


Tabled until Sunday....

Rocky vs. HAND battle

It's not exactly a repeat battle of the Hatfields and the McCoys. Lets just say, for now, that's it's a disagreement between Noblesville folks interested in the old Co-op Grain Elevator land located between 8th & 9th streets on the south side of Noblesville.

You can't miss if you're driving that way. All work on tearing down the old silos has ended and the property has become a real eye sore for those who live in the area and for those headed north and south in and out of Noblesville.

Local developer Rocky Shanehsaz, who owns the Model Mill building just north of the property, says he was thrown a curve ball from Wabash-based North Central Co-op. Shanehsaz says he was promised first refusal on the land once Co-op ended its grain storage operation.

Since that time, in the midst of tearing down the silos, HAND (Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development), has become involved and they want to develop 52-low rent apartments.

Shanehsaz called "foul" and he went to the Hamilton County Commissioners to block \$250,000 of County money and \$225,000 of grant money HAND was requesting.

The Commissioners tabled the request from HAND after hearing Shanehsaz's story.



Fast food may be here to stay, but...

There are always options to help plan healthy meals

"I saw few die of hunger; of eating, a hundred thousand." Benjamin Franklin

In reference to Mr. Franklin's quote above...he obviously was very astute (on many levels!) though I am not certain he took his own advice as he was quite corpulent. Although I doubt Mr. Franklin partook of "fast food" it appears that poor eating habits are not new to the 21st Century.

Eating can be such a pleasure; a good meal filled with nutrientrich foods, prepared well and shared with others is a wonderful experience. That is a meal which will leave us satiated and our bodies fueled with the energy we need to "take on the day." How often do your meals fit that description? Always? Often? Sometimes or maybe never?

My first experience with a "drive thru" meal was about 1965 or so when my family tried out the new Clancy's on Tenth Street in Noblesville. (I was fifteen so I guess you can, sigh, do the math!)

My Dad drove up the window (no speakers then) and placed our order and we received our meal in a bag and drove away - how cool was that! Thankfully, however, most of my family meals growing up were spent sitting at the dinner table with family enjoying simple fare prepared at home. Unfortunately, life has changed for most of us due to increased scheduling demands and the opportunities to eat poorly outweigh (really, no pun intended here) the opportunities to properly plan our meals.

My interest in nutrition and wellness has persevered over the years throughout a long management career and kept alive in part due to my 20+ years as a certified fitness instructor pursued alongside my professional career. Alas, "fast food" is here to stay, but so are the options to increase our personal eating plans to be more nutrient-rich and satisfying. As we close up the summer season and look forward to fall, the local produce stands can be your best friend. When in doubt about the source of your produce, simply ask if the items are organic. In particular I would advise that any items which are consumed with "skin on" should definitely be organic. There are specific guidelines in place by the USDA for organically grown

produce. If there is the slightest bit of mold visible, pass it up even if it is on sale! Clean your produce carefully and be creative in your meal planning and snacking - Bon appétit!

Happy birthday, Andrew...

Little kicks Millers to big victory

How's this for an 18th birthday celebration: You kick a game-winning field goal, then get to celebrate with a few thousand of your closest friends.

That was the evening for Noblesville senior football player Andrew Little. His (appropriately enough) 18-yard kick with 24 seconds left in the game sent the Millers to a 23-21 victory over Zionsville in Noblesville's Homecoming game at a packed Hare Chevrolet Field. The win was the first in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference for Noblesville this season, and improved the Millers to 3-2 overall.

"I couldn't wish for a better atmosphere," said Little. The game's attendance was 4300.

Little's game-winner was the result of a great final four minutes for Noblesville. The Miller defense forced the Eagles to punt from their own 10, then a punt reception interference penalty resulted in Noblesville taking over at the 28.

Miller senior Jarel Youree made a 20yard run to get the ball to the 8. Noblesville moved the ball to the 1 on fourth down, and that's where Little made his kick.

"It was great, but I couldn't have got there without my offense, and the hold was great, and the snap was great, which allowed me to put it in," said Little. "I always trust my offense and my snappers. They always do a great job.'

Zionsville did have 19.1 seconds left to make one last try, but after getting a first down with 4.4 seconds left, saw its last pass fall incomplete from the Eagles' 39-yard

"I think the bottom line is, you got to find a way to win close games," said Noblesville coach Lance Scheib. "I thought we learned last week from how to close this week, and that's a credit to all three phases. Very proud of Andrew Little. Very proud of Max Dixon, our snapper."

The teams played to a 7-7 tie in the first. Youree got the first score of the game with a 30-yard touchdown run, with Zionsville answering on a one-yard run by Brenden Mikesell.

The Millers took control in the second period on both offense and defense. Little was perfect on a 26-yard field goal midway through the quarter, and Luke Melloh hit Jackson Thurman for a 26-yard touchdown yards, including the one touchdown. with exactly one minute left. Meanwhile, the Noblesville defense blocked two Zions-

ville field goal attempts, including one right at the end of the half.

The Millers opened the second half with a resolute drive down the field. It ended with Little nailing another field goal, this one from 28 yards. However, the drive took almost five-and-a-half minutes.

Zionsville scored two more touchdowns: A 16-yard third-quarter pass with 2:54 left, and then a one-yard jog for Mikesell right at the beginning of the fourth period. Both teams thereafter traded possessions until Little kicked the game-winner. He also booted both extra points.

Youree had another solid game, with 113 yards in 19 carries. Melloh was an efficient 13-of-20 passing for 99 yards. Thurman caught four of those throws for 53




In that first half explosion, Nick Burnell, Williams and Chesney each added two-point conversions.




