
Alexandria police officer arrested for Sheridan theft

West side opened Thursday afternoon...

US 31/191st interchange to fully open this weekend

A new roundabout interchange connecting US 31 and 191st Street in Westfield is scheduled to open to traffic this weekend.

At around 5:30 p.m. Thursday, crews opened the southbound ramps on the west side of the interchange. That allowed traffic on 191st Street west of US 31 to access the highway, and also permitted southbound US 31 traffic to exit west onto 191st.

Thru traffic on 191st Street still can't cross under US 31 just yet, nor is there access to northbound US 31 from 191st Street, or to eastbound 191st from the highway. But be patient, commuters: Pending favorable weather, northbound US 31 traffic will shift onto new pavement and bridges over 191st Street, and the northbound ramps will open as early as Saturday.

Among the people happy to see the construction finished are Jim and Karen Bontrager, who have lived right at the intersection for 38 years.

"If it's open this weekend, that'll be good," said Jim Bontrager. He said opening the interchange would help to alleviate "a lot of the traffic congestion in other areas" and that "people will be able to access 31 a lot easier."

After the 191st Street interchange is



fully opened, the traffic signal at 196th Street and direct access to/from US 31 will be removed. The nearest interchanges with direct access to/from US 31 will be at 191st Street and State Road 38.

With the opening of the 191st Street interchange, all US 31 interchanges in Westfield will be open.

"I'm excited to see this interchange open forward to the improved US 31 corridor and to the public, and to get one step closer to the opportunities it will bring to our region the completion of the new US 31 in Westand our state." field," Mayor Andy Cook said. "We look

Sheridan Water Works flushing fire hydrants week of Oct. 12

Sheridan Water Works announced recently that biannual fire hydrant flushing will begin Monday, Oct. 12 and end Friday, Oct. 16.

Sheridan Water Works is asking all residents to be aware of the flushing in their areas of town and that some temporary water discoloration could be a possible result.

Hydrant flushing is required periodically to clean the system and water mains. Sheridan Water Works will be flushing between the hours of 7 a.m. and 4 p.m. during that week.

If customers see a discoloration in their water, they are asked to let the water run at maximum volume for two or three minutes, or until the discoloration disappears. 

Brownsburg, 1-4, can score...

'Rocks host Homecoming

Brownsburg is averaging 38.6 points a game, while posting a 1-4 record.

Go figure.

Try this. Brownsburg is allowing 44 points a game.

The Bulldogs will come to Westfield tonight for a Hoosier Crossroads Conference matchup. It's Westfield's Homecoming

Westfield coach Jake Gilbert is impressed with Brownsburg's offensive talent. "Brownsburg has the best offensive

skill in the HCC, and maybe the state," Gilbert said. "They are scary."

So is Westfield. The Shamrocks are scoring at a 31.8 clip and allowing 27 points a game.

Both teams likely will put a bunch of points on the board tonight. That's the way it was last year when Westfield outscored Brownsburg 35-21. Two years ago, Westfield defeated the Bulldogs 37-13.

Westfield has won two in a row over Brownsburg. The Bulldogs edged the Shamrocks 20-17 three years ago.

As Gilbert indicated, Brownsburg can put points on the board. Junior quarterback Hunter Johnson has connected on 65-of-121 passes for 1,082 yards. He has thrown for 14 touchdowns and been intercepted 9 times. His leading receiver is Tyler Kirtz with 27 catches for 520 yards. On the ground, Toks Akinribade has carried 79 times for 471 yards.

Brownsburg has defeated Franklin 66-7 and lost to Pike 55-34, Lawrence North 65-47, Avon 56-21 and Fishers 37-23.

Southeastern handed Westfield its first Hoosier Crossroads Conference loss last week, 34-18. The Shamrocks own conference victories over Zionsville 45-30 and Noblesville 18-14 and have won non-conference games over Harrison 36-21 and Southport 40-36.

"We gave away way too many yards defensively against Southeastern," said Gilbert, "and weren't explosive at all offensively.

"I thought we played soft, but I wasn't ashamed of losing to an excellent program

like HSE. They did a fantastic job. We just have to get better."

The Shamrocks are riding on the arm of quarterback Ryan Pepiot. He has connected on 101-of-172 passes for 1,136 yards and 5 touchdowns. He has been intercepted four times.

Pepiot has two outstanding receivers in junior Evan Manley and senior Max Mc-Cool. Manley has 31 catches for 422 yards and McCool 26 receptions for 253 yards.

'We are excited for the opportunity to get better and play in front of our fans at

Homecoming," said Gilbert. 'We'll have our hands full, for sure," he added.



A flip of the coin?

Guerin at Greenwood

There may not be a more evenly match game in the area as Indiana high school football tonight enters Week 6.

Guerin Catholic at Greenwood.

Greenwood is 4-1, its only defeat being a season opening 28-17 loss to Perry Meridian. Guerin Catholic is 4-1, its only loss being a 34-0 licking by Class 1A powerhouse Lafayette Central Catholic, ranked No. 1 in the state in its class.

Their only common opponent is Martinsville. Guerin Catholic has defeated Martinsville 26-9. Greenwood holds a 28-25 decision over Martinsville.

This is a key game for Coach Tom Dilley's streaking Golden Eagles.

Dilley was happy with Guerin's 50-6 blasting of Broad Ripple last week, the Eagles' third consecutive victory. In that game, Guerin ran just 40 plays to put 50 points on the board.

"Our quarterback (sophomore Elliott Charlebois) was our player of the game," Dilley said. "He threw for four touchdowns and ran for another."

The young quarterback is coming on strong. Through five games he has connected on 43-of-85 passes for 629 yards and six touchdowns. Charlebois has been intercepted just two times.

His leading receiver has been a junior, Arion Shinaver, who has 15 catches for 275 yards.

On the ground, Guerin Catholic is led by sophomore Carter McGinnis and junior Brennan Thieneman. Both have carried 65 times, McGinnis for 390 yards and Thieneman for 281 yards

"We can do some things," said Dilley. "We can throw the ball and we can run the ball." Guerin Catholic is averaging 22 points a game and giving up 14.2. Greenwood has a 27.4 scoring average and is allowing 20.8 points.

Greenwood has a good sophomore quarterback and the Woodmen are led on the ground by senior James Gallman with 549 yards in 125 carries.

"Our defense is one which bends but doesn't break," Dilley said

"Greenwood is very aggressive on defense," said the Guerin coach. "They play fast." This will be the seventh meeting between Guerin Catholic and Greenwood. The series is tied at 3-3. The Eagles won 42-21 last year.

"Greenwood is better this season," said Dilley.


"This team belongs to our seniors. Our program belongs to everyone."







Storm's Jewell Loyd headlines WNBA All-Rookie Team

Loyd received 10 votes from a panel of the WNBA's 12 head coaches, who each selected five players regardless of position. Stokes collected nine votes, followed by Boyd with eight and Tokashi-

Coaches were not permitted to vote for players on their own team.

Loyd, the top overall selection in the 2015 WNBA Draft presented by State Farm, led all rookies in scoring (10.7 ppg) and minutes (25.9 mpg). She shot 90.4 percent from the free throw line, tops among rookies and the fourth-highest mark in the league. The 5-10 guard scored in double digits 18 times in 34 games (23 starts) and averaged 3.5 rebounds and 1.9 assists.

Tokashiki was the third-leading rookie in scoring at 8.2 points and contributed 3.3 rebounds. Like Loyd, Tokashiki was prolific from the foul line, ranking second among first-year players at 86.2 percent. The 6-3 forward started 16 of her 30 games and scored in double figures 10 times.

Stokes and Boyd helped power the Liberty to a WNBA-best 23-11 record. Stokes, who appeared in all 34 games and started six times, paced rookies and ranked fourth in the league in blocks (1.97 bpg). The 6-3 center also led first-year players in rebounding (6.4 rpg) and was eighth in scoring (5.8 ppg). Boyd, a 5-9 guard, led all rookies in steals (1.17 spg), ranked sixth in scoring (6.6 ppg), and added 2.7 rebounds and 2.3 assists in 30 games (four starts). Achonwa was the rookie leader in field goal accuracy, shooting 55.0 percent in 28 games (17 starts) for the Fever. The 6-4 center averaged 8.0 points and 3.5 rebounds and connected on 74.6 percent of her free throws. Dabovic ranked second in the rookie class in scoring (8.8 ppg) to go with 1.9 assists and 1.6 rebounds. She was third among first-year players in three-point field goal percentage (33.3) and fourth in free throw percentage (80.8). The 6-foot Serbian guard helped the Sparks finish the season with a 6-3 surge by scoring in double figures in eight of those nine games.


