The Carmel Fire Department has re- department to educate the community on and the St. Vincent Indianapolis Foundation for the department's Mobile Integrated Health Program. The grants, totaling \$50,000, will fund a program where Carmel paramedics are sent into the community to work with patients who have been recently released from hospitals and provide them with preventive care alternatives. Among the services offered on the visits: paramedics can assist patients with refilling medications, scheduling doctors' appointments and providing routine medical exams to ensure they are recovering as needed.

Through these preventive efforts, local hospitals are expected to see a reduction in the amount of times patients are readmitted to the hospital in a 30-day period. This helps hospitals meet the new requirements under the Federal Affordable Care Act. It also provides an opportunity for the fire
