Nearly 200 property owners.....

Face losing homes, acreage

Nearly 200 property owners in Hamilton County face sale of their homes or acreage in this year's tax sale set for October 13. These are real estate parcels on which owners have failed to pay their property taxes.

The delinquent owners have received certified letters warning them that if payment is not made promptly their property will be sold to the highest bidder in the annual sale.
A total of \$1.33 million in unpaid taxes is involved this year. The sale will be held in the historic courtroom at the Court-

house beginning at 10 a.m. on Tuesday the 13th under supervision of the county treasurer as authorized by state law.
The sale in recent years has drawn several professional tax sale bidders. The auction-type sale starts with the delinquent amount. The sale is held in order that the taxing units in the county may recover

the money due to fully fund the budgets of their respective units.
The auditor's office which prepares the information for the sale reports that in most years half or more of the delinquent taxpayers will pay prior to the sale when they realize loss of their property is imminent.

Mass transit supporters renewing efforts

The folks who want to bring public mass transportation to Hamilton County are on the move again laying plans for renewed efforts to get the buses rolling from Indianapolis, at least as far as Westfield. Past reports indicate a so-called Red Line would bring commuter bus service through Carmel to Westfield in the first phase of a long-term plan to serve substantial portions of the county.
A new name has appeared for the mass transit supporters. It's called the Indiana Citizens Alliance for Transit or ICAT. The group sent letters this week to public officials and others in the county inviting them to a meeting in Fishers on September 22 to receive comments and opinions on how to get favorable attention focused on the issue.
At the Fishers City Hall meeting consultants hired by ICAT will apparently be present to explain how to "guide public education" and gain "voter engagement" on the subject of public transportation between Hamilton and Marion counties.
The letter of invitation says an exchange of ideas to engage partners throughout the region is the major reason for the meeting. It will apparently not be the only such meeting of officials as a "series" of meetings will follow.
High on the list of the items to be discussed will be how to secure "sustainable funding" for the bus transit

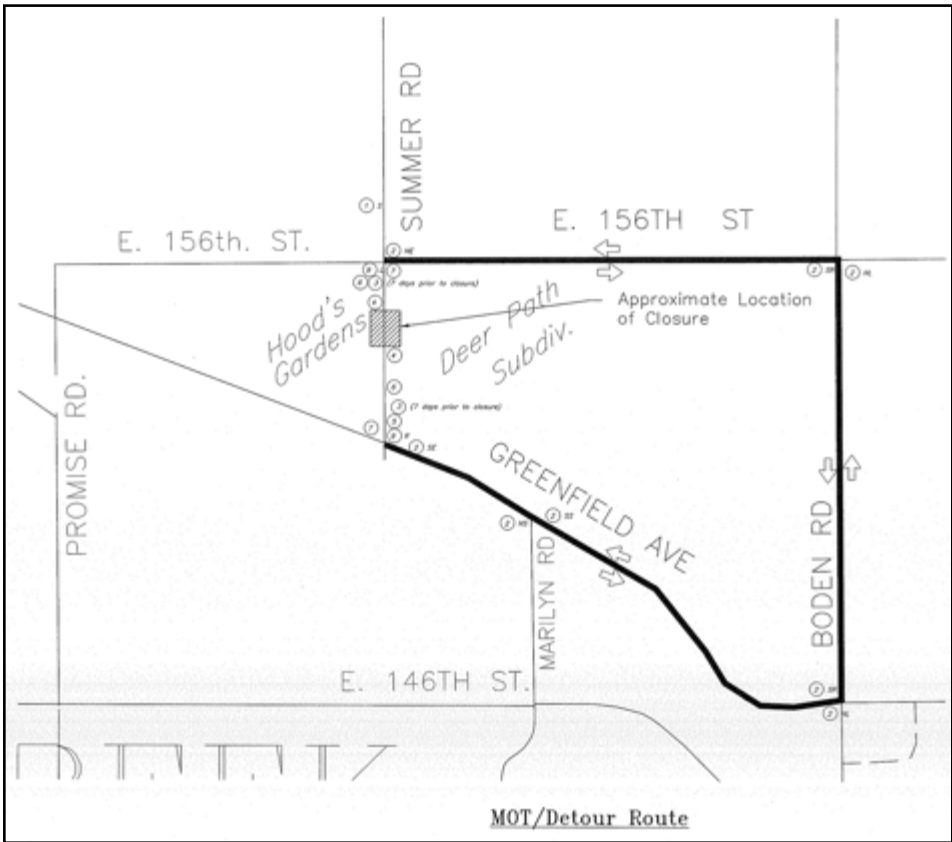



plan. At present the funding of ongoing operations would come largely from a 25 percent hike in the County Option Income Tax (COIT) if that increase is approved by county voters in a public referendum.

The alliance's letter said preparations should be made for placing the COIT question on the November 2016 general election ballot. That is something that must be approved by the County Council under current rules.

In the meantime, however, there are unofficial reports that a move is afoot to ask the state legislature to change wording in the state law to allow the COIT Council to make the decision to hold the referendum. This would presumably be more favorable to mass transit supporters because a majority of the COIT Council represents the populous southern part of the county. (COIT Council members serve based on the amount of COIT funds their unit of government receives.)

Child Car Safety Seat Clinic is today

In partnership with the Automotive Safety Program, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, and the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute (ICJI), the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office announced its participation in the national and statewide 2015 Child Passenger Safety Week, by hosting a free Car Safety Seat Clinic.

The clinic takes place from 4 to 7 p.m. today at the Hamilton County 4-H Fairgrounds in Noblesville, 2000 Pleasant St.

Child Passenger Safety Week is an annual event and is taking place through Saturday.

"Proper child seat usage saves lives, and knowing how to install a child seat and when to transition to the next available seat,

or into a traditional seat belt, is vital to keeping children safe while riding in automobiles," said Hamilton County Sheriff's Office Car Seat Technician, Allison Nicholson.

Child Passenger Safety Week is supported by federal funding allocated to the Hamilton County Sheriff's Office from the ICJI Traffic Safety Division. According to ICJI, in 2014, 246 Indiana children under the age of 13 were injured, and 4 children died, from being unrestrained in an automobile accident. Further statistics show that nationally, 71 percent of car seats are not used correctly.

Hinkle Creek Elementary to run Cougar Challenge fundraiser Friday morning

Hinkle Creek Elementary School will have its Cougar Challenge fundraiser race on Friday morning.

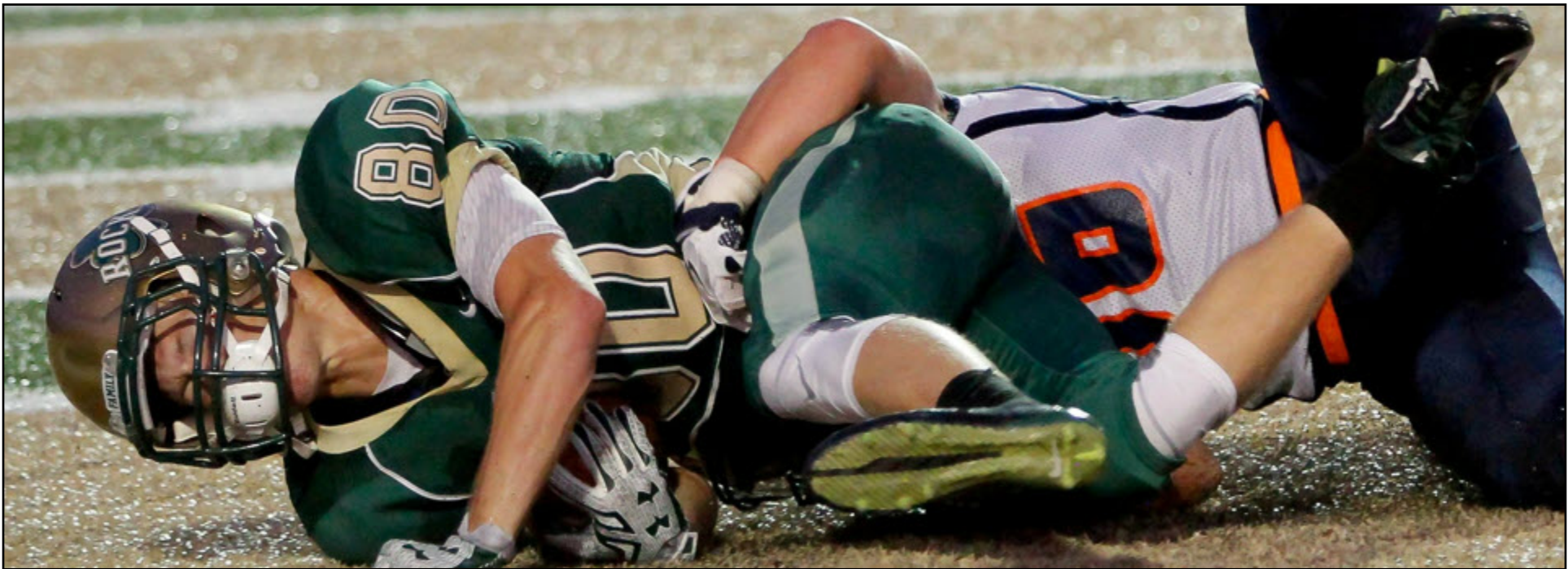

The “jinx” is gone....

Millers set for Homecoming

If you believe in such things, Noblesville’s Millers broke what arguably was the biggest “jinx” in the history of NHS athletics when Coach Lance Scheib’s Millers defeated Zionsville last season.

Noblesville never, never like in ever, had defeated Zionsville. Thirteen consecutive times the Eagles had defeated the Millers.

The Millers ended that jinx in style, rolling over Zionsville 31-13.

Now, a year later, Noblesville, this Friday, has invited Zionsville as its Homecoming guest.

The Millers are 2-2 and riding a two-game losing streak. Noblesville’s wins have come over Lawrence North 55-50 and Hamilton Heights 35-9. NHS is 0-2 in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference after losing to Fishers 38-13 and last week to Westfield 18-14.

Zionsville is a “suspect” 3-1. Zionsville, a 5A team, has yet to play a 6A opponent like Noblesville. Zionsville’s wins have been over 5A McCutcheon 35-6, 4A Lebanon 35-12 and 3A Brebeuf 27-9. The Eagles have lost to 5A Westfield 45-30.

So, that’s the matchup which Friday will draw a capacity crowd to Hare Chevrolet Field.

“We are facing a good 3-1 Zionsville team,” said Scheib. “We have needed a focused week of practice to allow us the opportunity to win.”

Scheib, as do most coaches, looks at Homecoming as a different type of week.

“We will need to handle the Homecoming week distractions,” said the Miller coach, “and focus on our part of Homecoming which is the 7:30 p.m. game with Zionsville.”

What the Millers will face is a Zionsville team which has put big offensive numbers into the book.

The Eagles can pass the football. Quarterback Trevor Liechty, a 6-3 senior, is 74-of-123 through the air for 812 yards and six touchdowns. He has been intercepted five times. His top receivers are Eddie Mattingly with 26 catches for 288 yards; Brock Bishop with 13 for 139 and John Ramsey with 11 receptions for 162 yards.

Zionsville also can run the football. Brenden Mikesell, a 175-pound junior, has carried the pigskin 86 times for 718 yards.

Noblesville has featured a balanced attack of running and passing.

Quarterback Luke Melloh has connected on 52-of-93 passes for 523 yards.

Jackson Thurman is the leading receiver with 15 receptions for 190 yards. JD Scheib has grabbed 11 for 123 yards.

The Miller to stop, both running and passing, is speedster Jarel Youree. He has carried 60 times for 453 yards and caught 15 passes for 184 yards.

Melloh has carried 67 times for 320 yards. Chandler Hurst has carried 23 times for 141 yards.

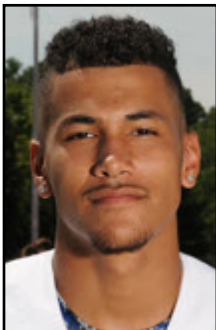

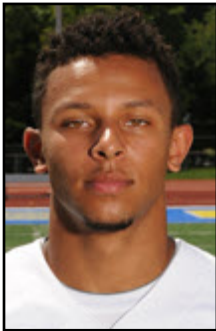

Tribe trails 2-0 as series shifts to Victory Field
