salary, yet to be announced, for the new comptroller would be paid except for the fact that due to budget constraints those duties will temporarily be added to deputy mayor Mike Hendricks' responsibilities. (Well qualified accountants often command a salary and benefit package of \$100,000 or

City council members receive pay and benefits that amount to about \$41,000 each. This includes a \$19,000 salary and up to \$21,500 in health insurance coverage. All told, the changes likely total upwards of \$200,000 when a fulltime comptroller is hired.

Increases in pay for all elected officials have not been firmly established until the 2016 city budget is adopted and approved by the Local Tax Control Board.

So, second class status comes at a price. Carmel will likely be facing the same kind of increase in costs soon because new city council members to be elected this year have indicated their support for advancing to second class.

Is a change in class worth it? Those in charge of city governments seem to think so. They point to added representation with the larger council and more financial expertise with a city comptroller.

116th/Pennsylvania streets closure begins Monday

Beginning Monday, Sept. 28 (before the morning rush hour), INDOT plans to close the 116th/Pennsylvania streets intersection for approximately 60 days to construct a roundabout. While this intersection is closed, access to/from 116th Street east of US 31 will also be closed. Before this closure begins, INDOT will open the new 111th Street bridge over US 31. Then, east/west access over US 31 will be available at 111th Street and 126th Street/Carmel Drive. Direct access to/from US 31 in Carmel will remain available via:

- I-465
- 106th Street
- 116th Street (west of US 31)
- Old Meridian Street (northbound off-ramp access)
- 131st/Main Street
- 136th Street

During the 116th/Pennsylvania streets closure, the signed detour route will include 116th Street, Illinois Street, 111th Street, College Avenue, 131st/Main Street and Old Meridian Street.

Beginning Monday, Sept. 28 (before **Signal modifications and monitoring** morning rush hour), INDOT plans to **between 96th and 116th streets**

Traffic signal engineers are continuing to monitor the timing of signals along US 31 between 96th and 116th streets, and modifications are being made to help minimize congestion whenever possible. Additional adjustments will be made following the 116th/Pennsylvania streets closure.

U.S. 31/191st interchange open


The roundabout interchange at U.S. 31 and 191st Street is now fully open, INDOT announced Saturday afternoon.

With the new configuration, 191st Street now passes under U.S. 31, and roundabout ramps provide access to the highway in both directions. In addition, the temporary stoplight at U.S. 31 and 196th Street is removed, and traffic is now free-flowing on the highway from 116th Street north to 236th Street.



Westfield, Fishers girls golf teams make it a...

Historic day at regionals

Even in a tradition-laden area like Hamilton County, there is still girls golf history to be

Two schools put their names in the record books Saturday at the IH-SAA's girls golf regionals. Westfield won the Roncalli regional at Smock Golf Course in Indianapolis, claiming the school's first-ever regional trophy in girls golf. This sets up the Shamrocks well for next week's state finals, where they will play for the second consecutive year.



Meanwhile, tension was high at the Lapel regional, which took place

at Edgewood Golf Course in Anderson. When the scores were settled, Fishers held off two of the county's most established golf programs for the third-place spot, giving the Tigers their first ever opportunity to compete at state.

The state meet is a two-day tournament, running next Friday and Saturday (Oct. 2-3) at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel.

Westfield has had a great run of it in golf over the past few years. The Shamrocks' boys team won state championships in 2013 and 2015, and the girls are hoping to get their name on the biggest trophy of all.

The No. 2-ranked Lady 'Rocks are off to a good start. They dominated Smock, shooting a 314 to easily win the regional plaque.

"It's awesome," said Westfield coach Trevor Neu. "Our kids, they worked really, really hard to get to this point. We've played two individuals down here to kind of help prepare us for this point." That strategy paid off handsomely for the Shamrocks.

Cailyn Henderson led Westfield again, shooting a twotournament.

wasn't the best, but my driving was pretty good."

Adrienne Montalone carded a consistent 76, while Margaret Wentz shot a 78. Wentz, Morgan Baechle (90) and Emma Clary (92) all had one birdie.

No. 11 Center Grove finished second (330) and No. 8 Zionsville was third (333), both earning state berths as well. Unfortunately, Carmel placed fifth and saw a streak of eight consecutive state appearances come to an end. Still, the Greyhounds got quite a bit accomplished during that streak, winning state in 2013, and finishing as runnersup in 2009-10-12.

Makenzie George led fourth-ranked Carmel with an 81, a score that included two birdies. Libby McGuire (83) and Tyler Smith (90) both made one birdie.

Guerin Catholic had two individuals at regional. Marissa Singer carded an 81, including a birdie, and Dani Van Buren shot a 95.

The Lapel regional was a change - it's the regional that had been held for many years at Westwood Golf Club in New Castle. Westwood was known as a notoriously tough regional, and that didn't change just because the setting moved to Edgewood.

In fact, it may have gotten tougher. Four of the top 10 and five of the top 20 teams competed in that regional on Saturday. That included No. 5 Cathedral, which won the team championship with a 311. No. 3 Columbus North was

second with a 319. The other three ranked teams are all from Hamilton under par round of 70. That included three birdies. Hender- County. "These girls have worked extremely hard this year to get to this point," said Fishers coach Danny Smith. "We've been constantly right there with one shot here, one shot there. Last year we missed going to state by one shot, and this year we're going to state by one shot."

The Tigers were led by Morgan Lewis, who finished second individually with a 72; that ties her personal best. Kennedy Brooker helped out with a 79.

"We had all five girls under 90 for the first time all year," said Smith.

Hamilton Southeastern's fourth-place finish meant a long streak of state meet appearances has sadly come to an end. The Royals had made it to state 10 years in a row, every year since 2005. Southeastern won three titles during that streak, in 2008-10-11, and was a runner-up in 2006-07.

The Royals will have a representative at state. Ciara McAree carded a 73, good for fourth place individually, and placed her on the roster of top five golfers that advance

The Fishers and Noblesville boys cross country teams finished 1-2 in the AAA race at the New Haven Invitational on Saturday.

The Tigers ran away with the meet by scoring 63 points, with the Millers scoring 115. Noblesville's Eric Hoffman finished sixth, while Fishes' Trevor Thompson and Tristan Strobel were eighth and ninth respectively.

Hamilton Heights' boys and girls teams competed in the AA races. Kat Williams led the Huskies girls by taking 26th, with Dylan Young finishing 79th for the boys.

Meanwhile, Noblesville's girls team won the Ted Fox Memorial tournament at Bedford North Lawrence. The Millers scored 34 points and placed four runners in the Top 10: Abigail Little was second, Ciera Baldwin fifth, Susanna Sharples-Gordon eighth and Katherine Dombroski ninth

The Fishers girls team was a winner at the Delta Eagle Invitational, scoring 39 points. Tessa Kraft finished third for the Tigers, leading four Top 10 finishers: Kamya Lapsley was seventh, Halie Szilagyi eighth and Nacketa Scanlon 10th. Paige Schemanske led the girls by placing 38th, and Quinn Gallagher paced the boys by taking 43rd.






