Small number of contests in this year's municipal election

Each election in Hamilton County seems to set a new record for low voter turnout and the upcoming municipal election November 3 appears to be no exception. The main reason this year is the small number of contests. In Noblesville only two Democrats are on the ballot, both running for city council seats. Absentee voting, sometimes called early voting, is underway for the offices at stake in Noblesville, Cicero, Fishers, and Arcadia.



Registered voters in these four communities may vote at the County Judicial Center or by absentee ballot until noon November 2. But, thus far there have been few requests. In Carmel, Westfield, Sheridan and Atlanta there will be no election this year because Republican candidates are all unopposed. In the Noblesville race for city council-at-large Democrat Paula Gilliam is seeking to become only the second black elected to office in city history. The other was the late C. Murphy White, a Republican, who served for many years on the city council. Ms. Gilliam is joined by Marie DeMore on the Democratic ticket. At Fishers perennial candidate Greg Purvis, running for city council, is the only Democrat on the ballot. In Fishers

and in Noblesville all elective offices are currently held by Republicans. In Cicero the only incumbent Democrat in Hamilton County, Jan Unger, is running for re-election as clerk-treasurer. She is opposed by Republican candidate Susan Underwood. And in Arcadia an independent candidate, Jeff Lockridge, is seeking a seat on the town council. Regardless of the small number of contests and lack of interest among voters, the elections will still cost money, probably in the neighborhood of \$70,000 despite efforts by election officials to cut back on the number of poll workers and other costs.

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Fishers Fire Marshal Brian Lott retires

Fishers Fire Department announces the retirement of Fire Marshal Brian Lott. A celebration and recognition is scheduled for 1 to 3 p.m. Monday at Fishers City Hall.

Chief Lott first joined the fire department as a volunteer firefighter in 1981. As a life-long resident, Brian has spent the majority of his 34 years as firefighter here in Fishers. As a volunteer, he held the ranks of FF, Captain and Assistant Chief.

In 1986 he was hired full-time by the Lawrence Township Fire Department and worked there for 5 years rising to the rank of Lieutenant.

By 1991, Fishers Volunteer Fire Department had been turned over to the Town of Fishers to run and Brian was hired full-time as the Towns Fire Marshall.

In 1996, Brian was promoted to the rank of Fire Chief for the Town of Fishers and was tasked with leading his team in matching fire and EMS services with the explosive growth of the Town. Under his 13 years of command, the department grew from 2 fire stations to 5 with a compliment of full time firefighters crossed trained in EMS and rescue capabilities.

He has held the ranks of Chief, Deputy Chief and Fire Marshal during his 24 years of service as a professional firefighter with the Town of Fishers.

One of his proudest moments was in 2004 when the Fishers Fire Department, in conjunction with Clay Fire Territory, was the first in the state of Indiana to become Internationally Accredited. This certification continues today.

Chief Lott also takes great pride in being a member of MC Axe and the Fire Crew, which started in 1991 as a group of firefighters rapped and sang their way through elementary schools teaching fire safety to kids not only in Fishers, but

throughout Indiana, Michigan, and Florida. While no longer performing with the group, that group continues today and performs across the country and celebrating 25 years in 2016.

During those years of performing, the group was awarded the National Forestry Service Bronze Smokey Award for outstanding service for fire safety for our natural resources. This is their highest fire safety award presented.

Partnering with WFYI Indianapolis, PBS channel, MC Axe and the Firecrew produced music video's which won an Emmy for a 30 minute children's video.

Because the fire community and the community of Fishers are so important to him, Chief Lott was a part of the following Boards and Commissions:

- 1996-2007 International Fire Chiefs Association Great Lakes Board Member
- 1996-Current Indiana Fire Chiefs Association Board Member and Co-Chair of the Mutual Aid Section, Past President
- 1996-Current – Rotary Club of Fishers member and Board Member
- Citizens Energy Group Stakeholders Board for past 10 years
- Coach of 11U Baseball Travel Team
- Worked with Hoosier Burn Camp for several years
- Appointed by the Governor to the Indiana Emergency Response Commission, served on the that commission for 6 years

Over the years, Chief Lott has earned many accolades as well:

- Awards and recognitions
- Officer of the Year x 2, Fishers Fire Department
- Key to the Town from the Fishers Town Council for leadership while serving as the Fire Chief
- Fishers Rotarian of the Year

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Millers fight to the end, but...

Bulldogs are too much

Noblesville found itself blitzed by Brownsburg on Friday, as a big first half led the Bulldogs past the Millers 47-24 in a Hoosier Crossroads Conference game at Hare Chevrolet Field.

Brownsburg scored first, but the Millers' Andrew Little cut the lead down by making a 27-yard field goal with 1:29 left. But the Bulldogs ran away with the second quarter, scoring 19 points and jumping to a 26-3 halftime lead.

"We didn't play well," said Noblesville coach Lance Scheib. "We got outmanned. I thought their plan offensively was better than our plan on defense. We got a little rattled and didn't really recover."

The Bulldogs led by 40-3 in the third quarter before the Millers made a run. Travis Gillian provided a spark by catching a 55-yard pass from McGwire Plumer midway through the period. Noblesville scored its other two touchdowns on short runs in the fourth quarter. Chandler Hurst ran in from the one-yard line and Tyler Gonzalez scored from five yards.

"We asked our kids to play hard and finish the game, and they did that," said Scheib.

Plumer, playing his first full game, completed 14 of 28 passes for 205 yards. Jarel Youree was the Millers' leading rusher, running for 38 yards.

Noblesville fell to 3-5, and 1-4 in conference play. The Millers finish HCC action next Friday at Avon.

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As Huddleston stars....

Tigers top `Rocks, 42-28

Fishers’ running game has been by committee most of the season. Last evening in a key Hoosier Crossroads Conference game at Westfield, Coach Rick Wimmer found a chairman of the board.

Jermaine Huddleston, who Wimmer said was No. 3 on the list of four entering last night’s game, carried the pigskin 30 times, gained 233 yards and scored three touchdowns as the Tigers knocked off the Shamrocks 42-28.

“The first two tailbacks we put in the game fumbled the football,” Wimmer said. “Huddleston was outstanding and Michael Noble (9 carries for 65 yards) also did a nice job.

“We really ran the ball well and our offensive line was outstanding,” Wimmer added.

The win broke a two-game Fishers losing string and moved the Tigers to 5-3 on the year. Meanwhile, Westfield’s woes continued. The Shamrocks now have lost four in a row and are 4-4 on the year.

“What I really like is how when Westfield came back, we fought them off,” Wimmer said.

Fishers led 14-7 at halftime and 28-7 after three quarters. Westfield scored three times in the fourth period to cause the Tigers to fight for their lives.

Westfield scored first on a one-yard run by quarterback Ryan Pepiot. Fishers tied the game on a Zach Eaton to Mason Davis pass.

Eaton went to the air again for a second quarter touchdown, throwing to Kade Orris. That took the Tigers to halftime with a 14-7 lead.

Two Fishers touchdowns in the third frame put the Tigers in great shape. Noble scored on a 33-yard run and Huddleston scored on a one yard run.

That set the stage for a fourth quarter slug out between these two Hamilton County rivals.

Westfield scored back-to-back touchdowns on a run by Nate Froelcih and a Pepiot pass to Milo Beam

Fishers fought back on a 43-yard touchdown run by Huddleston.

Pepiot again put Westfield in position to win on a 25-yard touchdown pass to Beam, before Huddleston’s final touchdown of the night with 1:24 remaining gave Fishers all the breathing room it needed.

Pepiot, the senior quarterback, had a big night for Coach Jake Gilbert’s Westfield team. He completed 22-of-42 passes for 281 yards and two touchdowns. He carried the pigskin 21 times for 75 yards and a TD.

Brandon Karsnick, in 14 carries, rushed for 80 Westfield yards. Beam caught eight passes for 152 yards and two touchdowns and Evan Manley had five catches for 62 yards.

For Fishers, Eaton connected on 10-of-18 passes for 147 yards and two touchdowns. Orris had five catches for 88 yards.

Westfield finished HCC play with a 2-4 record The Shamrocks will end the regular season with a non-conference game next Friday at Brebeuf.

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

The start-finish line at the iconic Indianapolis Motor Speedway has always been a clean, white color. Not so this month.

The painted strip - stretching across the 106-year-old track adjacent to the famous "yard of bricks" and marking the location of victory where Indianapolis 500 winners and legends are made - has been turned pink to symbolize the global battle against breast cancer.

Today, in recognition of National Breast Cancer Awareness Month, Verizon IndyCar Series driver Pippa Mann, who has piloted the pink-and-white Susan G. Komen car in the last two Indianapolis 500 Mile Races, IMS president J. Douglas Boles and a group of breast cancer survivors got on their knees with paint rollers and applied the colorful change.

"This was just an incredibly cool event, to have the survivors out here painting the start-finish line pink ahead of the yard of bricks," Mann said. "It's just such an iconic location. It's such an iconic image, the yard of bricks. So to bring that into National Breast Cancer Awareness Month has just been a really cool experience for me per-

sonally and having talked to many of the survivors who were here today, I think it's been a pretty cool experience for them, too."

With the IMS scoring pylon also displayed pink further down the track frontstretch, Mann, Boles and the survivors dipped the rollers in Sherwin-Williams paint cans and worked together until the white line on the track became pink. The 20-person project took less than 15 minutes. Then, observing IMS tradition in unison, they kissed the yard of bricks behind the newly "pinked" line.

Adrienne Harlow, an Indianapolis resident diagnosed with breast cancer in 2008 when she was 19, dyed her hair pink in honor of the month. An Indy car fan, Harlow said painting the start-finish line at IMS felt like a celebration.

"This event is about celebrating our journeys and becoming friends together and sisters, and it's just a really fun time to forget about all the stuff we've been through and just really be able to celebrate ourselves," she said.

The pink line will remain that way until the end of the month when it will be repainted its traditional white.

INDYCAR Community Joins Forces for House Build: In the shadows of Indianapolis Motor Speedway this week is an ongoing project that will transform Frank Gazvoda's life. The INDYCAR community has banded together to build a new home for Gazvoda, a disabled U.S. Army veteran, and his two sons in Speedway, Ind., within sight of the world-renowned racetrack.

The "Speedway 5 Hundred" project is coordinated through the Fuller Center for Housing, a national nonprofit organization that works with families in need to provide an affordable home, and corporate sponsor Jonathan Byrd's restaurant and hospitality group.

After Gazvoda was selected for the project, the Speedway Community Development Corp. acquired the abandoned property and procured the appropriate permits. The old structure was demolished and site work began for the new dwelling. The Pit Crew, founded in 2012 and consisting of the extended INDYCAR community assist-

ing veterans in the Indianapolis area, is overseeing the project with the help of skilled trades and craft professionals.

Throughout the week, members of Verizon IndyCar Series teams Andretti Autosport, CFH Racing, Chip Ganassi Racing Teams, Dale Coyne Racing, Schmidt Peterson Motorsports and Team Penske, along with INDYCAR, Performance Tire Service Company and other local companies, are each chipping in on phases of the project. Among those donating materials are Firestone Racing and ABC Supply Co., the sponsor for AJ Foyt Racing and title sponsor of two Verizon IndyCar Series races in 2015.

"I am one lucky man and blessed to have these talented people out there helping me," said Gazvoda, 43, who sustained a broken back rappelling from a U.S. Army helicopter more than a decade ago and still deals with the pain. "They say I am their hero for serving our country, but they are my heroes."

The house dedication is slated to take place Oct. 10.
