ing Hamilton County is dreaming, hoping, and praying to receive for a "37 Corridor" on the east side of county between Noblesville and Fishers.

What the County wants to do is to "take over" Highway 37 from the State and receive a bundle of money from the State to help fund that project.

In many ways the "37 Corridor" would duplicate what the City of Carmel did with Keystone Parkway on the west side of the county.

The Hamilton County Commissioners have said they want the State to relinquish State Road 37. A huge project which likely would take five to six years to complete, Hamilton County would like for 70 to 80 percent of the funding to come from the State with the remainder paid for by Hamilton County and the cities of Noblesville and Fishers. Then, once the "37 Corridor" is completed it will be returned to the State and the State then would maintain the road.

Local government officials have told the Hamilton County Reporter that the state funding plan announced by Pence has nothing to do with the "37 Corridor."

Something has to be done with the traffic between Noblesville and Fishers. It is out of control today, and will be more than just "out of control" in years to come.

What local businesses hope to avoid is what the State did and is doing to Highway 31 on the west side of Hamilton County. Businesses, mostly in Westfield, were plowed under and assessment dollars were lost as the State turned Highway 31 into a super north/south road.

Also, recently announced plans published in the Hamilton County Reporter concerning the State's plans on improving I-69 on the east side of Hamilton

The best thing about the supposed haunting of Heady Hollow is that there are two ghost stories, so you can take your choice. For years it was an ideal locale for such stories because Allisonville Road dips into the wooded valley and on a damp night

The other story has to do with the tragic death of some school children who supposedly died in a fire when Heady School burned. For many years there was doubt that a schoolhouse really existed in the area. But, historical research later showed that in Civil War times and earlier there was a frame school near the corner of

## Early unemployment loan payoff to save Hoosier businesses \$327M

announced today that Indiana will pay off its federal unemployment loan early which will lead to significant savings for Hoosier businesses.

The State Budget Committee voted today to authorize a \$250 million repayment of a federal unemployment loan prior to the November 10 deadline. Earlier this year, Schaibley supported the proposal to add the early payoff option to the State's budget.

Indiana is able to repay this loan early, insurance tax revenues that are remitted by saving Hoosier businesses over \$300 million employers.



County have nothing to do with draining money Hamilton County hopes is targeted for the "37 Corridor."

Those plans include adding a travel lane to each direction of I-69 between State Road 37 (Exit205) and State Road 38 (Exit 219).

Motorists attempting to drive that stretch of I-69 certainly will cheer on the State for its planning.

In addition, the project includes reconfiguring the Campus Parkway interchange (Exit 210) into a diverging-diamond design to improve traffic flow, widening the Campus Parkway Bridge over I-69 and replacing the Brooks School Road bridge deck over I-69. Again, making travel easier for those who use the far east side of the county. So, don't worry, "37 Corridor" dreamers. That's going to happen, soon. One person in the know told the Hamilton County Reporter that the "37 Corridor" is a slam dunk and that Gov. 

# Huskies win East






