Noblesville Mill

That nasty 7-letter word which has slowed progress in Noblesville since the days when horse and buggy transportation circled the courthouse square, raised its ugly head Thursday at a HAND public forum held in the Noblesville Township community building.

Parking.

Or better stated, a lack of parking in HAND's plan for building low income housing and retail business and offices at the historic Noblesville Grain Elevator.

At a meeting conducted by HAND's Executive Director Nate Lichti and attended by a crowd of approximately 25, some residents of the area questioned whether or not enough parking will be available in the

Lichti said HAND wants to build 54 apartments on the site where a grain elevator stood for over 100 years and also along with that project build retail outlets facing 8th Street. Lichti said 36 of the apartment units would be one-bedroom and 18 would be two-bedroom.



Two county schools named to National **Blue Ribbon list**

Two Hamilton County schools were recognized as National Blue Ribbon Schools for 2015 by the United States Department of Education.

The schools are Oak Trace Elementary, part of the Westfield-Washington School District, and Our Lady of Mount Carmel Catholic School, a K-8 school in Carmel that is operated by the Diocese of Lafavette.

A total of 335 schools from across the U.S. were named as National Blue Ribbon Schools based on their overall academic excellence or their progress in closing achievement gaps among student subgroups.

The grain elevator was built in 1904 and ers, coming from the old mill.

Lichti said HAND has 72 senior apartments in the Noblesville, Sheridan and Cicero area and 94 total apartments in the area. He said the first 100 units of the new project would be reserved for Noblesville residents. He said the waiting list for senior housing in the area currently is over 200

This, a \$12 million project, is the largest ever tackled by HAND.

Lichti said plans are to save only two floors of the grain elevator, suggesting that the other six floors would be too dangerous to save. He said the eight-story tower was the highest building in Noblesville.

Calling the project a "critical site" for development of the Southeast Quad, Lichti said the project could be completed by the fall of 2017. He said HAND currently is on a "tight timetable" to secure local funding before going after federal funds which would provide most of the money to build the project.

HAND, which also plans to build apartents and a community gym in the old Sheridan High School building, ran into a hurdle for funding for the grain elevator project when earlier this week the Hamilton County Commissioner rejected a request for \$250,000 from the general fund while passing on a request for \$225,000 of county-administered CDBG federal dollars. The Commissioners also passed on \$300,000 from the general fund for the Sheridan proj-

All monies approved by the County Commissioners also must be approved by the County Council.

Lichti may take his request directly to the County Council next Wednesday, Oct. 2. However, should the Council approve HANDS' request, the funds then would have to be approved by the County Commissioners.

HAND will attend the Sheridan Plan Commissioner meeting on Oct. 6; the Noblesville City Council meeting on Oct 13 and on Nov 10 will hold a HAND's neighborhoods NOW conference.

Officer William L. "Bill" Blake, age 73, of Sheridan, passed away Tuesday morning, September 29, 2015, at St. Elizabeth Seton Specialty Hospital surrounded by his loving family. Bill was born on March 26, 1942, in Alexandria, Indiana to the late Robert L. and Mabel (Johnson) Blake. After graduating from Alexandria High School and Indiana Business College, Bill would work in finance for the next 15 years. During this time, he would also serve his country with the 138th Signal Battalion of the Indiana National Guard, completing activation assignments in Panama and Puerto Rico. Having an interest in law enforcement, Bill applied and was accepted as a full time officer with the Sheridan Police Department. After his graduation from the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy, Officer Blake returned to the department and continued his training. Officer Blake never stopped wanting to learn new skills and techniques to help him better serve the community of Sheridan. He completed the St. Vincent Hospital Emergency Medical Training (E.M.T.) School, becoming certified by the State of Indiana. Officer Blake also had an interest in interviewing and interrogation techniques. He would later graduate as a Master Examiner from the N.I.T.V. Voice Stress School in Indianapolis and West Palm Beach, Fla. Although very proud of Bill, his family, and especially his children, were not very happy that dad was now a human lie detector. Bill was always willing to assist any officer that requested a voice stress exam. In 2001, after almost 25 years of service, 18 of those years spent as Deputy Chief of Police, Officer Bill Blake would retire from the Sheridan Police Department. Bill loved the town of Sheridan and was very humbled and grateful for the opportunity to serve them on their police department for all of those years. Bill also worked for many, many years for Eagle Security.

Bill was a member of Sheridan Fidelity Masonic Lodge F&AM 309 and the Fraternal Order of Police. He also attended the First Christian Church of Sheridan.

Bill is survived by his 4 sons, Greg L. Blake (Brenda) of Cicero, Charles R. "Bobby" Roach of Sheridan, Ryan Sutton (Stephanie) of Noblesville and T.J. 

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
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Here we go again...

Carmel, Ben Davis battle

When you're a Carmel playing football in the MIC conference "big" games, "big" rivalries, and "big" series come a dime a

One of those "big" games for the Greyhounds will be played tonight when Carmel travels to Ben Davis.

This has been a whale of series, dating back to 1958 when Coach Dick Nyers' Carmel crew lost 19-6 to the Giants.

Ben Davis leads the series 21-19.

The two teams split last year, Carmel winning 37-14 in the regular season game and Ben Davis winning 42-24 in the state championship game.

Here's what first-year (varsity) Carmel coach John Hebert has to say about this year's matchup.

"Ben Davis is very physical and talented. This will be a typical Ben Davis/Carmel matchup. We need to win the battle in the trenches and limit big plays," said the coach.

Ben Davis does have the talent, including Chris Evans who in last year's state final game carried the pigskin 19 times for 127 yards against the Carmel defense. This year Evans has 89 carries for 466 yards and has caught 29 passes for 434 yards.

The Giants have another talented runner in Jeremiah Whitthorne, 63 carries for 331 yards. Stan Emerson has caught 21 passes for 262 yards.

Carmel, as they say, isn't all that bad, either. Especially at quarterback where Mike Viktrup has connected on 69-of-104 passes for 812 yards and 10 touchdowns. He has been intercepted only two times.

"Mike Viktrup put together another efficient night last week in the 51-0 win over North Central," Hebert said. "He is 30-of-36 through the past two games."

Viktrup has two outstanding receivers in Jalen Walker, 23 catches for 306 yards, and Ethan Merriweather, with 18 receptions for 234 yards.

On the ground, Tobias Watkins will go head-to-head with Ben Davis' Evans. Watkins has carried the pigskin 110 times for

"We feel like the game with North Central was a major step forward for our team," said Hebert. "We put together a very focused effort in all three phases of the game. Jalen Walker was outstanding, as a returner and receiver. Nick Fox and Sam Hipple led the defensive effort, which allowed less than 50 yards before the No 1 unit was replaced by reserves."

Carmel is 4-2 with wins over Southeastern 28-7, Pike 38-33, Lawrence North 34-14 and North Central and losses to Cincin-

Both teams need a win...

Can 'Hawks out struggle Tipton?

Sheridan and Tipton, two schools which in one sport or another have been battling for years, will go to war once again tonight when the Blackhawks travel to face the Blue Devils on the football gridiron.

"Both teams are struggling," said Sheridan coach Bud Wright. "They're struggling and we're struggling a little."

Sheridan, 2-4 on the year, is a young football team still searching for Wright's 400th victory. The Blackhawks need six wins to reach that mark yet this season.

Sheridan's lone wins have come over Clinton Central 26-12 and Eastern 50-21. The Blackhawks have lost to Western Boone 47-20, North White 54-13, Carroll 26-19 and last week to Tri-Central 34-20.

The Blackhawks showed some signs of maturing in giving Tri-Central a battle last week.

"We did," Wright agreed, "but Tri-Central isn't as good as they were the last two seasons. We have to eliminate our mistakes. We don't execute."

Tipton, like Sheridan a young team, does most of its damage through the air. Junior quarterback Kellen Woods is 86-of-131 through the air for 1,211 yards. He has fired for eight touchdowns and has been intercepted eight times. His leading receivers are sophomore Caleb Burkett with 34 catches for 425 yards and junior Matt Gutierrez with 28 receptions for 514 yards.

Woods has rushed 69 times for 137 yards. Sophomore Blake Edwards has rushed 62 times for 215 yards and freshman Sebastian Olson 42 times for 181 yards

The Blue Devils are 3-3. They have defeated Madison-Grant 38-21, Elwood 35-33 and Western 38-13 and lost to Lafayette Central Catholic 51-0, Hamilton Heights 31-6 and Northwestern 34-14.

Sheridan will return one of its ground weapons this week with K.J. Acevedo coming off a two-week injury. He is one of the Blackhawks Wright uses in running by committee. Acevedo has gained 301 yards in 58 carries; Joey Callahan 568 yards in 106 trips; quarterback Jake Chesney with 70 attempts for 601 yards and Kenny Burnell with 28 rushes for 290 yards.

Through the air, Chesney is 12-of-31 for 157 yards.

Sheridan, a 1A school, might be entering a tough place to play at 3A Tipton. You've got to think the Blue Devils are still steaming a little from a 53-16 Sheridan win last season.






