# **Misrepresenting preservation**

The disagreement among Wabashbased North Central Co-op, local businessman Rocky Shanehsaz and Hamilton County Area Neighborhood Development (HAND) basically is simple.

\*Shanehsaz claims that once Co-op was ready to close its grain operation, he would have first rights to buy. The opportunity to purchase has not happened. Shanehsaz's plans were to boost business at his Model Mill business, which is located just north of the grain facility.

\*Since, HAND has moved in with plans to use the property to build 54 affordable apartments, and to "save" the grain facility as part of that proposal. HAND has said it hopes to preserve the first two levels of the wooden grain elevator.

Complicating and slowing the project attempting to do in building the apartproached the Hamilton County Commissioners for funding and Shanehsaz appeared at the meeting to claim "foul." The Commissioners tabled the request.



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
