblesville Teachers' Forum approve new contract

Noblesville Schools announced today that they have reached agreement with the Noblesville Teachers' Forum on a new teacher contract for the 2015-2016 school year. Teachers ratified the contract on September 8th and the Noblesville school board approved it at their September 15th board meeting.

Highlights of the new contract include:

• An average 4.3% base pay increase for teachers rated effective/highly effective

• An increased district payout for the teacher basic health care benefit plan • The creation of an "emergency leave" category for unique leave needs above and beyond normal circumstances • A signing bonus for new first-year teachers coming out of college to assist in recruiting top talent · An expanded and enhanced retirement stipend to facilitate more notice of vacancies, and provide more time for high-quality replacements to be found "The decline in teacher compensation and teacher hiring shortages are matters that teachers and districts around the state are struggling with," said Dr. Beth Niedermeyer, superintendent of Noblesville Schools. "We need to ensure that teacher compensation is a priority and that we're in a strong position to attract and retain the best

116th/Pennsylvania streets closure begins on/after Sept. 21

Starting on or after Monday, Sept. 21, INDOT plans to close the 116th/Pennsylvania streets intersection for approximately 60 days to construct a roundabout. While this intersection is closed, Meridian Street. access to/from 116th Street east of US 31 will also be closed. Before this closure begins, INDOT will open the new 111th Street bridge over US 31. Then, east/west access over US 31 will be 116th streets available at 111th Street and 126th Street/Carmel Drive. Direct access to/from US 31 in Carmel will remain available via:




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

Bud Wright is playing a numbers game with his Sheridan High School football team.

Like, for example, Wright has lost eight Blackhawks with injuries so far this season.

Like, for example, Wright started seven freshmen last week in a 26-19 loss to Carroll

But, get this, the (overall) 1-3 young Blackhawks Friday at Larry Wright Stadium will be battling for a full leadership in the East Division of the Hoosier Heartland Conference when they take on Eastern's Comets.

Sheridan's lone victory has been over East Division Clinton Central, 26-12. Sheridan's three losses have come to Western Boone 47-20, North White 54-13 and Carroll. North White and Carroll are members of the Hoosier Heartland, but they play in the West Division.

Sheridan's latest, and biggest, injury of the season came in the Carroll game last week when quarterback Jake Chesney went to the sidelines in the third period. Wright said, as today, Chesney likely will be a game time decision.

Because of injuries, three different Blackhawks have seen action at the tailback position, a position which always has been extremely important in Sheridan's running game.

Chesney, before his injury, has rushed for 465 yards in 52 carries.

If Chesney isn't able to start Friday at quarterback, Wright will turn to two and junior Robert Burnell 21 times for 63 more young Blackhawks, sophomore Gunner Williams and sophomore Cole Cummings. 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Bulldogs can score....

Tigers plan to bounce back

Browning, averaging 42.5 points a game, is one of the highest scoring high school football teams in the state.

The Bulldogs have won one of four games.

How about that, Rick Wimmer?

"Their 1-3 record can be deceiving," said the Fishers coach, whose Tigers will travel to Brownsburg for a Hoosier Cross-roads Conference game this Friday.

Brownsburg, on the flip side, is giving up an average of 45.8 points a game.

"Brownsburg is an outstanding offensive team that will really challenge our defense and force us to focus on correcting mistakes we made last week."

Fishers can't forget last week soon enough. The Tigers blew a huge lead and lost to arch-rival Hamilton Southeastern 38-33.

"Offensively," Wimmer continued, "we will need to take care of the football and not stop scoring points when we can create those opportunities.

"Brownsburg's defense is very young and has shown signs of improving each week," Wimmer added.

Brownsburg's quarterback, junior Hunter Johnson, already has passed for over 1000 yards. His leading receiver, Tyler Kirtz, has caught 28 passes. The Bulldogs have an outstanding running back in 205pound senior Toks Akinnbade.

The Bulldogs have lost to Pike 55-34, Lawrence North 65-47 and Avon 56-26 and defeated Franklin 68-7. Fishers' wins have been over North Central 28-0, Pike 20-8 and Noblesville 38-13.

The loss to Southeastern last week knocked the Tigers out of first place in the HCC.

"Critical turnovers and a struggling defense are issues that we obviously are going to need to address in future games," said Wimmer. "Part of our defensive problems in the second half last week can be attributed to three defensive starters being out for much of the half, two of them at the linebacker positions where we definitely lack sufficient depth.

"But we expect to play better," Wimmer said. "We also cannot turn the ball over twice deep in their territory on the first plays of an offensive possession. The problem is magnified when playing a no-huddle team like HSE because now fatigue can really set in on defense when the offense does not do its part.

"Despite the fourth quarter meltdown, we put together an outstanding drive to give us a chance to get the game into overtime in the final seconds but failed to finish

"Our challenge to our players is to not allow the Southeastern game to define our season. We will learn, make adjustments and be ready for this week," Wimmer added. Fishers has a strong offense of its own.

Quarterback Zach Eaton is 45-of-81 throwing the pigskin for 723 yards. He has passed for six touchdowns and has been intercepted just one time.

Fishers has passed for six touchdowns and rushed for eight.

Jeremy Chinn, who is playing both offense and defense, leads the Tigers in rushing with 278 yards and three touchdowns. Trevor Newman, a junior, has carried for 199 yards and two TDs.

On the receiving end for Eaton are Keyshawn Burrell with 16 catches for 298 yards; DeVonte Adams with 12 for 161 and Chinn with 8 for 141 yards.

Fishers has defeated Brownsburg the last two seasons, 49-14 and 41-17, after losing 31-0 three years ago.
