

## Westfield man dies due to crash injuries

A Westfield man has succumbed to injuries he received in a motor vehicle crash in Noblesville last week.

Jack J. Spears Jr., 31, Westfield passed away on Wednesday at IU Health Methodist in Indianapolis. Spears was involved in an accident during the evening of Sept. 26 at 156th Street and Boden Road.

Based on witness statements and evidence at the scene, it appears that a 2012 Honda Civic was traveling westbound on 156th Street when it pulled out into the path of a 2003 Kawasaki motorcycle that was traveling southbound on Boden Road. At this particular intersection, 156th Street is regulated by stop signs and Boden Road traffic has none.

The driver of the Honda was identified as Andy C. Coy, 18, from Fishers, IN. The driver was transported by ground ambulance to St. Vincent (Fishers). The front seat passenger, 17year-old from Noblesville, was also transported by ground ambulance to St. Vincent (Fishers). Both front seat occupants appeared to suffer minor injuries. A third passenger, a 16-year-old from Fishers, was treated and released at the scene.

There were no additional occupants on the motorcycle. The crash remains an ongoing investigation.





# Royals hold off Millers, 20-12

Hamilton Southeastern's 2015 Homecoming football game will not be forgotten any time soon.

In a rainy, strange and at times scary Friday evening, the Royals held off a spirited Noblesville team 20-12. The Millers, despite losing quarterback Luke Melloh to an injury in the third quarter, played determined against Hoosier Crossroads Conference leading Southeastern, but a late touchdown by HSE's star running back Aaron Matio sealed the win.

"It was just a weird game," said Royals coach Scott May. "We never really got going. I thought they did a good job defensively, and they struggled a little bit offensively, but so did we. It was just kind of a prayers go out to him." defensive battle."

Melloh and Jarel Youree took turns running the ball from the Royals' 42 to the 3, and that's where Youree scored from. His score came with 14 seconds left in the half.

Southeastern pulled back ahead in the third quarter, when a resolute drive ended with a five-yard touchdown run by Matio. The Millers were hoping to respond, but that became secondary after Melloh was injured in the third quarter.

"He's good," said NHS coach Lance Scheib. "Our hearts and thoughts and

"I thought for a young man that's not ever been a quarterback on a Friday night, I thought he played fantastic," said Scheib.

Noblesville closed the gap in the early stages of the fourth quarter, with Youree running in from 23 yards to score. That cut HSE's lead to 14-12. The Millers then held the Royals to a three-and-out, but HSE got the ball back on an interception.

Southeastern started its next possession from its own 3, and made its way down to midfield. Once at the Royals 49, Matio zoomed into score from there, a 51-yard touchdown with 2:25 left. Noblesville's last possession resulted in a turnover on downs, and Matio got one more first down to ensure HSE's win.

Matio totaled 143 yards in 21 carries, including the two touchdowns. While those are good numbers, May was unhappy about his team's nine penalties, which totaled 83 yards.

"It seemed like every time we did something good, we were going backwards," said May. Like I told the kids afterwards, we got to look at the film and we got to clean some things up."

But in the end?

"It's a win, and that's what we're looking for right now, is to keep winning," said May.

Youree led Noblesville with his two touchdowns, part of a 159-yard rushing night. The Millers dropped to 3-4 after the loss, but Scheib thinks his team is better than that record says.

"It's the story of our year," said Scheib. "We're there, we can't find a way to get over the hump. We're a really good football team, and to be 3-4 right now is something that's disappointing, because we're better than 3-4. But we're playing great football. We've got to find a way to get over the hump and make plays, and that starts as we move forward with Brownsburg."

The Royals host Columbus Hartley next week, while Noblesville, which is now 1-3 in conference play, hosts Brownsburg.

# TL comes from behind

Hamilton Heights bulldog Clayton Cowan and Twin Lakes speedster Kris Goodlow put on some kind of running show for fans who attended a cold, breezy, wet Homecoming Friday evening at Arcadia.

Problem was, for Heights fans, Goodlow got a little more help from his friends as the visiting Indiana came from behind to defeat the Huskies in a 17-14 thriller.

Actually, Goodlow didn't score a point for Twin Lakes. But, his running kept the Indians in the game and eventually led to the win. Cowan scored both touchdowns for Coach Mitch Street's Huskies.

"They hurt us with a couple of big plays," said Street, "and we couldn't break one. Also, we didn't finish drives and we didn't put together enough first downs."

It was a tough Homecoming loss for the now 4-3 Huskies.

Twin Lakes never led in the game until Ryan Hibbets booted a 32-yard, gamewinning field goal with three seconds left

As one would have it, it was Hibbets who missed an extra point boot in the second quarter, a missed PAT which kept the Indians from catching up ....until Hibbets' foot won the battle at the end.

Hamilton Heights led 7-0 after one quarter and 7-6 at halftime. The Huskies went to the fourth period with that 14-6

But, the lead was a slim one all the way, and Heights never really gained control of the game.

The Huskies went 34 yards in 10 plays on their first possession in the opening quarter. Cowan scored from the nine with 6:09 remaining and Henry Magdun kicked a PAT which was to play a big part in the game

On the first play of the second quarter, Twin Lakes came up with one of those big plays. Quarterback Blake Bennington ran 76 yards for the TD, but Hibbets missed the extra point.

Hibbets also missed a field goal before

In the third quarter, the Indians threatened, but fumbled. Jesse Brown recovered, and that led to Heights' second touchdown. Cowan got this one, too, scoring from the four. Magdun again kicked the extra point and with 2:54 remaining in the third quarter, Heights led 14-6.

But, the Huskies didn't score again and Twin Lakes would put 11 points on the board in the fourth quarter.

The Indians opened the final period by fumbling again, this time eight yards away from scoring. Brown again recovered for the Huskies.

With 8:11 remaining in the game, Twin Lakes tied the battled at 14-14 when Connor Cain burst 27 yards for a touchdown and then ran across a two-point conversion.

Heights, keyed by a 20-yard pass from Ethan Jones to Brown, looked as if it might retake the lead. But, as Street said later, the Huskies failed to finish that drive after moving to the Indians' 35.

Another big Twin Lakes long run, this one a 54-yarder by Goodlow, set up the field goal. The Huskies, keyed by defensive plays from Joe Woods and Nathan Roth, forced a Twin Lakes fourth down, and from there Hibbets booted the game an. winner.






