Anti-discrimination ordinances should protect innocent

In all the debate and controversy over local ordinances to outlaw discrimination based on sexual orientation and in some cases its effect on religious beliefs, officials seem to be missing an important point: protecting the innocent. Let's hope Hamilton County communities don't miss this.
Several cities in Indiana seem to be racing one another to see how fast


they can get the toughest and most inclusive ordinance on the books to supplement the state's Religious Freedom Restoration Act which does not address discrimination against gays.
The potentially troublesome part of these ordinances is the levying of fines against merchants and employers who refuse or exclude people because of their sexual orientation.
A person charged with this type discrimination could be subject to a fine of hundreds of dollars per incident. The

problem is that there is always someone trying to take unfair advantage of a situation.
For example if an individual has a dislike for a certain merchant or ex-employer, he or she can make the accusation that denial of service or employment was due to discrimination whether the allegation is true or not.
The accused might well have to defend against the charge in court, probably have to hire an attorney, and spend valuable time trying to prove the accusation is un-

Two arrested after Carmel burglary

Two Indianapolis men have been arrested and charged in relation to a burglary in Carmel Friday morning.

At approximately 5:25 a.m., Carmel Police responded to a burglary in progress call in the 3600 block of Abney Point Drive. A victim described seeing two white males running from his garage. The suspects left the area in dark colored compact vehicle.

Carmel Police detectives later located the suspect’s vehicle (a 2013 Dark Gray Chevrolet Sonic) in the parking lot of 3630 Guion Road, Indianapolis. Two suspects were located in the Chevy Sonic and taken into custody.

Through further investigation, it was later discovered that three homes were burglarized and three vehicles were broken into. The victim’s vehicles had their

windows smashed and subsequently a variety of electronics, laptops, cash and jewelry were stolen. The homes had computers, power tools, and miscellaneous items stolen. Majority of the stolen items were recovered by Carmel Police Department.

The suspects are Lynn A. Jackson and Cullen M. Doyle, both 18 and both from Indianapolis. They are both charged with the following:

(1) 2-counts of Burglary, Class 4 Felony. (2) 2-counts of Theft, Class 5 Felony, (3) Attempted Burglary, Class 4 Felony & (4) 3-counts of Theft, Class A Misdemeanors.

Jackson and Doyle are currently being held in the Hamilton County Jail on a \$100,000 bond each.

Scammers tend to prey upon the elderly but these crimes can impact all ages.

Here are a few common sense rules to follow to avoid being a victim:

DEAL LOCALLY WITH PEOPLE YOU CAN MEET IN PERSON - follow this one simple rule and you will avoid 99% of the scam attempts.

USE CAUTION WHEN WIRING FUNDS VIA WESTERN UNION, MONEYGRAM or any other wire service - anyone who asks you to do so is a scammer.

FAKE CASHIER CHECKS & MONEY ORDERS ARE COMMON and BANKS WILL CASH THEM AND THEN HOLD YOU RESPONSIBLE when the fake is discovered weeks later.

NEVER GIVE OUT PERSONAL OR FINANCIAL INFORMATION (bank account numbers, social security numbers, eBay/PayPal info, etc.)

AVOID DEALS INVOLVING SHIPPING OR ESCROW SERVICES and know that ONLY A SCAMMER WILL "GUARANTEE" YOUR TRANSACTION.

Ultimately, the best way to avoid scams is to educate yourself about what to look out for and to be cautious in every situation. Please take a few extra minutes to talk to family members and friends about how to avoid being a victim. If you need to speak to an officer or report a possible scam, you may call 317-571-2580.

true. If he wins, he still loses a lot of money due to the hassle involved.

It would seem better to provide for an investigation by the city and a determination of whether the ordinance was violated or not. If the facts of the situation show true intent to discriminate, then consider filing action. But, if not, drop the matter with no cost to the accused.

In Hamilton County there are folks who even question whether or not such ordinances are really needed. There have been few if any reported examples of businesses denying service based on a customer's sexual preference. And it's hard to imagine that a businessman or woman would even care or ask a customer for such information.

Nevertheless, Carmel has drafted an ordinance and other communities may follow because right now it seems to be the 'politically correct' thing to do. If our officials choose to enact such legislation, they should certainly make sure to provide for protection of the innocent storekeeper or employer.

Chatard plays better

Coach Lance Scheib, in a heartbreaking 18-16 loss to Chatard Friday evening at Hare Chevrolet Field, said he found a Noblesville football team which is improving with each game.

Chatard is ranked No. 1 in the Class 3A rankings.

“We’re getting better,” said Scheib. “Our defense continues to improve. The defense played well tonight.”

In a back-and-forth fight, Chatard scored the game-winning touchdown on a one-yard run with 3:44 remaining. That gave the Trojans an 18-16 advantage. Chatard left the door open by missing the extra point.

Noblesville tried to battle back. The Millers picked up three consecutive first downs on a 10-yard run by quarterback Luke Melloh; a fourth down, 12-yard pass from Melloh to Jarel Youree and a 17-yard run by Melloh.

That put Noblesville at Chatard’s 45-yard line, but from there the Trojans slammed the door.

Neither team scored until Melloh completed a four-yard touchdown pass to Youree with 1:02 left in the first quarter. Andrew Little kicked the extra point, giving the Millers a 7-0 edge.

Chatard got on the board with 5:57 remaining before halftime on a 35-yard field goal

Noblesville took 10-3 lead when Little kicked a field goal with 16 seconds remaining before halftime.

Chatard went up 12-10 by blocking a Noblesville punt and turning it into a safety.

It was Noblesville’s turn to take the lead, this time at 16-12, with 7:28 left in the game. Melloh hit Jackson Thurman on a 37 yard TD pass.

Noblesville, now 3-3 on the year, will play at Hamilton Southeastern next Friday.

Jarel Youree helped Noblesville scored a first-quarter touchdown for the Millers that put them ahead 7-0. Youree caught a four-yard pass from quarterback Luke Melloh.

Too much Johnson and Toks...

‘Rocks overrun by Bulldogs

When a football team comes into a game averaging 38.6 points per game, forget the record: It's a dangerous team.

Westfield learned that lesson Friday night. Brownsburg came into Riverview Health Field and spoiled the Shamrocks' Homecoming game with a Bulldog blitz, winning 59-30. Brownsburg had a 1-4 record before the game, and picked up its second win in dominating fashion.

Westfield, meanwhile, suffered its second straight loss after starting the season 4-0.

"Much credit to them," said Shamrocks coach Jake Gilbert. "They've got some great players and did a great job. We certainly helped them look good. They absolutely kicked our butt offensive and defensively."

The game looked like it would be close after a tight first quarter. Brownsburg scored first on a 12-yard pass from Hunter Johnson - and he was just getting warmed up - to Vincent Limson. But the Shamrocks responded when Brandon Karsnick made a four-yard run into the end zone.

Karsnick stepped up again, scoring from three yards out to put Westfield ahead 14-7. But Westfield wouldn't find the end zone again until the fourth quarter.

Meanwhile, the Bulldogs outscored the 'Rocks 45-3 during that time.

It was another awesome night for the Southeastern offense.

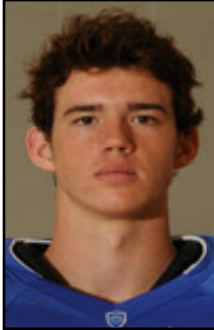
Combined, Southeastern ran for 225 yards and passed for 265 yards.

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
