The County Line

Officials playing the waiting game with Fishers sports complex

Here's a brief update on recent developments on some pending activities and projects of interest in our county:
Remember the big announcement in April about a huge \$76 million sports complex planned in Fishers? Six months after the announcement officials are still waiting on GK Sports and Entertainment to appear at the Fishers City Council with their timetable for getting underway. Again this month it is not on the council agenda. At last report GK Sports was seeking "a third appraisal" on the project in their efforts to obtain funding.
A State Highway (INDOT) offer to Hamilton County for rebuilding Ind. 37 from Noblesville to I-69 was not included in Gov. Mike Pence's announcement this



week that \$1 billion is planned for state road improvements. But, not to worry, the state's plan for a massive 37 upgrade is separate from the governor's plans recently reported. The word is big money is still coming and will be revealed soon.
The Hamilton County Bicentennial Committee will meet November 13 to lay final plans for the local observance of next year's 200th anniversary of Indiana statehood. Brenda Myers, director of the County Tourism Bureau, heads to committee which will organize various events in the county in conjunction with the statewide celebration.
The Hamilton County Republican Party has set November 10 as the date for its annual Fall Dinner. It will be held again this year at the Ritz Charles banquet facility in Carmel. The event draws several hundred GOP faithful and contributors. With local elections being virtually uncontested this fall, the hopefuls

in next spring's primary will likely be attending to look for support. General admission is \$50 per person.
Carmel Mayor Jim Brainard plans no relaxation of aggressive plans to further develop his city next year. He delivered his State of the City address this week and revealed it is 'full speed ahead' on projects including more residential and office space, recreational opportunities, parking facilities and, of course, new roundabouts. A modest increase in property taxes may be needed, he said.
The Hamilton County Youth Assistance Program is finally underway in all six county school districts. Several years in the making, the program is designed to head off potential problems of school-age youth before situations become serious enough for court action. County judges and school superintendents are cooperating to see that mentoring and counseling are offered at the first signs of a youngster's need for guidance.

116th Street to close in Nickel Plate District
The City of Fishers announced today plans to rehabilitate the railroad crossing on 116th Street in the Nickel Plate District. The improvement project will close 116th St. at the railroad crossing on the evening of Oct. 21 and will remain closed through the weekend. The project will also include crosswalk improvements at 116th St. and Municipal Dr.
The project was coordinated with Hamilton Southeastern Schools' fall break to limit disruption of the school bus routes. In addition, traffic volume is decreased during school breaks.
Improvements include rehabilitation of the railroad crossing and surrounding approaches. The project is partially funded with a grant provided by INDOT and the Federal Rail Authority. In addition, during the closure, the City of Fishers will complete improvements to the crosswalks across 116th St. at Municipal Dr. The project will cost \$370,000 with \$40,000 covered by the grant.
Commuters are encouraged to follow the posted detour routes during the closure. The Fishers Police Department will have additional traffic patrols available during A.M. and P.M. peak traffic periods and traffic engineers will manually operate signals to maintain the flow of traffic.

Sheridan's Les Pence receives 2015 AARP Andrus Award for Community Service

Leslie "Les" Pence of Sheridan has been selected by AARP Indiana to receive the 2015 AARP Andrus Award for Community Service. This award, which is named after AARP's founder Dr. Ethel Percy Andrus, is AARP's most prestigious volunteer tribute that recognizes outstanding individuals who are sharing their experience, talents and skills to enrich the lives of others. Les was recently presented with the award at AARP Indiana's annual volunteer summit.
Since taking the helm of the AARP Driver Safety program in Indiana about three years ago, Pence has grown the volunteer base – Driver Safety instructors and other support staff – by more than 400 percent. And, the number of Driver Safety classes offered in Indiana has increased by 500 percent.
"If Les were running a company he'd be eligible for a promotion or large bonus for these kinds of numbers," said former AARP Indiana State Director June Lyle. "But, since he's a volunteer we can't do either of those. We can, however, recognize and thank him for what he has done with the Driver Safety program."
Pence's commitment to growing the program is because, as he puts it, they are "saving lives." The AARP Driver Safety program in Indiana offers in-person courses all throughout the state, teaching folks about the current rules of the

road, defensive driving techniques and how to operate a vehicle more safely in today's increasingly-challenging driving environment.
Pence credits his extensive professional career in education for his interest in the Driver Safety program. Following his military service in the Army, he taught music at South Whitley High School, where he met his wonderful wife Martha. From teacher he became a principal, then a school superintendent. He also has an extensive civic record, having volunteered with religious, political and non-profit organizations.
"We at AARP would like to thank Les not only for what he does with the Driver Safety program here in Indiana, but what he does for our community and how much passion he puts into volunteering and life in general," Lyle said. "It is genuine, and contagious."

Noblesville opens Recreation Annex for drop-in programs

The Noblesville Parks Department has opened its Recreation Annex at Ivy Tech Community College, 300 North 17th Street, and is providing drop-in programs as it prepares to rollout more offerings this winter. Drop-in programs run from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday, Wednesday and Friday.
• Pickleball – 9 to 11 a.m.
• Basketball – 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.
"We are excited to offer new recreation opportunities to the community. The times allow the public to be active in the morning or play basketball on their lunch break. The annex has locker room where people can shower before heading back to work," Recreation Director Nichole Haberlin said.
Cost is \$5 per visit or \$50 for 12 visits. Participants are asked to bring exact change if paying with cash. Ivy Tech students will not be charged with valid college identification.
The annex will be closed on October 23 and November 27.
Earlier this year, the parks department partnered with Ivy Tech to create the Recreation Annex as a community center for the public. Participants should park on the east side of the building off of Harrison Street by the Hare Chevrolet Stadium and enter at the Recreation Annex Entrance at Gate 18.

Fire at Noble Manor causes \$55,000 in damage

The Noblesville Fire Department responded to a reported apartment fire at 533 Camelot Ct., Apartment E, Noble Manor Apartment Complex Thursday evening.

Lowees Hadad, who lives in the building, stated that he heard the sound of a smoke detector alerting in an upstairs apartment. Mr. Hadad said that he went looking for the source of the sound, and that’s how he discovered a working fire in apartment E. Mr. Hadad tried to extinguish the fire with a fire extinguisher, but was unsuccessful. Mr. Hadad stated that he, and Jill Laker alerted the other occupants within the building, and called 9-1-1.

Upon the first fire units arrival at 7:43 p.m., they noted smoke showing from an upstairs apartment. Fire suppression crews made an interior attack on the fire and had the incident under control at 7:48 pm. All interior areas of the apartment have sustained heat and smoke damage.

The fire originated in the kitchen. There are no injuries to report. The estimated damage to the structure and contents is approximately \$55,000.

In a separate and unrelated case, the Hamilton County Sheriff’s Office is requesting assistance locating a runaway juvenile.

Justin Worthman, 17, was reported as a runaway on Oct. 8. According to his mother, Justin was last seen on Monday, Oct. 5 near his home on State Road 37 in Straw-

town, north of Noblesville. Although Justin has been in touch with his family through Facebook stating he would return home, he has not returned. Justin’s mother believes he may be in the Anderson area where his father lives or in the Strawtown area.

Justin is described as 5’6”, 170 pounds, with brown hair and blue eyes with pierced ears. He was last seen wearing an orange Hamilton Heights sweatshirt and orange shorts. Habitual Traffic Violator allegedly OWI...

Anderson man arrested at US 31, 236th Street

A Wednesday evening traffic stop led to the arrest of a Habitual Traffic Violator in northern Hamilton County.

At approximately 9 p.m., Indiana State Police Sergeant Brent Gulinson observed a white Pontiac drive through a red light at a high rate of speed on 236th Street at US 31. Gulinson followed the vehicle into

the parking lot of the Speedway Gas Station at the corner of that intersection and initiated a traffic stop by activating his emergency lights.

Upon initial contact, the driver said he did not have any identification and gave Gulinson a false birth date. After further conversation the driver verbally identified himself as Cheyenne Healey, 43, Anderson, and provided his correct date of birth. Gulinson suspected the driver was intoxicated based on initial observations of impairment and the odor of alcohol. Further investigation revealed Healey was listed as an Habitual Traffic Violator. Unfortunately, even

with a revoked driver's license, Healey was able to get behind of the wheel of a vehicle and endanger the lives of other motorists.

After Sergeant Gulinson finished checking Healey's driver's license, he radioed for a second unit to assist with the investigation. Trooper Thomas Bennett responded from over 20 miles away. Gulinson returned to Healey's car to further investigate his observations of impairment. Hamilton County Sheriff's Deputy Captain Jeff Kerns happened to be driving by the gas station and pulled in to offer assistance. Healey voluntarily exited his vehicle as Sgt. Gulinson continued his investigation to deter-

mine probable cause alleging Healey was driving while intoxicated. When Healey was offered the opportunity to take a breath test to determine his blood alcohol content he became visibly agitated and repeatedly told the trooper and deputy he could not go back to jail. It quickly became apparent Healey was no longer going to comply and after several verbal commands were ignored Captain Kerns deployed his Taser in an effort to gain compliance and take Healey into custody. The first Taser probes struck Healey near the waist, but were not effective. It appeared Healey was able to pull one probe out. Kerns then deployed a second set of probes from the same Taser, again proving to be ineffective. At this point, Captain Kerns, Sergeant Gulinson and Trooper Bennett had to physically restrain Healey. Seeing the physical confrontation, volunteer Chaplain Parkes, who was riding along with Kerns, came to the aid of the officers and offered any assistance he could, without regard for his own safety.

Healey was taken into custody and medics were called to the scene as protocol for any Taser deployment. When medics from the Sheridan Fire Department arrived and attempted to treat Healey, he again became agitated and physically resisted the medics. Healey refused to allow the medics to treat him. After speaking with Healey for several minutes, Sergeant Gulinson was able to gain Healey's cooperation and the medics were able to transport him to Riverview Hospital for treatment.

Healey was arrested for allegedly Operating a Vehicle While Intoxicated, Resisting Law Enforcement and Operating a Vehicle while a Habitual Traffic Violator.

If you're looking for an "overall" champion of the Hoosier Conference in this the first year for the 11-team loop, forget it. Not going to happen.

There will be an East Division champion and a West Division champion.

The West will be decided tonight when a pair of 4-0 teams, Lafayette Central Catholic and West Lafayette, collide.

The East will be decided tonight, too, and that could end up in a tie. Hamilton Heights will try to make sure that doesn't happen.

The Huskies are 3-0 and will finish unbeaten in the East by winning tonight at Northwestern. A loss by the Huskies and should Lewis Cass defeat Western, the East will end in a deadlock. A Heights victory and coach Mitch Street and his crew will bring a title trophy back to Arcadia.

Overall, Heights will enter the game with a 5-3 record. Northwestern will bring a 4-4 mark to the table.

Northwestern is 1-2 in the East, having defeated Tipton 34-14 and having lost to Lewis Cass 52-8 and Western 16-14. Heights has defeated Tipton 31-6, Lewis Cass 20-9 and Western 41-14.

"Northwestern is a physical, well-coached football team," said Street. "Their multiplicity offensively and defensively provide you challenges.

"We are playing to win our first division championship, so this is an important week for us," Street added.

Northwestern likes to throw the football. Quarterback Trey Richmond is 89-of-166 for 1,251 yards. He has fired for 10 touchdowns and been intercepted seven times.

Richmond's leading receivers are Noah Dowden with 40 catches for 539 yards and Austin Miller with 38 for 636 yards.

On the ground for Northwestern, Evan Cardwell has carried 79 times for 511 yards and Tim Blankerberger 88 times for 246 yards.

Hamilton Heights is coming off a victory over Western, a game that the Huskies blew open in the second half.

"I liked our energy level in the second half, and the fact that we were able to build on our positives and put multiple good plays together," Street said. "I also liked the way we responded in the second half, after we didn't play anywhere close to our best in the first half."

Heights hasn't thrown the football as much as Northwestern. Though he missed a couple of games with an injury, Ethan Jones has put the ball in the air just 98 times, hitting on 46. He has thrown for 632 yards,

four touchdowns and has been intercepted three times. He has a host of good receivers for use in spreading the field, including Sterling Weatherford (14 catches for 281 yards); Jesse Brown (32 for 382), Riley White (17 for 169) and Caymn Lutz (15 for 188).

On the ground, the main man is Clayton Cowan with 176 carries for 894 yards.

Hamilton Heights has beaten Northwestern three straight times.

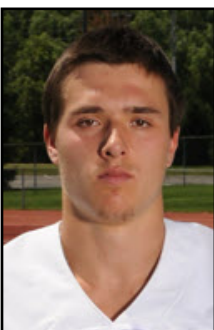

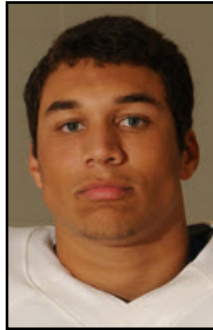

Tennis state finals...

Carmel hosts NC in 1-2 quarter-final match

Six of last year’s eight state finalist teams including the defending champion lead the charge into the 49th Annual IHSAA Boys Tennis State Finals this weekend.

Four quarterfinal matches will be played Friday at 3 pm ET at Carmel and Center Grove high schools with the winners returning on Saturday at 10 am ET at North Central High School for a pair of semifinals and the state championship match at 2 pm ET.

The top half of the bracket at Carmel calls for two-time defending state champion and second-ranked North Central of Indianapolis (18-0) to play No. 1 Carmel (17-1) and No. 4 Jeffersonville (21-0) meeting Culver Academies (17-2).

North Central and Carmel will meet for the second time this season and it’s a rematch of last year’s state championship dual won by the Panthers, 3-2. That was the same outcome of the teams’ regular season meeting on Sept. 3, Carmel’s only loss this year. This is the Greyhounds’ sixth consecutive trip to the state finals tying a tournament record also held by North Central (1974-79) and Homestead (1992-97). Carmel’s Zach Hennessey and Kenny Miller are 14-0 as the Greyhounds’ No. 1 doubles team.

Jeffersonville and Culver Academies both are playing in their second consecutive state finals but neither advanced out of last year’s quarterfinal round. That will change for one team this time around. Both teams boast an undefeated singles player. Culver’s Sam Concannon is 18-0 at No. 1 singles and Jeffersonville’s Kooper Falkenstein is 26-0 at No. 2.

In the other half of the bracket at Center Grove, No. 3 Park Tudor (17-4) will take on No. 9 Jasper (16-4) and No. 11 Leo (23-2) meets unranked Perry Meridian (23-5).

Park Tudor is playing in its fifth straight finals tournament this weekend. The Panthers four regular season losses have all come at the hands of Carmel and North Central. Jasper is also making its fifth trip in a row having reeled off 10 straight victories.

Leo is the lone newcomer to this level of the tournament among this year’s eight teams. The Lions bounced No. 10 Carroll (Fort Wayne) in their opening match of the sectional and later eliminated No. 7 Homestead in the regional after falling to them early in the regular season. Perry Meridian will be represented in the state finals for the first time since 1975, the second year of the current format, and when only four teams made up the state finalists.

Also taking place this weekend at four sites around the state are the individual regionals for singles and doubles players. Results from all the matches will be available from IHSAA.org throughout the weekend and on Twitter at @IHSAA1.
