State mandate means jail needs loom

On July 1 of this year a new state law was to take effect which provides that convicted criminals sentenced to a year or less in prison shall be kept in the county where they were tried. This means the county jail. Previously those convicted of a felony were sent off to a state correctional facility.

Recently, Hamilton County officials learned the effective date for this change has been delayed until at least January 1. But, the legislation is of concern to officials because the county jail has been running at or near capacity for some time. And, a monthly jail population that averages 10 to 20 more next year could put the facility beyond its capacity of 296.

A Jail Study Committee composed of Sheriff Mark Bowen, county commissioners, judges, and others involved in local criminal justice has been looking into options for meeting the likely influx of inmates. The committee is awaiting a report

from RQAW and DLZ engineering firms which have been hired to determine the best ways to meet expansion needs.

Preliminary indications are that the best and quickest way to meet the coming need is to complete the third floor of the of the Work Release Center which, when built, was left unfinished for future needs. Another option would be the reuse of the former juvenile detention center. And, in the longer term, a new addition to the county jail may be considered.

Since the additional space may be needed in only three months, time is of the essence. And, the state government has no

plan to pay the county for expansion needs. Apparently the state Department of Corrections will pay a per diem for each inmate to cover the cost of food, medicine and incidental expenses.

But, the bottom line is that the move to keep convicts in county facilities amounts to an unfunded mandate when it comes to capital costs and perhaps additional security needs. This means county taxpayers in all 92 counties will pick up additional obligations. Hamilton County has reserve funds that will be sufficient to pay for the expanded facilities, but not all counties are so fortunate.

Fishers Police searching for robbery suspect

Fishers Police are looking for a suspect in a possible robbery in the Avalon neighborhood early Wednesday morning.

According to a report on the Fishers Police Web site, officers responded to a burglary report on Milton Road, which is in Avalon on the northeast side of 126th Street and Olio Road, close to Thorpe Creek Elementary School.

"The homeowner discovered a person in their garage and called 911," the report said. "The suspect fled. Officers from Fishers, Noblesville, and the Hamilton County Sheriff's Department set up a perimeter and used K-9's to search the area. After an extensive search officers determined the suspect most likely left the area in a vehicle."

It's possible that the suspect in this robbery is related to a string of other thefts that took place in the area of 104th Street and Florida Road earlier in the week.

Will help Carmel paramedics...

CFD receives \$50,000 grant from St. Vincent for Mobile Integrated Health Program

The Carmel Fire Department has received two grants from St. Vincent Carmel and the St. Vincent Indianapolis Foundation for the department's Mobile Integrated Health Program. The grants, totaling \$50,000, will fund a program where Carmel paramedics are sent into the community to work with patients who have been recently released from hospitals and provide them with preventive care alternatives. Among the services offered on the visits: paramedics can assist patients with refilling medications, scheduling doctors' appointments and providing routine medical exams to ensure they are recovering as needed.

Through these preventive efforts, local hospitals are expected to see a reduction in the amount of times patients are readmitted to the hospital in a 30-day period. This helps hospitals meet the new requirements under the Federal Affordable Care Act. It also provides an opportunity for the fire

department to educate the community on the proper usage of the 911 system and create a culture of community health prevention in Carmel.

"We want to be sure when 911 is called for a medical run, it is a true emergency. If the patient is not having an emergency, Carmel paramedics will provide other avenues to meet their needs through healthcare prevention and education," said Carmel Fire Chief David Haboush.

St. Vincent Carmel president, Mike Chittenden, and St. Vincent Foundation executive director, Sue Anne Gilroy presented \$50,000 in grants to Chief Haboush during a ceremony this week at Carmel Fire Department Headquarters.

Open House for Sheriff Reserve Deputy recruiting

The Hamilton County Sheriff's Office will be hosting an Open House informational meeting on Wednesday, October 21 at 6:30pm at the Sheriff's Office for area residents interested in becoming a Sheriff Reserve Deputy. The Reserve Division is a group of unpaid volunteers empowered to assist full-time Sheriff's Office staff with upholding the law and preserving peace. The Sheriff's Office seeks qualified individuals who meet the high standards required to become part of one of the finest law enforcement agencies in Indiana and who are committed to serving the residents of Hamilton County. Reserves come from

a variety of backgrounds and experiences as they enter a second career in the field of law enforcement. The Reserve Division consists of two distinct classifications. Road Qualified Reserves perform patrol duties, similar to Merit Deputies, in addition to special details and other assignments. These Reserves are expected to work a minimum of 24 hours each month, mostly supplementing the Patrol Division, in addition to regular training. Auxiliary Reserves also work a minimum of 24 hours each month on special details such as court services, charity events, inmate security, and special as-

signments as well as supplementing Sheriff's Office staff. Reserve Deputies work alongside full-time staff in almost every aspect of the Sheriff's Office. Both Road Qualified and Auxiliary Reserves must attend a Reserve Academy sponsored by the Sheriff's Office. The academy will run from January through September 2016, meeting on evenings and weekends at the Sheriff's Office in Noblesville. Road Qualified Reserves will then complete a field training experience under the guidance of merit personnel. All Reserve Deputies must meet the same annual

training standards as full-time deputies after completing their initial training.

Minimum qualifications for Reserve Deputies are:

1. US Citizen or US citizenship by time of appointment
2. Valid Driver's License with no more than six (6) active points
3. No felony convictions or domestic violence convictions
4. Legal ability to possess a firearm
5. High School or equivalency diploma
6. Ability to read and write English
7. No Operating While Intoxicated convictions in last five (5) years
8. No dishonorable or undesirable discharge from military
9. No illegal drug use in last three (3) years
10. Pass all portions of the selection process, including a background check, physical fitness assessment, medical, psychological, and drug screening, and multiple written and practical exams during the Reserve Academy
11. Reside in Hamilton County or one of the adjacent counties
12. Must be at least 21 years of age (no upper age limit)

Millers beat HSE, win HCC championship

For the first time since 2009, the Noblesville girls soccer team is the Hoosier Crossroads Conference champion.

The Class 2A No. 3 Millers clinched the HCC title by beating fourth-ranked Hamilton Southeastern 1-0 on Wednesday. It was certainly a tough way to go for Noblesville, as five of the top eight teams in the Class

2A rankings are in the HCC. That means third-ranked Noblesville had to work hard and play top-level soccer all season to win the conference title.

The Millers finished with a 5-0-1 record in the conference. Noblesville would have won even if the game had ended in a tie, but the Millers would much rather have the win.

"The opportunity for the girls, as hard as they've worked, to win this really says

something towards their attitudes and their commitment to this team," said Noblesville coach Mike Brady.

The Millers got the goal they needed with 14:06 left in the second half, when senior Hannah Lee found the back of the net.

"It bounced off one of our players, and I just shot it," said Lee.

"That's just being opportunistic, being in the right place at the right time," said Brady. The scoring opportunity came off of a corner kick, and Lee sealed the deal.

still checking the records but we believe that the number of regular season shutouts, at least, ties the school record. This is also the 11th regular season since the IHSAA sanctioned soccer that the girls have gone undefeated. This last happened in the 2011-2012 season."

Carmel finished MIC play 7-0.

Guerin Catholic, ranked No. 11 in 2A, swept West Lafayette 6-0 on Wednesday.

Cassidy Lindley scored three goals for the Golden Eagles, with Lauren Rice, Kiana Hunter and Lindsey Zimmerman all scoring one. Hunter and Rice both had two assists, with Laila Dilts and Lindley both making one.

"West Lafayette was resilient and held us to only two goals in the first half, but we eventually broke them down by stepping up our speed-of-play and getting our outside attacking midfielders more involved in the game," said GC coach Rainford Hunter.

Westfield played 2A No. 8 Avon tough on Wednesday, before falling 2-1.

The Shamrocks took the lead early with a goal from Nicole Burkett. In the second half, Avon found the goal twice. Burkett and Isabelle Knaus both had strong games.

Carmel, the state's top-ranked 2A team, clinched the Metropolitan Conference championship by beating 2A No. 14 Center Grove 1-0 on the road.

It took the Greyhounds until the 69th minute to score, when senior Macy Miller finished off a pass by sophomore Katie Soderstrom.

Senior goalkeeper Celene Funke recorded her 15th shutout of the season and lowered her state leading goals against average to 0.0625.

"Both the single goal allowed this year and the GAA are new regular season records for Carmel High School girls soccer," said 'Hounds coach Frank Dixon. "We are

Defending champions return in girls golf state finals

The defending team and individual state champions both return for a shot at more glory as the 43rd Annual IHSAA Girls Golf State Finals will be played at Prairie View Golf Club in Carmel beginning Friday.

All competitors will play 36 holes over the two-day event. A total of 15 teams have advanced five golfers each and 25 individuals have moved on without their squads for a total of 100 participants. Groups will be teeing off the 1st and 10th tees at 8:30 a.m. on Friday. The first round tee times and pairings are available [here](#).

Top-ranked and defending state champion Evansville North, which won its first girls golf title a year ago, leads a group of seven teams returning from last season. The Huskies boast four returnees from last year's five players, including No. 1 Emma Kieffer, who shot the state tournament's best score so far, a 65 during the sectional at Fendrich Golf Course in Evansville. The team also carded the state's third-lowest score in sectional history with its 292 that day.

Evansville North also won last weekend's regional tournament at Country Oaks in Montgomery with a 306, the fifth-best regional score in tournament history. In the last two years, the Huskies have posted two of the top five regional scores with last year's 295 ranking as the best regional score ever. This will be the fifth straight state finals appearance for the defending state champions.

Bloomington South's Cherise Otter is the defending individual state champion and returns for what she hopes will be a repeat performance. This time Otter has a supporting cast with her as the Panthers qualified as a team

for the first time since 2002. After firing a 71 in last weekend's regional at Country Oaks, Otter fell in a playoff to Evansville Memorial's Lauren Guiao. The Panthers placed second in the team standings.

In addition to Evansville North, No. 2 Westfield is the only other returning school to have won their tournament last weekend. The Shamrocks captured their first regional with the help of Cailyn Henderson's 70 which led that field of golfers at Smock Golf Course in Indianapolis. Henderson tied for runner-up honors at state a year ago. Adrienne Montalone proved she is capable as well finishing with a 70 during her sectional round two weeks ago. Westfield finished sixth in last year's state finals.

No. 3 Columbus North placed second to No. 5 Indianapolis Cathedral for regional honors at Edgewood on Saturday. The Bull Dogs also figure into that group of returning state finalists following a fifth place showing in 2014. The team has shot a 309 and 319, respectively, in the tournament play.

Cathedral qualified for state for the first time in four seasons and are led by Betsy Werner who shot a 70 in both her sectional and regional outings. She tied for 10th in this event a year ago with a two-round 155.

Fishers is making its very first state finals appearance as a team. The ninth-ranked Tigers shot a 323 good for the third place at the Lapel Regional held at Edgewood last Saturday. That was one shot better than cross-town rival Hamilton Southeastern for the final qualifying spot which also ended the Royals' string of 10 straight state finals appearances.

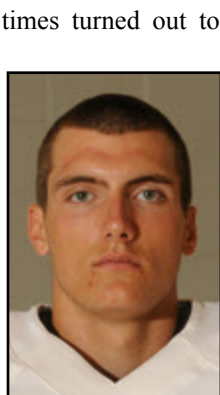
