Cicero receives Green Communities award from IACT

The Indiana Association of Cities and Towns (IACT) announced on September 30th which Indiana communities obtained designation as an IACT Green Community. The cities and towns of Cicero, Fishers, Union City and Whiting received their awards during the IACT Annual Awards Luncheon presented by Umbaugh, during the 2015 IACT Annual Conference & Exhibition in French Lick.

IACT launched the Green Communities Initiative in 2008 in conjunction with Christopher B. Burke Engineering, Ltd., to identify potential cost savings to communities facing budget shortfalls, promote economically competitive quality of life concepts, and ultimately serve as role models for citizens while better protecting our environment. The initiative will expand educational opportunities for municipalities and create a consolidated clearinghouse of data and programs that can be accessed by municipalities. "This is a fantastic program that allows cities and towns to showcase their hard work and commitment to smart, efficient practices. The survey these communities complete is extremely comprehensive and gives a great deal of credibility to the Green Community designations." said IACT Executive Director and CEO Matt Greller. Representatives from participating cities had to fill out a 51-question survey in the areas of purchasing, operations, measuring success, and sample projects. County, northern communities begin trail study





INDOT offers tips on avoiding deer collisions

ers to stay alert as deer become more active in fall months deer. on Indiana's highways.

Nearly 50 percent of all vehicle crashes involving deer occur between October and December. Deer are generally more active in late October into early November during deer mating season. And with many farmers harvesting crops, deer could be on the move at anytime, encountering roads more frequently and increasing the potential for collisions

According to State Farm Insurance, the odds of an Indiana driver hitting a deer are one in 142. Across the state annually, thousands of motorists report deer-related collisions, including deer-vehicle collisions, as well as vehicles

The Indiana Department of Transportation urges driv- crashing as a result of attempting to avoid a collision with

Deer-vehicle collisions will happen, but drivers can take measures to keep these collisions to a minimum. Knowing when deer are most active and practicing defensive driving will help reduce your chances of becoming a statistic:

Deer often travel in groups. If you see one, others are likely nearby. Stay alert!

before and in areas near "Deer Crossing" warning signs. Exercise caution along woodlot edges, at hills and blind

Use high beam headlights at night when there is no * opposing traffic.

Scan for illuminated eyes and dark silhouettes on or near the side of the roadway.

* If you see a deer, slow your speed drastically, even if it is far away.

And then there's an interesting idea being toss around about moving offices currently in the old courthouse into the Judicial Center. This would free up the courthouse to be used by the numerous non-profit human service agencies in the county.

These agencies are scattered and usually have to pay rent at their current locations. The theory here is that most of these agencies are already being subsidized in part by the county because they meet public needs that local government would otherwise probably be called upon the provide.

Of course, with all this comes with the old bugaboo of parking needs. It's both a city and a county problem. Studies upon studies have been done or are being done. No decisions have been made, but it's a problem that should not be a matter of getting the cart before the horse.

There have been no final decisions on any of this, but the pieces are gradually coming together. Time will tell how it works out. The Judicial Center expansion is not likely to start until at least next year, but if I were a county official, I'd be out talking about it. It shouldn't be a tough sell.

Indiana Department of Transportation are raising awareness for the state's "Move Over Law", which requires motorists to approach cautiously, slow down, and move over when an emergency vehicle is stopped on a roadway with emergency lights flashing. INDOT has a new video on its YouTube channel about the Move Over law https://youtu.be/U7enyx7RPF0

The "Move Over" law requires drivers to change lanes away from emergency vehicles, if you can do so safely. If not, drivers should reduce their speed 10 mph under the posted speed limit and proceed with caution. Motorists should not stop in the roadway, as this may cause a chain reaction rear end collision with other professionals.

In an effort to keep Indiana roadways vehicles. Failure to comply can result in The "Move Over" law applies to these vehicles:

- Police vehicles
- Ambulances
- Fire trucks and rescue equipment
- Highway incident-response vehicles
- Highway maintenance vehicles
- Utility service vehicles
- Tow Trucks

Needing a victory....

`Rocks, Tigers meet tonight

Talking about Westfield's home game tonight with Fishers, Shamrock coach Jake Gilbert hit the nail on the head.

"Fishers and us both need to win this game to get things rolling on the right track again. I expect a great game," Gilbert said.

This is Week 8 in the regular season. The IHSAA will conduct its post-season draw on Sunday. Week 9, the final week, is coming up next week.

Fishers and Westfield, two clubs expected to contend for the Hoosier Crossroads Conference championship, did just that in the first half of the season. Both have dropped out of contention during the second half.

Westfield, which started the season 4-0, the last three weeks has dropped three consecutive HCC games, falling to Southeastern, Brownsburg and Avon. The Shamrocks, quite honestly, could be faced with a basement battle with Noblesville and Brownsburg. Westfield is 4-3 overall and 2-3 in the conference. The game tonight will be WHS's last conference game of the season.

Fishers, 4-3 overall and 2-2 in the conference, has a little more breathing room for a higher HCC finish. The Tigers could finish third; maybe even second. But, Fishers has lost three of its last four games and two of those games were conference games. The Tigers started the season an overall 3-0.

'This is our Senior Night," Gilbert said. "We respect Fishers and I know this will be a true battle. Their defense is scary good at times. They rarely, if ever, make mistakes as a team. They truly make you earn everything you get from them."

Westfield is coming off a 35-20 conference loss to Avon.

"We dug such a huge hole that we Jeremy Chinn is Fishers' leading rusher, with 62 carries in 379 yards this season. couldn't quite make it out," Gilbert talked about that game. "We got decimated in the first quarter. We couldn't started much worse We had three opportunities to tie when the score was 28-20 but turned it over inside their 30 all three times, including once on the one-yard line.

"Basically, our kids played very hard with a ton of guts, but we turned the ball over too much to win," Gilbert said.

"Westfield, like us, started the season strong but has struggled lately against three quality opponents," said Fishers coach Rick Wimmer. "They are very balanced on offense, that will force us to be very physical at the line of scrimmage, as well as to play well in space. The quarterback is a dual threat with the run and their running back looks to have very good feet as well as having toughness. They have three or four outstanding receivers to go, so it is difficult to stop one aspect of their offense and force them into the other. Wimmer continued, "Defensively," "their blitzing and stunts can cause problems for an offense and create some big play, but if blocked at the line of scrimmage leaves some opportunities for big plays. They've always been a good team at creating turnovers, so it will be important for us

to take care of the ball and do a good job with field position on special teams."

Fans will see two 1,000-yard plus quarterbacks. Fishers' Josh Eaton is 85-for-159 for 1,189 yards. He has thrown for eight touchdowns and been intercepted two times. Westfield's Ryan Pepiot is 138-for 239 and has tossed for 1,524 yards. He has thrown for seven touchdowns and has been intercepted eight times. Interesting, Pepiot has carried the football 92 times for 400 yards and seven rushing touchdowns.

Both quarterbacks have excellent receivers. For Westfield, Evan Manley has 35 catches for 502 yards; Lucas Schultz 24 for 248 and Max McCool 37 for 370. For Fishers, Devonte Adams has caught 17 balls for 203 yards and Kade Orris 20 for 331.

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

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

Fever's Catchings makes Second Team...

All-WNBA First and Second Teams announced

Chicago Sky forward Elena Delle Donne, the 2015 WNBA Most Valuable Player presented by Samsung, headlines the 2015 All-WNBA First Team, the WNBA announced today. Delle Donne received First Team votes on all 39 ballots, making her the only unanimous pick from a panel of national and local sportswriters and broadcasters.

Joining Delle Donne (195 total points) in the First Team frontcourt are two former WNBA MVPs in 2014 winner Maya Moore of the Minnesota Lynx, a forward who received 37 First Team votes and 188 points, and 2012 winner Tina Charles of the New York Liberty, a center who earned 24 First Team votes and 167 points. The First Team also features guards DeWanna Bonner of the Phoenix Mercury (19 First Team votes, 131 points) and Angel McCoughtry of the Atlanta Dream (nine First Team votes, 102 points).

Phoenix center Brittney Griner (147 points) highlights the 2015 All-WNBA Second Team and is joined in the frontcourt by Los Angeles Sparks forward Candace Parker (106) and Indiana Fever forward Tamika Catchings (63). The Second Team backcourt is comprised of Liberty guard Epiphanny Prince (96) and Sky guard Courtney Vandersloot (73).

Voting for the All-WNBA First and Second Teams was conducted at the conclusion of the regular season. Players were selected by position and received five points for each First Team vote and three points for each Second Team vote.

Delle Donne, a member of the All-WNBA First Team for the first time in her three seasons, averaged a league-high 23.4 points, scoring at least 40 points twice, 30 points five times, and 20 points 21 times. She also shot a WNBA-best 95.0 percent (207-for-218) from the free throw line and finished third in the league in rebounding (8.4 rpg) and blocked shots (2.06 bpg). The First Team honor is the latest accolade for Delle Donne, a Second Team selection in 2014, the leading vote-getter for WNBA All-Star presented by Boost Mobile in two of her three seasons, and the 2013 WNBA Rookie of the Year presented by Samsung.

Moore earned her third straight selection to the All-WNBA First Team. The four-time All-Star was the runner-up to Delle Donne for both the 2015 WNBA MVP Award presented by Samsung and the scoring title (20.6 ppg). She also ranked second in the league in made threes per game (2.1), sixth in steals (1.64 spg), tied for eighth in assists (3.5 apg), and ninth in rebounding (6.7 rpg). Moore and the Lynx are currently tied 1-1 against Catchings and the Fever in the WNBA Finals presented by Boost Mobile, with Game 3 set for Friday, Oct. 9 at Bankers Life Fieldhouse in Indianapolis (8 p.m. ET, ESPN2).

Game 1 of WNBA Finals sets record

Game 1 of the 2015 WNBA Finals presented by Boost Mobile, which aired October 4 on ABC, resulted in the most-watched Game 1 ever on ABC and the most-watched Game 1 on ABC/ESPN networks since 1998. The matchup between the Indiana Fever and the Minnesota Lynx saw a +2% increase in viewership, with 571,000 viewers vs. 558,000 viewers in 2014, according to Nielsen.

ESPN networks exclusive coverage of the 2015 Finals featuring the Western Conference champion Minnesota Lynx and the Eastern Conference champion Indiana Fever will continue Friday, Oct. 9, at 8 p.m. on ESPN2. The series is tied following Minnesota's victory in Game 2. Commentator Ryan Ruocco and analyst Rebecca Lobo, with reporter Holly Rowe will call the game, with Carolyn Peck providing studio analysis from ESPN's Bristol, Conn., studio.

Charles was named to the All-WNBA Team for the sixth consecutive year, having been a First Team selection in 2011 and 2012 and a Second Team pick in 2010, 2013, and 2014. She ranked second in the league in rebounding (8.5 rpg) and fourth in scoring (17.1 ppg). Charles finished third in the MVP balloting behind Delle Donne and Moore.

Bonner's first All-WNBA Team honor follows her first selection to WNBA All-Star presented by Boost Mobile earlier this season. She finished fifth in the league in scoring (15.8 ppg), 10th in steals (1.33 spg), 13th in assists (3.3 apg), and tied for 16th in rebounding (5.7 rpg).

McCoughtry is the only player to be named to the All-WNBA First Team and WNBA All-Defensive First Team in 2015. This marks the fourth All-WNBA nod for the two-time scoring champion, who was a First Team choice in 2011 and a Second Team selection in 2013 and 2014. McCoughtry was third in the WNBA in scoring (20.1 ppg) and second in steals (2.12 spg) this season.

In honor of being named to the All-WNBA First and Second Teams, each player will receive a trophy designed by Tiffany & Co. In addition, \$10,000 will be awarded to each member of the First Team, while each member of the Second Team will receive \$5,000.
