



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Noblesville to host high-scoring Brownsburg....

With Plumer at QB

Playing in the Hoosier Crossroads Conference week after week, teams are faced with many challenges. This week on Senior Night in the Millers final home game of the regular season, Noblesville will face a double-barrel challenge.

First, trying to stop one of the state's top scoring machines. Brownsburg will come to Hare Chevrolet Field with the 14th best offense in the state. The Bulldogs are averaging 45.4 points a game.

Brownsburg also is allowing 41.6 points a game.

Second, Noblesville will try to put points on the board with a quarterback who is starting his first varsity game. Junior McGwire Plumer will replace two-year veteran Luke Melloh, who is sidelined for the year with an injury

Melloh was injured in the Southeastern game last Friday. Plumer stepped in and hit on 2-of-8 passes for 40 yards.

With the change in quarterback, speedster Jarel Youree keyed Noblesville's offense last week, carrying the pigskin 22 times for 159 yards.

Noblesville lost, 20-12 to HSE, which clinched at least a tie for the conference championship and currently is unbeaten in the HCC.

"I thought we matched the physical play of HSE throughout the entire game, which gave us the opportunity to win the game in the fourth quarter," said Noblesville coach Lance Scheib.

"I thought our offensive line played its best game of the year," Scheib continued. "I was pleased with how well we ran the ball. When you are physical up front and can run the ball, you are in every game."

Running the football; controlling the football, and keeping the pigskin out of the hands of the high-powered Bulldogs could give Noblesville a chance to win this week. Those things, plus an improved Noblesville defense which has been playing well.

"I have been pleased with the progress of our defense," Scheib said. "I thought we adjusted to Southeastern's pace of play and matched up well with their athletes.'

Brownsburg has been nearly unstoppable the last two weeks with victories over Westfield 59-30 and Zionsville 66-41.

But, the Bulldogs are just 3-4 on the year. Their other victory was over Franklin 68-7. Their losses have been to Pike 55-34 Lawrence North 65-47, Avon 56-21 and

has passed for nearly 2,000 yards, and by Toks Akinribade, a 6-1, 205-pounder who has run for more than 800 yards.

Melloh was both a running and throwing threat for the Millers.

'We are playing the hottest offense in the conference," Scheib said of Brownsburg. "They raked up over 800 yards in offense last week and over 700 yards the week before. We will need to be at our best to slow them down.

"We must be able to run the ball to keep their offense off the field. We must be able to adjust to their pace of play on offense and not get rattled with their up tempo style," the Noblesville coach added. Noblesville owns a two-game win string over the Bulldogs, beating Brownsburg in a 36-35 overtime thriller last year and winning 26-6 two years ago.

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


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Royals travel to Ohio....

It could be a very interesting, and exciting, end to Hamilton Southeastern's regular season football schedule.

This Friday the Royals will travel outside the state to take on Bishop Hartley High School in Columbus, Ohio.

The following week HSE will meet high-scoring Brownsburg at Victory Field. A win in that game will give Coach Scott May's club a full share of the Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship. 

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
