

der Mayor Ditslear, the idea of passing on one more fee to the citizens has been presented. Each year the council has resisted the easy grab of \$2.4 million and citizens should let the Mayor and Council know that passing on another fee can have no end. The same approach was made with the waste water fees. Now that cost has tripled from the original agreement with increases that seem to appear like magic to the monthly bill. It would help the citizens understand these fees if the city would take a few minutes and explain how the increases are working for the community. The cost of \$10.44 per household may seem very reasonable for such an important service. The problem is the
